POTATO OUTLOOK IN MAINE AND CANADA

for a Bumper Crop in Those Those Districts This Year—Has Vis-Ited Potato Sections

Boston, Sept. 17.-W. H. Ames of in New England, has returned from his annual trip to Maine, New Brun wick, Prince Edward Island and all parts of Canada where potatoes grow. At the outset Mr. Ames scouts any idea of general blight or rust in Maine and throughout Canadian provinces

"In all my travels I saw little rot in the field. It is true there is some blight in the early potatoes but this has not developed to any great extent. I due into nearly 2,000 fields while away and saw very little evidence of disease. Maine will have perhaps 85 per cent of last year as far as acreage goes, but increased yield, I believe, will nore than offset decreased acreage In some sections I expect more than 400 bushels to the acre and I saw no blight in the Ashland to Caribou terri-tory and round about Squa Pan. Unquestionably the best crop that ever came out of Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick will be marketed rom those sections this year unles omething unforseen develops. New Brunswick will have fully as many poatoes as last year and the stock will be larger and heavier. In some tions I saw bare spots but when I saw yields and talked with growers I beame convinced that increased production will take care of decreased acre-ige. As far as Prince Edward Island is concerned, some sections will have small potatoes, too small for commer-cial purposes, but from Woodstock up to Perth the quality here and size was never better. From Fredericton up to Woodstock the fields are only half grown. On the whole, taking in Maine and the provinces, crops this season will be humper and the hight will not be as heavy as some persons think."—
N. Y. Packer.

Commissions to condemn them: "Called to office following the general election of February 24, 1917, the Foster government has been in control of provincial affairs a little more than three years. In that brief time a good deal of history has been written. For that the Foster administration must have all credit."




