were rather a continuation of
them.

Any person who is the sole head of
a family, or any male over 18 years
old, may homestead a quarter section
of available Dominion land in Mani-
toba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The
applicant must appear in person at
the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-
Agency for the district. Entry by
proxy may be made at any agency,
on certain conditions, by father, mother,
son, daughter, brother or sister of
the homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon
and cultivation of the land in each of
three years. A homesteader may live
within nine miles of his homestead on
a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned
and occupied by him or by his
father, mother, son, daughter, brother
or sister.

"In certain districts a homesteader in
good standing may pre-empt a quar-
ter-section, alongside his homestead.
Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must
reside six months in each of six years
from date of homestead entry (in-
cluding the time required to earn
homestead patent) and cultivate fifty
acres extra."

A homesteader who has exhausted
his homestead right and cannot obtain
a pre-emption may take a purchased
homestead in certain districts. Price
\$120 per acre. Duties—Must reside
six months in each of three years,
cultivate fifty acres and erect a house
worth \$500.00.

LEVEL CROSSINGS
The country is under obligation to
Hon. Mr. Graham for his prompt ac-
currence to the level crossing bill. He
has introduced a bill which provides
for the appropriation of \$200,000 a
year for five years to aid in the work
of removing dangerous crossings
wherever they may exist. In the
United States the Federal Govern-
ment has taken no part in the work,
the financial burden of separating
grades being borne by the railways,
the State and the municipalities. There
are excellent reasons, however, why
there should be a substantial contri-
bution from the municipality. The
Federal Treasury, Sir James Whit-
comb has promptly expressed his sym-
pathy with the movement, so that it is
not too optimistic to hope that the
Dominion and Provincial Governments will
aid in this important reform.

The House received Mr. Graham's
statement with encouraging cordiality,
the only two debatable points raised
being whether the Dominion Parlia-
ment has power to bring municipal
ties should be required to contribute.
The first question is one for constitu-
tionalists to answer. Mr. Borden
opposes to be in doubt. The Board
of Railway Commissioners has now
power to order a municipality to bear
a share of the cost of protecting a
railway crossing. Toronto has been
directed by the same authority to pay
a share of the cost of the viaduct. The
power of the Board to make such di-
rections has never, so far as we have
heard, been called in question.

As to the justice of exacting a con-
tribution from the municipality it may
be said that the Board will still have
power to determine whether under all
the circumstances a contribution from
a municipality should be called for or
not. Parliament might fix a maxi-
mum percentage above which a munici-
pality should be assessed. To ab-
solve the municipalities of all res-
ponsibility is scarcely practicable. It
is not difficult to foresee what would
happen if municipalities all over the
Dominion could secure expenditures
within their borders by railway com-
panies and by the Dominion and Pro-
vincial governments, with no sacrifice
on their own part whatever. There
would be a rush of applications which
would swamp everything. The elimi-
nation of a dangerous crossing is
something in which a locality is deeply
interested. The more populous the
neighborhood the more need for great
care and safety and the more probable
it is that the local rates are able to bear
a portion of the burden. In the ad-
joining States, where grade crossings
are rapidly being eliminated, the pro-
portion of the cost borne by the munici-
pality varies from ten to fifteen per
cent. It would not be unfair to assess
then in a similar proportion in Can-
ada.—Toronto Globe.

EXPLORATION NEEDED
One of the greatest needs for the
present and future timber adminis-
tration of this country is to obtain
information as to the forests of Can-
ada, their extent, the amount of tim-
ber in them, the rate of growth and
the various other questions relating
to the amount of timber which it is
safe to take from them without im-
pairing the "capital stock." At present

of 82.

**TWO STEAMERS
COLLIDE IN FOG.**

"Horatio Hall" Goes Down
and "H. E. Dimock"
Driven Ashore.

NO LIVES LOST.

CHATHAM, Mass., Mar. 11.—Blank-
eted by a dense fog and proceeding
at half speed the well known coast-
wise steamer Horatio Hall, from
Portland for New York, and H. E.
Dimock, from New York for Boston,
met in the middle of the narrow chan-
nel known as Pollock Rip. At 8
a. m. yesterday with a crash that sent
the Hall to the bottom within a half
hour and caused the Dimock to run
ashore on Cape Cod beach six hours
later, where the passengers and crew
of the Hall were landed without the
loss of a single soul.

As soon as the passengers from the
Hall had gained the Dimock the latter
lacked off a few hundred yards, while
the former slowly sank until she struck
bottom with her hurricane deck re-
maining just above water. While she
was sinking a greater part of the
crew left her in six lifeboats and row-
ed over to the Dimock, but Captain
Jewell, his pilot, mate and two sea-
men decided to remain in the pilot
house of the Hall, although only a
few feet above the water.

The Dimock remained near the
scene until 11:15 and then started
shoveled north. She had not gone far
when it was seen that she was listing
badly and fearing that the bulkheads
might not hold, Captain Thompson
ordered two women from the Hall and
two women passengers, whom he had
on board into one of the lifeboats
and told the men that if the steamer
went down that he would endeavor
to clear away the rest of the lifeboats
but that the women must be saved
first. Under these circumstances the
Dimock crept slowly in toward the
back side of Cape Cod until just after
reaching the Orleans life saving sta-
tion, when her head was turned and
she was driven well up, on the beach.
Captain Charles rowed ashore and
summoned to his aid the crews and
boats of the Old Harbor and Nauset
stations and all three life saving
crews, in spite of the heavy surf
driving up the beach, landed seventy
men and women before dark.
