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
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

WHY CANADA WANTS THE PREFERENCE.

In a cabled summary of a letter written by Mr. J. S. Ewart to the London Chronicle, he is reported as saying that Canada desires British preference because she be-lieves the prices of her products would thereby be in-creased and that may Canadia realize that this desire In a cabled summary of a letter written by Mr. J. S.

lieves the prices of her products would thereby be in creased, and that many Canadian realize that this desire is a selfish one. He adds that Canada needs no help from any quarter, but that, taking the purely Canadian stand point, he hopes that preference will be obtained. It will surprise the London Chronicle, says the Mail and Empire, in commenting on Mr. Ewart's prominence, that Canada really desires the preference. Like other British newspapers still adhering to the cause of free trade, the Chronicle was probably willing to be deceived by Sir Wil frid Laurier's refusal to jein with the premiers of other self-governing colonies in a resolution suggesting the doption of preference by the mother country. Sir Wil frid's non-concurrence in that resolution was eagerly seiz. frid's non-concurrence in that resolution was eagerly seized upon by the British free traders and made the ground for the statement that the Canadian people do not want a

for the statement that the Canadian people do not wara a British preference. Mr. Ewart's letter will go far to disabuse British news-paper renders minds of this altogether erroneous iden. That Canada needs no favors from anybody, are state-ments that do not quite harmonize. To deny that a thing desired is really required is to imply that the motive of the desired is really required is to imply that the motive of the desired is not anticly selfish. Mr. Ewart says that, re-garding the matter from the Canadian standpoint, hopes a preference will be conceded. Then there can be no selfishness either on the part of individual interests or on the part of the Dominion as a whole. Canadians know that without a British preference they can sell all the foodstiffs they are able to raise on their fertile soil. They are aware that the balance between the agricultural and the non-agricultural industries in all countries is becoming less and less on the edd a British preference for their fordured.
