

London, Jan. 9 .- A Constantinople despatch by Reuter, by way of Amsterdam, gives the text of a proclamation of the Sultan to the army, in which after recalling the peace offer of the Central Powers, the Sultan says:

"The enemy countries, disregarding the serious intention and sublime spirit of our purpose, disdainfully rejected our offer, and we are obliged, with our allies, to continue the war, leaving to the enemy the moral and material responsibility of fresh bloodshed and the ruin of homes.'

The Sultan assures the Turkish soldiers that during the war they have "brilliantly enhanced the venerated name of Ottomanism," and expresses the conviction that "with the aid of the Almighty we shall obtain final victory and deliver our country from the avidity of our enemies."

"Henceforth, with our allies," he continues, "we will redouble our zeal and efforts in order, with the aid of God, to destroy our enemies. HUN SOCIALISTS UNANIMOUS FOR PEACE.

Berlin, Jan. 9, via London .- The opposition Socialists, comprising the supporters of the Reichstag minority, the so-called spartacus group of extreme Socialists, and the adherents of the Socialist internation movement, have just finished a convention here. They adopted unanimously a peace manifesto in which it was declared that the time had come for the Socialist in all belligerent countries to demand of their governments an exact statement of their war aims, and to oppose any




