NEW YORK, June 4.—The Cunard steamer "Umbrina" arrived off Fire Island at 11 a. m., making her passage from Quebec in five days, 23 hours and 40 minutes, the quickest on record.

During the month of May there were exported from Kings and Queens counties, P. E. I., produce to the value of \$163,929—\$21,110 worth of which were potatoes, \$53,939 worth of eggs and \$21,444 worth of eggs.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., June 4.—Last night Lennie McAlister, the well-known billiard expert, jumped from the third story of his dwelling to the pavement, and was so badly injured that he died in a few hours. He had been sick, and accomplished the rash act while delirious.

Advices from the Arctic state that there is a big jam of logs at Arrostok Falls, and between twenty and twenty-five million feet of logs will be hung up for the season in consequence, as the water is falling very fast. This will seriously inconvenience some of the St. John millmen and will materially reduce the season's cut. On the upper waters of the St. John about eight million logs will be hung up—Globe.

TORONTO, June 4.—The Mail's London cable says: "Wm. O'Brien's entertainment by the New York Press Club is scheduled here. Three years ago the London Press Club refused to admit him as a member because of his connection with 'United Ireland,' a paper which preaches disloyalty to the Queen. An effort was then made to break up the London Press Club, but the English pressmen were too loyal and strong to permit such a proceeding."

A ROMANCE OF REAL LIFE.

THAT WAS ONLY DISCLOSED BY THE DEATH OF DRIVER MCGILLAN OF THE I. C. R.

HALIFAX, June 1.—The recent death of an engine driver on the Intercolonial railway known as Joseph McGillan, has led to the discovery of a romance connected with his life. He came to Halifax from Edinburgh thirty-five years ago and his real name was Jos. M. Gill. He deserted his wife and seven children there and on his arrival here he assumed the name of J. H. McGillan, shortly afterwards obtained a position on the I. C. R. as driver and was engaged on the road for a third of a century. His deserted wife and family never heard any trace of him. Twenty-five years ago he married a Halifax girl named Sarah Tobin, by whom he had four children who were now grown up. They were all dead, except two, a daughter now Mrs. Jane Fraser and her sister. To Mrs. Jane Fraser, arrived here from Scotland, made affidavits of the facts of the case to Judge Shannon and has obtained administration of the estate of her late father. Thus she and her sister will secure his life insurance and all his property, and the second wife and her family are left in the cold.—Sun.
