**THE ROYAL MARRIAGE.**

**CONTINUED.**  
**THE PROCESSIONS.**  
The first of the three processions is at hand, but no one moves in the choir until the glittering file is seen, headed by heralds and great officers of State, coming rank in rank in stately order, filing off to the right and left as they enter the choir, till they reach the dais, which none but the most illustrious may ascend.

Dhuleep Sing, with Prince Edward of Saxe Weimar and the Prince of Leiningen, in his uniform as captain in the English navy, head the line of royal guests, but it is on the sister of the bride, the lovely Princess Dagmar of Denmark, followed by her royal mother, leading in each hand the Princess Thyra and Prince Waldemar, that all looks are centered as with stately step they slowly pass up the centre. The Princess Christian is richly yet simply dressed, and only a feather and a few flowers are mixed with the thick clusters of her auburn hair. All as they reach the dais turn and make a deep and reverent obeisance to Her Majesty, and then pass on to the seats on the south of the altar.

Hardly are they placed in order when the cheers from without the building come loud and clear, with a sound that is almost noise amid that stately pomp and quiet, and the strains of the bands playing the National Anthem can be distinctly heard heralding the progress of the procession of the royal family. There is the usual slight delay while it is marshalled in the temporary apartments, and then the trumpets burst forth as it enters the building.

**THE GRAND ENTREE.**  
Officers of the household, pursuivants and heralds lead the way as before, halting and making a double line below the dais, while the Princess Mary, of Cambridge, her magnificent train borne by Lady Edith Somerset, moves up the choir with the most stately grace. At the dais

her attendant pauses, and she turns to gather her train over her arm, and, moving to the centre, makes a profound courtesy to Her Majesty, then passes at once to her place on the north of the altar, in front and just beneath these treasures of ironwork, the gates of Quintin Matsys.—As she passes in the Duchess of Cambridge follows, with like state and ceremony, and then the Princess Beatrice, Princess Louise, and Princess Helena ascend in turn, followed by the Princes Arthur and Leopold, the latter in Highland dresses of the Royal tartan. All bow and courtesy deeply to the Queen, and the Princess Helena, who wears a train, gathers hers on her arm like the rest, and seats herself near the Duchess of Cambridge. The next is the Princess Alice, wearing a noble coronet of brilliants, who pays the same deep reverence to her mother as all the rest; and the Princess Royal, looking as young, as amiable, and as timid as when, with slow steps, she herself was led to the altar at the Chapel Royal, but this time leading by the hand a fine little boy, who, all unawed by the stately pomp around, dragged on his mother's arm, as he looked behind him at the pageant, and with difficulty brought his little feet to surmount the three steps of the *haut pas*. All have risen as they enter, and the Queen now rises too, and bows to her daughter with a kind and winning smile—the first that has passed across her face since she entered the chapel. Beethoven's noble march has been played as they filed in, but as may be guessed, its strains though beautifully rendered, are but little attended to in such a scene as this. The Queen has evidently found an object which more deeply interests her, and instead of seating herself again she remains at the closet window, watching her royal children as they pass one after another to their seats beneath; and even when they are seated she leans over the front and remains gazing down at them steadily with an expression of fond pride which is unmistakable, and in which no trace of grief can be discovered now.

**THE PRINCE.**  
Again the cheers come louder and more sustained than ever from the outside; again there is the same pause, broken by the trumpets and rattling kettle-drums in the nave, and this time all save the Queen herself rise and remain standing respectfully, for it is the bridegroom that approaches. Great officers precede him, but they are little heeded; all eyes are turned upon the Prince of Wales, who, in his uniform of General, but wearing over all the insignia and purple mantle of a Knight of the Garter, comes slowly up the choir, partly accompanied, partly followed, by his brother-in-law, the Prince of Prussia, and his uncle, the Duke of Saxe-Coburg, similarly robed. The Wedding March is played as they move up with stately ease, and the Queen rises and comes fully forward as the *haut pas* is reached, and the three ascend and turn in line toward her, bowing deeply. The Duke of Saxe-Coburg and the Prince of Prussia retire to the south side of the altar, and the bridegroom, after kneeling a few seconds in prayer, rises and stands "the rose and expectancy of this fair State," in the centre of the *haut pas* alone, with his face toward the Queen.  
Such an occasion is one in which few men appear to advantage, yet the Prince gains by passing through it. With the easy grace that seems natural to all his actions, he stood alone, the watched and observed of all observers, neither bashful nor confident, but with a manly royal bearing that became his illustrious birth and exalted station. He looked round upon the splendid scene for a moment

quietly and easily, and his every movement, his look, his very bearing, seemed in their vivid likeness to his royal father, to amaze and impress all—even those who, by their rank and station, might be supposed to be the most familiar with his features. As the sound of cheering was heard without, marking the coming of his youthful bride, he kept turning his head every moment, for from where he stood, in the centre of the altar, he could see through the screen and down the nave beyond to where the crimson curtains would hide the marshalling of the bride's procession. Often and often did he glance this way, but the curtains were motionless, and gave no sign of the coming forth of her whom all now watches for with such eager expectation that the suspense, even of the slight delay seemed almost painful. Still he stood alone, and, though evidently keenly anxious for the coming of his young bride, he bore the eager scrutiny of all with a quiet ease that was charming.

In order to make room for some paragraphs of European, American, and Colonial news, we forego in this number of the *Despatch* the space usually reserved for editorial matter. On account of the small size of our paper, we shall have to do the same thing on future occasions.

#### THE LATEST FROM ENGLAND.

The *Canada* left Liverpool on the 21st ult., Queenstown the following, day and arrived at Halifax yesterday afternoon, bringing forty three passengers for Halifax, thirty for Boston, and ten thousand dollars in specie.

The ship *Washington* from Callao for Antwerp arrived at Southampton on the 20th March. She was captured by the *Alabama* on the 20th February but was released on giving a bond for \$50,000. She brought the crews of the *Golden Eagle*, *Olicia*, *Jane* and the *Palmetto* ships which had been burnt by the *Alabama*.

The annual meeting of the Atlantic Telegraph Company was held in London on the 19th of last month, when the American Honorary Directors were re-elected, and it was stated that as soon as £300,000 was subscribed, operations would be at once begun, and that three-fourths of this had been already taken.

With reference to the Confederate loan which was to have closed on the 21st of March, it appears that the "bids" in London greatly exceeded the amount needed, but that there was a difference of opinion in Liverpool, where the applications were not very many or large, as to the merits of the scheme. In Paris, however, the loan, according to a telegraphic despatch, was "quite the rage."

The *London Times* says that the loan is regarded as a cotton transaction and not as a political loan, and that there is nothing to prevent any one from subscribing. The *Daily News* denounces the loan as indecent and immoral, and says that those who subscribe are aiding and abetting the slave power in the Southern Confederacy. On the afternoon of the 20th ult., the loan closed at four and a half to three fourth-

premium, having just before touched five and a half. The bids reached ten million sterling, and were expected to be fifteen to eighteen millions at the close. On the 21st the loan was three and three fourths to four and a quarter premium.

The communications between England and the States relative to the island of San Juan have been suspended, as Mr. Layard stated in Parliament, since the breaking out of the civil war.

The bill reducing the duties on Tobacco passed in a Committee of the House of Commons.

FRANCE.—The Senate in a debate on the Polish question almost unanimously expressed their sympathy for the Poles; and a demonstration took place in Paris in favour of Poland on the 19th of last month. It is reported that the reply of Austria to the French proposals is evasive. Reinforcements are asked for by the Commanders of the respective forces in Cochin China and Mexico. The news from these countries is not at all satisfactory and causes anxiety to the government for the result of the approaching election.

ITALY.—Garibaldi's health, it is said, causes renewed anxiety.

POLAND.—Earthworks were being thrown up around Warsaw, and the inhabitants were expecting an attack at Easter. The Poles under Langiewaig were defeated by the Russians under Gen. Schachowsky, losing 400 killed and 54 taken prisoners. The Polish General was captured and taken to Tarnow.

HOW THE PRINCESS KISSED THE PRINCESS.—The manner in which the Prince of Wales greeted his affianced bride on her arrival at Gravesend on the 7th of March, is thus described in an English paper:—

When the Princess arrived at Gravesend, the Prince was anxiously waiting at the wharf. At last the gangway was run on shore, and in another moment the Prince hurried along the deck of the *Victoria* and *Albert* towards the entrance of the saloon. At the same moment a young and graceful figure passed rapidly along the interior of the latter, and at the threshold his Royal Highness saluted, with the ardour of a lover, tempered by the respect of a gentleman, the lips of his intended bride. It was an honest, hearty English kiss, and the English people cheered it in a perfect paroxysm of approbation.

TWO ITEMS FOR THE LADIES.—The only descriptions of the Princess Alexandra's wedding dress which we have chanced to see are the two following. The *London Times* says:—

It is embroidered white silk, trimmed with silver, which can just be discerned in rich designs glittering between the snowy folds. The traditional white is not however, departed from, though over all she wears a slight bodice with open sleeve of white silk, embroidered with silver, and which, falling tight, sets off her tapering waist and faultless symmetry of form to absolute perfection. Her gorgeous train of white and silver is borne by eight young ladies between the ages of fifteen and twenty.

The *London Globe* describes it thus:—"The Princess's wedding-dress consists of a petticoat of pearl-white silk, embroidered with the rose, thistle, and shamrock, trimmed with four rows of silver lace round the bottom, going up the centre, over which is suspended a train of crimson velvet, magnificently embroidered with the same design in silver as the petticoat. The bodice and sleeves are composed of the same costly materials. The costumes of the bridesmaids are composed of a rich white glace slip co-

vered with tulle skirts—the bottom trimmed with a ruche of bouillonnees of tulle, the middle one looped up in spaces all around with bouquets of blush roses, heather and shamrock. From the waist fall a long tulle tunic, which is festooned upon one side with two long hanging bouquets of roses, &c.; the body and sleeves are trimmed with corresponding tulle and flowers. Coiffure, a wreath of roses, heather, and shamrock, with a long tulle veil falling from the back of the head."

#### MULTUM-IN-PARVO.

To-morrow is Easter Sunday, and in nearly all the Episcopal Churches in England and America the altar, font, lectern, and pulpit will be wreathed with beautiful white flowers, and decorated with emblematical designs formed of flowers of variegated hue. This custom, so full of deep meaning, is but rarely observed in either Canada or Nova Scotia, and as far as we are aware, in only one or two parts of our own province.

GOOD FRIDAY, as was befitting the day, was quietly observed—we never saw a holiday in St. John pass off so quietly. In Trinity Church in the morning Dr. Gray preached a most impressive sermon. It was one of his happiest efforts, and was intended chiefly for the younger members of his flock who are candidates for Confirmation.

A BILL is before the Legislature of Nova Scotia to incorporate a Company who propose to build a Horse Railroad through several of the streets in Halifax.

HATHWAY & Co. are having their river steamers re-fitted and re-painted for the coming season. Some of them look quite "as good as new."

MR. MARTIN is putting up a large building of brick and wood in Prince Wm. Street, next to Lockart & Co.'s which will contain stores and dwelling rooms.

The old steamer *Admiral* which formerly plied on the route between this city and Boston, and has lately been in the Federal service was officially condemned the other day at Hilton Head.

ON the 16th March the Russian troops were defeated at Loudeck, Poland, by 3000 of the insurgents, and the town was burnt. The Russian troops have since been re-inforced.

The majority of our readers will be glad to hear that there is a certainty of the Intercolonial Railway Bill passing in the Legislature by a large majority.

VOLUNTEER RIFLE CONTEST.—Yesterday in Carleton a shooting match came off between 14 men of the "Queen's Own," (Capt. Crookshank,) and the same number of men from the "City Guards" Volunteer Company, (Capt. Ray,) in which the former won by 45 points, scoring at the three ranges, in all 150 points.

THE CIVIC ELECTION.—Alderman McGrath is a candidate for the Mayoralty, and Alderman Foster again offers to represent Queen's in the same capacity in which he has ably served the interests of that Ward for some time past. He will be opposed by Mr. John Anderson who now for the first time, we believe, seeks Aldermanic honours.

A PRIZE FIGHT between Heenan (American) and King, (English,) for the championship and £1000 stg. a side, has been arranged for the 8th December next.

NUMBERS of whites and blacks are "skedaddling" from Detroit into Windsor, on the Canadian territory, to avoid conscription.

THE Steamer *New Brunswick* has arrived at New York, we see, from New Orleans, and will probably visit our harbour again.

A SEA-DOG OR SEAL was seen in our harbour on Sunday last, enjoying himself by sportively feasting upon the herring, with which the basin appears to be alive. At one time he was within stone's throw of the wharves, and some of our sporting gentlemen only wished "that it wasn't Sunday."—*Digby Acadian*, Mar. 27.

DROWNED.—On the first of March last, in Acapulco Bay, by the upsetting of a boat while landing from the ship *Atenas* of this port, George W., in the 26th year of his age, eldest son of Mr. S. W. Olive, of Carleton.—*Globe*.

FROM MEXICO.—Instead of their having been overwhelmed by the French, and having their capital menaced, the Mexicans, according to advices received at Washington on the 2d of March, were in the best of spirits, and confident of defeating the French invaders. Gen. Forey has not taken the capital, nor advanced for that purpose. On the 2d he was thirty-five miles from Puebla, having fallen back twenty miles shortly before. His troops were much scattered, in search of forage. Desertions were frequent. No battles or skirmishes worthy of mention had taken place. Heavy reinforcements were arriving in Mexico, and the force is deemed strong enough to defend the capital in any event.—*Boston Journal*.

# THE AMERICAN WAR.

## By Telegraph.

BANGOR, April 3rd.

Secessionists in California, it is believed, have some secret organizations, contemplating some hostile movement. Many loyal citizens were arming.

Official accounts concerning Gen. Gillmore's defeat of Pegram at Somerset, says the latter had 2,600, and lost over three hundred killed, wounded and missing. The Federals numbered 1,200, and lost about 30. The battle lasted five hours.

The Memphis *Argus* says Porter's Sunflower Expedition failed.

The Memphis *Bulletin* says Sherman is in possession of Haine's Bluff.

The Confederates on the Rappahannock are reported to have been considerably reinforced.

It is reported that Gov. Johnson has obtained from Government the full power to raise troops for the liberation of East Tennessee.

Capt. Louis, with one hundred engaged and repulsed a large Guerilla force in Tennessee.

Jenkins's Confederate Cavalry dashed into Point Pleasant, Va., burned a number of houses, and committed other damage. Volan cars from Gallopis, Ohio, drove them off with some loss.

Federal steamers were also fired upon up Kanawha River.

Gen. Banks has established head quarters at New Orleans.

A new plan of operations is reported to be adopted, involving expeditions to clear Atchafalaya and Red Rivers from Confederates, cutting off enemy's supplies from Texas.

Banks's failure at Port Hudson is attributed to Farragut's fleet starting at night 8 hours before agreed upon.

Charleston paper of the 27th says that 4 steamers arrived since previous Sunday from Nassau with valuable cargoes.

SATURDAY, April 4.

It is rumored that a number of bridges are being thrown across the Tennessee River above Florence, to connect the Confederate armies of Tennessee and Mississippi.

The *Louisville Democrat's* correspondent reports that Van Dorn's forces are attempting to flank Rosecrans on the left, crossing the river at Palmyra.

Van Dorn is believed to be well supplied with artillery, and is directing a movement against Kentucky.

On the Cumberland River several Federal steamers have been fired into.

Admiral Porter captures the disastrous movement of the rams *Lancaster* and *Switzerland*, down the Mississippi. They belonged to the War Department, had never been transferred to the Navy, and acted without his orders.

## BY TELEGRAPH. THE LEGISLATURE

FREDERICTON, April 4.

Bills to amend the law incorporating the Alma Mining Company, and to incorporate the Pleasure Ground Association were agreed to in Committee.

The House in Committee passed a resolution recommending a bridge over the Petitediac.

Progress was made in a bill relating to Promissory notes, providing that the authority to draw such by an agent shall be in writing.

Angin resumed on the Railway question at 11.15—reviewed the probabilities of the several proposed lines paying working expenses to show no prospect either doing so taking the figures of the past as a criterion. He said that we may ten years hence export less than now and that therefore there was no encouragement to incur the proposed debt. Our Railroads he said have not induced emigration.

**THE BRIDE.**

At last, with a great clangor of trumpets, which at first are muffled into a rich indistinctness behind the curtains, the long looked for procession of the bride enters, and the Prince, giving one look to satisfy himself of the fact of the arrival, keeps his eyes fixed upon the Queen, and never turns his head again till his affianced stands beside him.

The hush was now so deep and breathless that even the restless glitter of the jewels that twinkled everywhere seemed almost to break it, and, despite the stately etiquette which had hitherto regulated every word and gesture, all now bent far and eagerly forward, as the hum and rustle in the nave beyond showed the young bride to be drawing near. In another minute she had entered, and stood

the fairest and almost the youngest of all her lovely train that bloomed in fair array behind her. Though not agitated, she appeared nervous, and the soft, delicate bloom of color, which ordinarily imparts a look of joyous happiness to her expressive features, had all but disappeared, as, with head bent down, but glancing her eyes occasionally from side to side, she moved slowly up toward the altar. The programme tells us that she was supported on the right by her royal father, Prince Christian, of Denmark, and on her left by the Duke of Cambridge, and the same dry but most authentic document leads us to believe that both were in full uniform, and wore the collars and badges of their respective orders of knighthood. But without wishing at all to derogate from the importance of these illustrious personages, we may say that any one might have safely borne their part, so deep, so all-absorbing was the interest with which the bride, and bride alone, was watched. **HOW SHE WAS DRESSED.**

On these occasions, we believe, the dress of the bride ranks in general estimation as only second in importance in the celebration of the ceremony itself, which is to be regretted, for a lady's dress, like a lady's beauty, can only be described by its effect. It is embroidered white silk, trimmed with silver, which can just be discerned in rich designs, glittering between the snowy folds. The traditional white is not, however, departed from, though over all she wears a slight bodice with open sleeves of white silk, embroidered with silver, and which, falling tight, sets off her tapering waist and faultless symmetry to absolute perfection.

**A COUNTRY PUDDING.**—Mix the yolks of three eggs smoothly with three heaped tablespoonfuls of flour; thin the batter with new milk till it is of the consistency of cream; whisk the whites of the eggs separately, stir them with the batter and boil the pudding in a floured cloth for an hour. Before it is served, cut the top quickly in crossbars, pour over it a small pot of strawberry jam, and send to table quickly.

**STONE CREAM.**—Put a thick layer of greenage, or any other jam, at the bottom of a glass dish. Boil an ounce of gelatine in a pint of cream and milk; sweeten it to your taste, pour it over the jam, and when cold it will be quite solid, and a deliciously sweet dish.

**TO FRESHEN STALE BREAD.**—Wrap the loaf in a clean cloth, and dip it for half a minute into boiling water. Then take off the cloth, and bake the loaf for ten minutes in a slow oven.
