The total length of the bridge from its New York terminus, op posite the City Hall, to Sands street, Brooklyn, is 5,989 feet, or something over a mile. The arches, which sustain the approaches on each side, where they cross the streets, have been built up with brick and fitted as warehouses. weight of the suspended span is 6,740 tons, and the maximum weight with which the bridge can be crowded by mov ing passengers, vehicles and cars, is estimated at 1,380 tons, making a total weight to be carried by the cables and stays of 8,120 tons. The ultimate strength of the cables and stays is 49, 200 tons, or six times the maximum strain upon them. These cables are an chored inland, at a distance of 930 feet pack from the towers on each side. The anchorages are solid cubical structures of stone masonry, measuring 119 feet by 132 feet at the base, and rising some 90 feet above high water mark. Their weight is about 60,000 tons each which is utilized to resist the pull of the cables, which are of steel, fifteen and three quarter inches in diameter. Extraordinary means were resorted to to get firm foundations for the two towers (one at each water mark. The New York tower above the top of the caisson weighs 93,000 tons. At a height of 119 feet there are two arched openings in each tower, through which will pass the streams of travel. On the top of the tower are saddle-plates, huge iron castings, on which rest the weight of the cables

an average breadth of sixteen feet, separated by six vertical lines of trussing, which project upward like so many steel fences. The outside avenues, devoted to vehicles, are nearly nineteen fee wide. The central avenue has a width of fifteen and a half feet, and is elevated twelve feet above all the others, for a footway, thus giving to the pedestrians crossing the bridge an unobstructed view of the river. The vertical trussing forms outside parapets eight feet high above the common bridge floor, for the security of vehicles etc., while the inner lines of the same form inner parapets to the cars and footways supplemented by wire netting which will break the force of the wind. The intermediate avenues, one on each side of the footway, are oc-cupied by cars, constantly and rapidly moving back and forth from terminus to terminus by means of a stationary engine


