



The possibility of utilizing the Nash-waaksis power for the purpose of gen-erating electric energy has been dis-cussed for some time past. This is the only fall of any practical use to be found in the vicinity of this city. For many years it has been used to furn-ish power for grist, carding and saw mills, but since the fire of a couple of years ago which destroyed the card-ing mills owned by Mr. Hill and the boot calk factory of Mr. Neill the falls have not been utilized.

TO PREVENT HAIL STORMS.

TO PREVENT HAIL STORMS, As was mentioned recently, stations have been established in many parts of Italy and France to avert hall-storms by the discharge of artillery into the clouds. Whether the system has been of actual benefit is still much discussed, the later reports being less confident than were those made pre-viously. Another step has now been made to fortell the approach of the storms by mens of an instrument called the electrograph, an instrument called the electrograph, invented by Professor Lancetta, a Sichlian. Included in the apparatus is a bell, and when the bell rings at com-paratively long intervals the meaning is "the storm is in sight, and will ar-rive in a few hours!" when the ringing becomes more frequent it implies "the storm is softing nearer:", while if they grow less frequent it is implied that "the storm is moving, further away and will not reach the place of observa-tion." 

SPILES DRIVEN SLANTWISE. One Method of Building a Bulkhea Explained on the Waterfront.

I ha

(New York Sun.)

(New York Sun.) "Never saw 'em drive spiles slant-wise before, you say?" said one of a spile driver gang to a man who, halting at a spot on the waterfront where they were building a new buikhead, had ex-pressed surprise as seeing spiles driven in that manner. "Well, that's because you just never happened to; because it isn't new; they're been driving spiles that way for I don't know how long. "These slanting spiles, which are driven with the foot out and the head leaning shoreward, are called batter, or bracing spiles, and their purpose is to brace the buikhead and help to keep it secure.

"Of course there are various ways of building bulkheads. According to the way you see followed here, where we are building a bulkhead of masonry, BLONDIN CAPTURED. "Commonly, to be sure, piles are driven vertically, the weight dropping straight down upon their head: but spiles are easily driven at an angle by the use of inclined ways. In some up-right spile drivers the ways are ad-justable and can be set at an angle; and then there are sometimes used for slantwise spile driving separate ways that are made for the purpose."
