## THEY CONFESS THEIR WEAKNESS

Opponents of Prohibition Have No Reasonable Arguments to Offer.

No stronger argument for prohibition could be found than the advertisements issued by its opponents. There are only two real reasons for opposition to prohibition; one is the make money in the traffic and the other is the desire for self-indulgence. These reasons are not advanced by the "wet" forces; they are kept in the background, while wild and intemperate statements are made in an effort to discredit the prohibition act and to claim for liquor values and benefits which it does not possess.

The evidence of scientists is so conclusive that no one nowadays makes any serious claim that the use of alcohol in any form is beneficial to a healthy person, and medicine has provided other remedies for the ill. Business men and manufacturers are opposed to the use of alcohol because it destroys efficiency; the railroads will not tolerate it. Lives ruined by drink are its chief product. No thinking man or woman want to return to conditions as they were before prohibition was introduced and every parent realizes that the future welfare of his or her children would be imperiled by a backward step.

The present act may have its defects, but it is an honest effort to overcome much greater evils and it can and will be strengthened and improved if the people of the province show by their votes on July 10th that this is their desire. Every citizen who faces the issue honestly and conscientiously must vote for prohibition and against the sale of beer and wines.

**IRISH LEADERS ARE QUARRELLING**

De Valera Charged With Diverting Money from Irish Cause—A Counter Charge.

New York, June 19.—The break between Eamon De Valera, self-styled "president of the Irish republic," and Supreme Court Justice Daniel F. Cohalan, head of the Friends of Irish Freedom, reached formal status last night at an executive session at the National Council of the Friends. No conclusion was reached, but it was said that the bed-plates were laid of a final test of strength.

The charges made by John De Vay that De Valera and his present advisers had used at Chicago \$50,000 of the money subscribed for Irish loan bonds, and intended for use in Ireland only, were counter-balanced yesterday by accusations that Justice Cohalan had attempted to drive De Valera from the United States. These accusations were made in the Monitor, official organ of the Roman Catholic church in New Jersey, by the Rev. W. P. Cantwell of Newark, its editor, in a leading editorial, captioned "Dispicable Treachery in a Holy Cause."

**SUSPECTS TORTURED.**

**Japanese Have Trouble in Subduiting Koreans.**

"The efforts of the new Japanese Administration of Korea to recover the confidence of the Korean people are largely nullified by official mistreatment of Koreans," says the Tokyo correspondent of the London Express.

While the use of paddles and flogging is prohibited by the Government, police officials regularly use torture upon the suspects.

The following particulars of the methods employed are furnished by Dr. Frank Schofield, of the Severance Mission Hospital, Seoul:

Case 1.—An educated young man, punished with 90 blows of the paddle for complicity in the independence movement, and released after six weeks' imprisonment, was re-arrested and questioned with regard to the bomb that was thrown at Admiral Saito. During the police examination he was seven times suspended from the ceiling by a cord tied around his wrists; on five occasions his head was forced back and tied to his hands, which had been fastened behind his back; water was poured down his nostrils and on during a period of four days, and for a further period of three days soap and water were substituted for plain water.

"As a last expedient in this line, pepper tea was used; the reaction was so severe that the young man became unconscious. All these methods having failed, the police ordered his toe nails to be extracted. The Korean torturer, instead, pulled out a piece of flesh from the inside of the small toe, which caused profuse bleeding and satisfied the police.

Case 2.—A young man charged with printing the "Independence" newspaper, refused to give the names of his accomplices. He was beaten unconscious three times in six days and once by hot irons. When seen by the doctors he was a physical wreck.

Case 3.—A Korean young woman, also educated, was beaten so violently over the head that she was rendered unconscious, and her knee and hip joints were twisted to the verge of dislocation. She was "thoroughly upset upon."

As a result of such methods is naturally the production of false evidence and the prosecution of innocent people. In the case of the execution of a conviction in the Korean mind that promise of reform are for foreign consumers only. There is no hope of their condition being ameliorated under Japanese rule. Such are the results of ten years of military rule.

"Paper Silk" of Japan. Millions of yards of a new kind of paper fabric are being manufactured in Japan. It is a combination of paper and silk and is called "paper silk," suitable for making blouses, sheetings and other dress materials.

It looks like inverted cotton at its best, and can be used for all sorts of sewing purposes. It is estimated that the stuff can be put upon the English market at only 12 cents per length.

A London merchant who has had twenty years' experience of Japanese imports declared that Japan's manufacturers are laying themselves out with the greatest success to beat the cheap goods of other nations.

Tons of celluloid goods now come to Europe from Japan, which at one time had a monopoly of the market. The secret of this is that the Japanese have the greatest available supplies of camphor, which is largely used in the production of celluloid material.

Many other goods which were formerly unobtainable are now forthcoming, since great quantities of producing plant and machinery have been laid down.

Discounts. There are some singular discounts allowed in the book trade. They were happily illustrated on one occasion by Mark Twain. One day, while the humorist was connected with a publishing house, he went to a bookstore, and picking up a volume, asked the price. He then suggested that, as a publisher, he was entitled to 50 per cent. discount. To this the clerk assented. "As I am also the author of the book," said Mark Twain, "it would appear that I am again entitled to 50 per cent. discount." And the clerk bowed. "And as I am a personal friend of the proprietor, he modestly continued, 'I presume you will allow me the usual 25 per cent. discount.' "Well," drawled the unblinking humorist, "under these conditions I think I may as well take the book. 'What's the tax?'" The clerk took out his pencil and figured industriously. Then he said, with great obsequiousness, "as near as I can calculate we owe you the book and about 37 1/2 cents."

Kava In New Way. The national beverage of the Samoan Islanders "kava," obtained from the dried fruit of a plant known to the botanist as Piper methysticum. The classic method of its preparation was by chewing, this work being done by maidens; then water was added, and, after straining, the drink was ready to drink.

Missionaries convinced the natives that this method did not accord with the best social customs, and so nowadays they grind the kava root in a stone mortar with a stone pestle. To any unaccustomed person kava tastes rather like soapuds, though some say it has a flavor of vanilla. Many Americans, however, having acquired a liking for it, drink it by preparing it in a meat-grinder.

**A NECESSARY EXPLANATION.**

The public mind appears to be somewhat confused in regard to the question of prohibition in New Brunswick. In the first place it must be noted that there is a difference between the plebiscite in this province and the referendum to be taken in Nova Scotia, Ontario and other provinces. In those other provinces prohibition has been voted on by the people, and is an accepted fact. The referendum in this case relates only to the question of importing liquor from other provinces. In New Brunswick the people have not yet voted on the question of prohibition, which was adopted by the legislature as a war measure. The Dominion government strengthened that measure by passing an order-in-council forbidding the importation of liquor from other provinces. Under the war-time prohibition act the Dominion order-in-council was getting along very well; but after the war was over the Dominion Government cancelled the order-in-council, and liquor has been pouring in freely from Quebec ever since. That is why conditions are worse now than when the Dominion order-in-council was in effect; and other provinces are taking a referendum in order to restore the conditions which existed before it was cancelled. The referendum in Ontario, for example, the importation of liquor from Quebec will again be prohibited. We in New Brunswick, however, are not so fortunate. A plebiscite must first be taken on July 10, to prove to the provincial government that this province wants prohibition; and then we must wait until the legislature meets and ask for a referendum to stop the importation from other provinces. But after the plebiscite and before the referendum one very important step may be taken. The provincial government, convinced by the vote that prohibition is wanted, will have no excuse for not taking over the importation of liquor from other provinces, and putting an end to the indiscriminate sale that is now alleged. And if the province goes strongly for prohibition on July 10, the legislature will have no excuse for not asking a speedy referendum to prevent importation of liquor from other provinces. Thus three steps are necessary if

**VACCINATION OF EMPLOYEES**

THE FOLLOWING IS PUBLISHED FOR THE INFORMATION OF THE PUBLIC, GENERALLY, AND ESPECIALLY OF THOSE DIRECTLY CONCERNED.

"1. Section 30 of The Public Health Act, 1918", being 8 George V. Chapter 36, is hereby amended by adding after the last paragraph thereof the following paragraph:

No person shall be employed in any camp, ship, factory or other place wherein the employees come at frequent intervals into close and prolonged contact one with another, unless until such person produces to the employer or the employer's representative a certificate, signed by a regularly qualified medical practitioner, of successful vaccination, or a like signed certificate that he is immune to vaccinia as proven by three consecutive non-successful vaccinations, or that he is immune to small-pox by reason of having had the disease, and no employer shall employ any person in employment as set forth above, without such certificate being produced. When any person contracts small-pox, charges and expenses may be used for and recovered with costs, in the name of the Chairman of the sub-district Board incurring the same, in any court of competent jurisdiction, within six months of the recovery or death of any such person. Such liabilities shall be in addition and without prejudice to any liability for any penalty provided for any violation of the provisions of this Act.

The terms and conditions of this section shall not become operative until the first day of July A. D. 1920."

**TYPHOID FEVER AT BATHURST**

Serious Outbreak at West Bathurst—Several Deaths Reported.

St. John, June 21.—The provincial department of health is giving much attention to a serious outbreak of typhoid fever in West Bathurst and vicinity. Nearly half a hundred cases of the disease have appeared, and several deaths have occurred, including that of John P. Robichaud, a student at the Euclid Fathers' seminary. He was studying for the priesthood. A young man also died of fever at Petit Rocher. He was Wilfred Doucet.

West Bathurst has many sources of water supply and it has been difficult to tell which source had become contaminated. Fourteen samples of water have been taken by the provincial authorities. Not a single case of fever has occurred at houses which use the town water supply. Many old wells have been closed as dangerous. The town water supply, which has been tested, has been found pure. Three nurses have gone from St. John and the staff of the J. H. Dunn hospital is doing excellent work in caring for the fever patients. Dr. G. G. Melvin, chief medical officer of the province, and Dr. Desmond, medical health officer in charge of the district, are giving much attention and care to the fever outbreak and an early improvement in the situation is looked for.

Local Cases. Three suspected cases of typhoid fever have been reported to the board of health and are under examination by private physicians as well as the board officials. Several tests have failed to prove the cases to be typhoid but all precautions are being taken.

About the Life of Geas.

The life of a gun depends upon the progress of erosion, which sooner or later is certain to impair the accuracy of fire. Erosion is caused by the action of the explosive gases at high temperature and pressure. The hot gases cause a thin film of steel to absorb heat. The film expands and becomes set. Upon the release of the pressure it contracts, which action causes minute cracks that grow larger with every discharge. As they increase in size they form passageways for more hot gas and that swells and enlarges them still further. The inner surface thus becomes roughened and the lands begin to corrode.

Finally the bore becomes so enlarged that it allows the gases to escape. The shell does not then acquire its proper rotation, and its flight becomes erratic. All guns except small ones are now constructed with linings in the tube, which, when the bore is worn out, are removed and replaced by new ones. The cost of relining a gun is approximately 20 per cent. of the cost of the gun. There appears to be no limit to the number of times that a gun can be relined. Small naval guns can be fired about 1,000 times before they are regarded as worn out. Large twelve-inch and fourteen-inch naval guns are considered to have a life, on one lining, of from 150 to 200 rounds. Low velocity guns, such as howitzers and mortars, have correspondingly longer lives than high velocity guns of the same calibre, because of the pressures they develop, and hence the lower temperatures.

### MAKING BUTTONS.

Few persons know that buttons are made from such queer things as walrus, potatoes, boots, horns, blood, persimmon, skin mills, shells, glass and wood, as well as various kinds of metals.

Buttons are children of civilization. Savages use string to fasten their clothes together. The Greeks and Romans got along with merely a girdle, the sewing, sheet-like masses of their garments not requiring anything more certain in the nature of fastenings. Buttons were first used on clothing for ornamental purposes. They were soon followed by loops and buttons. The evolution of the button-hole was last of all. Buttons were first used in southern Europe in the thirteenth or fourteenth century.

The taking of a bath in the Roman Empire was a luxury. The bath was a large tub, and the water was heated by a fire in the interior. The tub was then cut in halves, out of which the buttons were made. The dyeing is done by expert chemists who guard their processes carefully so that competitors may not learn their methods. The buttons are dried in wire trays and are subjected to considerable heat. They are polished by means of felt-lined barrels, by polishing stones and by hand.
