(Cheers.) Some people who were pitching into free trade in 1878 now said they would favor free trade with the whole world. It we had free trade with the rest of the world we would have to send our goods 3,000 miles across the water and compete with the cheap labor of Europe. (Cheers.) HISTORY REPEATS ITSELF.

The Cry of "Disloyalty" Always Raised Against Reforms in Canada.

How Class Legislators Have Tried to Sustain Abuses in the Past.

(Hon. Oliver Mowat at Toronto. So much is said of this Leyalty as an answer to our demant for improved trade relations with our neighbors, to our efforts to obtain some method of relief for our citizens of all classes, that I occasionally find not very refer to the control of citizens of all classes, that I occasionally find, not very often, but here and there that some good Reformer has been misled by this craft, and I would like to say a word or two about this. This cry of loyalty, this cry of British connection as standing in the way of some great reform, is not now made for the first time. We have had experience of it, and we have had experience of it, and we have learned that it may be made in direct opposition to the interests of the people, and where there is no foundation for the suggestion that the measure will shake British connection in the smallest degree. One of the carliest recollections that I have is the struggle for responsible government. (Hear, struggle for responsible government. (Hear, hear.) Not many of you, perhaps, are old enough to know that the struggle for responsible government was met by this very cry of disloyalty. A voice—In 1841.

Yes, in 1841, as my aged friend over there remembers, and for years before 1841 there was the same cry. It was said that unless you allow the Governor sent here from the old land to rule the country, if you require him to conform his rule to what, the people's representatives here will say, you might as well not be a colony of fongland at all. It is essential to that relation which you wish to continue that the British Governor should have this power in his hand representing the Queen. Ultimately, however, the people of this country became satisfied that responsible government was a safe thing to insist upon, and was necessary in the interests of the country. And now what do we find? Why, there is not one man in all Canada but feels that responsible government did not have this desirable Reitshe convenience that is did not shake Reitshe convenience that the did not shake Reitshe Reitshe Reitshe convenience that the did not shake Reitshe Reitsh there is not one man in all Canada but feels that responsible government did not shake British connections; that it did not shake the loyality to England, but that, on the contrary, it made many loyal who were before disloyal, and it strengthened British connection more than any other measure could have strengthened it. Our Conservative friends of that day were wrong when they said that British connection would not be safe without a resident Governor. Take, again, our municipal institutions, in regard to which the same cry was raised. They said, "Don't esinstitutions, in regard to which the same cry was raised. They said, "Don't establish these institutions; they will become sucking republics if you give them to the people." It was not for some time that the loyal people of this country and this Province—for I am speaking especially of Ontario—ventured to sanction the adoption of municipal institutions of the extreme character which we now enjoy. But at length after much discussion the loyal people of Ontario came to the conclusion that those institutions were quite safe institutions; that British connection would not suffer from them; that they were not sucking republics and would not lead to annextion; and our experience has been that far from being sucking republics or leading to separation from the old land they are a source of strength to British connection; as ource of strength to British connection; a source of strength to British connection; a source of strength to British connection; a source of strength to British connection; that can be named to secure the best interests of the country and any other provision that can be named to secure the best interests of the country and its continued connection with the land from which we and our fathers all come. He goes on to say he has no doubt that the original notice was sufficient. He expresse no opinion on the amended notice, as it was not before the Queen's Bench Divisions. How the Grain Camblers Manipulate the Markets.

How the Grain Gamblers Manipulate the Markets.

Chicago, Iil., Feb. 18.—The Tribune says there are strong indications that the wheat market is being manipulated, and intimates that Rockefeller, of the Standard Oil Company; Jas. T. North, the nitrate king, and John W. Mackey, the bonanza millionaire, are back of it. It is claimed that sales of wheat on the Chicago Board of Trade alone aggregate 70,000,000 to 80,000,000 bushels, whereas there are less than 40,000,000 bushels of actual wheat in the West, leaving about 40,000,000 bushels which are really "wind" sales and must be covered at whatever price the market touches. But this is not all. Similar short sales have been made in all of the principal markets of this country and Liverpool. It is asserted that the alleged combination of millionaires sent agents abroad and secured accurate information as to real shortage in the crop, and as early as the middle of December began to quietly pick up all the wheat offered, working through comparatively unknown brokers and traders, who were accustomed to deal in small lots, and that they thus, without attracting attention, secured absolute control of the market. Whether or not the price will be put to a higher figure is known only to the clique.

Ice Fishing on Lake Erie.

BUFFALO, Feb. 18.—One of the great occupations of the people of South Buffalo at this season of the year is ice fishing. Yeasterday, the weather being mild and the ice firm, nearly 2,000 fishermen were on the lake with their hooks and lines. Some pushed their way out as far as ten miles, and generally at that distance found good fishing. At eight miles out probably the largest number of fishermen consergated and pursued their sport regardless of the rain. On the Canadian side they found the choicest field. Bringing their catch home after the sport is ended, the fishermen are able to sell it to market men for 5 and 6 cents a pound, and the latter box it up and send it to New York and Boston. They have a fine flavor, and compared with them the fish caught in summer and frozen are almost tasteless. One of the largest catches y esterday numbered 180 fish. The average catch was about five to ten fish.

THE LAST CITY ELECTION.

Testimony as to the Manner in Which Mr. Hyman's Friends Conducted It.

A good many innuendoes and false statements have been circulated by Mr. Carling s friends with regard to the manner in which the last Dominion election was fought. If further testimony of the fairness with which Mr. Hyman's responsible supporters conducted the election were needed, it would be found in the declaration of the Toronto Telegram, an independent Couservative newspaper, which, after reviewing the evidence, remarked that the London contest "was fought as fairly as such contests ever are." The same Conservative paper further added:

"Canada would be better off if there were no graver impurities in its politics than those revealed at the London election trial."



The trade restriction conspirators not very magnanimous in the attack on the lawyer. Did they not put up hundreds of dollars of money to promote the attack? against such doings.
We have faith in the fair-mindedness of the people of London. They must reach the conclusion, as we do, that the men who try to profit by dishonesty, and to steal the votes of the genuine electorate by putting on bogus votes to kill legitimate votes, cannot have a case worthy of indorsation. To the polls, freemen, and resent the in-sult to the manhood of London!

THE DELUSIVE RECIPROCITY

The net results achieved by the Ottawa Ministers by their dupiteity is to all ap-pearance that they have closed the gate of

negotiation with the American Government against themselves finally and forever.

ME CARLING HAS A SEAT IN PAR-LIAMENT ALREADY.

Mr. Carling's present determination to appropriate Mr. Hyman's seat for the House of Commons (for Mr. Hyman was fairly elected by a majority of 183 votes) suggests a noted Scripture incident, where one who had much already was filled with mean discontent that another should have anything whatever. In the end the jealous man was holsted with his own petard. Here is Mr. Carling with a seat in the nate, carrying \$1,000 a year for life, and nothing to do, who insists on throwing up that Parliamentary position in order to prevent Mr. Hyman from sitting in the other branch of Parliament, to which he was elected. A vote for Mr. Hyman will rend him to Ottawa to complete his term of service, and yet that vote will not keep Mr. Carling out of Parliament, as he will immediately be reappointed to the Senate by the Government when the election on the 26th is over.

MR. HYMAN IS A SPEAKER. Both in matter and manner Mr. Hyma proving to be one of the best speakers in Canada, which is a good deal to be able nestly to say of a young native townsman. In his speech last night, in which he spoke of the unfair treatment to which he had been subjected, there was a manliness and self-restraint in his indignation which ommanded the respect of the audience.

AT SIXES AND SEVENS.

Mr. Carling has been sick, but he surely has been able to read the newspapers recently. Yet he has issued an address in which he says that the policy of his party is to have the "protective," or high tax policy continued, both with regard to manufactures and farm products. But Mr. Carling's friends went to Wash-

ngton last week, and it was trumpeted abroad that they went to promote reciprocity. Mr. Carling's own newspaper organ said so.

If Mr. Carling understands his party's policy, the mission of his associates to Washington was one of false pretenses, and they are not to be trusted.

The chief officer in the United States

dovernment has given it to be understood, n no uncertain manner, that reciprocity which does not include both manufactures and farm products will not be thought of. Taking Mr. Carling's view of the situation, it would be disloyal to buy or sell freely from or to our neighbors even such articles as potatoes, turnips or barley. His associates at Ottawa are not so extreme; hey say that disloyalty could not be charged if there were free trade in farm articles; but they are quite certain that the men who want to trade freely in coal, or in furniture, engines or spades, are traitors of the deepest dye, intent on a liabolical scheme of a-n-n-e-x-a-t-i-o-n. Fearful and wonderful is the logic of Mr. Carling and his associates.

Is there an honest Conservative in Lonlon who is not prepared to resent the attempt of Mr. Carling's confidential friends to stuff the voters' lists with bogus votes?

STRONGLY RESENTED.

Many of the men whose names F. A. Fitzgerald and his associates attempted to have kept on the city voters' lists, even after Revising Officer Fraser had decreed that they should be struck off, resent the outrage. 
