COMMITTEE SUBMITS **REPORT OF BOOTS INQUIRY**

No Boot Could Remain Watertight Under Abnormal Condition at Salisbury Plain this Year, But Canadian Boot Stood Test Well-Standard British Army Boot Not Suitable for Standard Army Boot in Canada-No Paper or Fraudue lent Material Used in Soles or Uppers.

Ottawa, April 9.—The committee which was appointed by Parlia-ment to conduct an enquiry into the boots supplied the Canadian con-tingent placed its report upon the table of the Commons tonight. The committee reports that the total number of boots condemned by vari-ous military boards throughout Canada was 7,807 and of these 6,599 were repairable, 510 burnt, 319 mutilated by cutting and 379 useless ng to other causes.

The boots supplied by the manufacturer were sustantially up to sample. The military boot adopted by the Department about 15 years age was similar to the present sample boot. This boot was used by Canadian soldiers in the South African war, where, according to the evidence of Sir Wm. Otter it proved satisfactory. All the soldiers at Salisbury Plain on active service who appear



The committee comes to the conclusion that the standard British army boot is not a suitable boot for adoption as the standard army



The Bishop of Oxford, in a letter to the London Times on the subject of school-children and farm work, says: "I do not believe that the young men who have enlisted for the war are likely to return to the land, under the old conditions, after the war. The lads are already greatly improved by military service and better feedins. They are greatly pleased with them-selves. They are tasting what seems to them a more interesting life than they knew before. Whatever they become after the war, they will not re-turn to what they were. It is there-fore not a temporary but a permanent shortage of labor that has to be met. I must be met, I believe, by improv-ing wages and conditions so as to at-tract labor to the country; and this improvement had better be begun at once and on a systematic scale. Also education should not be curtailed, but in every way improved so as to make rural education a better preparation for rural life. To meet the shortage by withdrawing boys prematurely from school on a large scale is a dis-atrous reactionary measure, which it will be hard to reverse."
