The Entomological Branch of the Department of Agriculture has just issued Bulletin No. 9, on The Armyworm, prepared by Mr. Arthur Gibson, Chief Assistant Entomologist, who has charge of investigations on insects affecting field crops. In this publication of 34 pages a full description is given of the remarkable outbreak of this notorious caterpillar which occurred in for Prince Edward Island, \$29,238 and which occurred in Canada, and the damage caused is estinated at \$100,000, five-sixths of which took place in the province of Ontario. The value of the trenching method of central was amply demonstrated. No matter how big the advancing army of worms were, it was shown that crops could be saved from their ravages. In the bulletin the insect is described in all its stages, and methods of controlling it are given. A full discussion is included on the Mfe-history and habits of the worm, its food plants, natural enemies, etc. The bulletin has 18 useful illustrations, several of which show clearly the digging of proper trenches and the matter of the provinces have not yet been named.

The investigation into the death of H. J. Ellison, veterinary surgeon of Sussex, was held at Millerton Saturday morning by Coroner Desmond, of Newcastle. The following facts were elicited. About 6.30 Friday evening a stranger drove into the yard of Mrs. W. A. Simpson's boarding house, asking for supper and a night's lodging. He was told he might have supper but no room was vacant. In about five minutes he rushed down to the dining room and grabbed a pitcher to drink. He told Mrs. Simpson cher to drink. He told Mrs. Simpson to send for a doctor, he had taken the wrong stuff. She asked what he had taken, and he said: "Never mind, send for the doctor." She smelt carbolic acid. He did not seem able to swallow. She ran to Robinson's store and telephoned to Dr. Wilson, who arrived in ten or fifteen minutes. The man died about 25 or 30 minutes after he was taken sick. was taken sick.



Wounds Received in Battle at Ypres

Mr. Eusebe Comeau, 25 Railway Avenue. Mencton, has been officially notified from Ottawa that his son Signaller Joseph Arthur Comeau, 3th Battery 2nd Field Artillery Brigade, has died in England from wounds received in the great battle of Ypres. 


