Values of Farms and Crops in 1890.

Important Report From the Bureau o Industry

The weather that benefits one crop or industry of agriculture may injure another. As instance, a wet season insures good pastures, which means a good condition of milch cows and an abundance of milk for the production of butter and cheese. But it also favors the conditions which producerust in grain and rot in potatoes; and so what is gained on one side may be lost upon the other. 




