The question was not now in that sense a legal oce; the act was already determined to be constitutional, and the parties opposed to it were now endeavoring by another means to have it annuled. That means was by an appeal to the Governor-General-in-council, which appeal had been partly heard, and the final appeal of which has been postponed, subject to certain questions which are now being submitted to the Supreme Court of Canada. "My position is this," said the speaker: "Once the Privy Council has determined the constitutionality of the act there is no power, and there should be no power except the Province itself to annul the legislation. (Cheers.)

I DENY THE RIGHT OF SIR JOHN THOMPSON and his colleagues to turn themselves into a judicial body and assume the functions of judges to enable them to annul the Province of Manitoba." (Cheers.) He regretted that the House had allowed the Premier to submit certain questions to the Supreme Court as to whether the Governorin-council had the right or not to disallow in effect the legislation. Although Sir John Thompson denied it, a French paper in Ottawa asserted that the late Government, through Mr. Chapleau, had promised the hierarchy of Quebec to disallow this act. (Groans.) The Government had resorted to the present subterfuge, Mr. McCarthy said, because they saw the strength of public opinion in this Province against any such course. Sir John Thompson probably wished in his prayers every night that the supreme Court would say they had not the power to do that which was expected of them. (Laughter.)

Mr. McCarthy then lunched into tariff reform. The act of 1879, the National Policy, was passed with a view to establishing Canadian industries and give them a chance to live against unfair competition to which they were exposed at the time when Americans had a tariff of 45 per cent, gainst our 17½ per cent, tariff. But it was understood that this was merely to last until manufacturers had a chance to it was understood that this was merely to last until manufacturers had a chance to get under way. (Hear, hear.) The question has been with me since 1891, whether that opportunity has not already been afforded them and whether the time has

Let tariff reduction stop short of the point at which it would ruin the industry from which any given mechanic gains his living, and it is all in his favor even on the very article he is engaged in manufacturing; for his wages are generally fixed, not by the wealth of his employers, but by the international competition in his line of labor. The farmers can only menace the great mass of townspeople in the course line of labor. The farmers can only menace the great mass of townspeople in the course of their agitation by insanely refusing to allow the necessary revenue of the country to be collected on a system that, at the same time, protects the industries of the people; and, should they do this, thegreater damage would recoil upon themselves, for, with the decimation of the towns and cities, their own best market would disappear.

with the decimation of the towns and cities, their own best market would disappear.

And this argument works just as well the other way round. If the farmers are not prosperous, there is no one to buy the output of the factories, and, as a consequence, city life is paralyzed. "Trade and get rich" is an old saying; but if the means of trade are dried up at the source—the ability to purchase—it may well be read "haggle and get poor." No one is particularly astounded that manufacturers do not flock to the Government during the present tariff inquiry, and demand a reduction of the duties. But if they were far-sighted, they might well do so; for an impoverished consuming class will very soon begin to stop their looms and silence their forging hammers, one by one. Over-taxation of their constituency will be as fatal to them as under-protection of their product.

The Patrons show their wisdom in not making their e.-sperative store system the sheet anchor of the society. As one of their officers pointed out the other day, it is not the country storekeeper who is getting rich at their expense. He is very often as hard worked and as hard pressed as the farmer; and in the long run our people will find the natural laws of competition, supply and demand to be better distributors than any socialistic device, large or small. The field in which any organized effort to help the farmers—in this time at least—must do its best work, is that of polities. Some Ministerial journals are very fond of advising them these times to build geed roads, to try many improved kinds of farming, to paint their fences and to stop keeping dogs. But the smell of the herring is plain to all. They are exceedingly anxious that the farmer shall not make it askward for their party by demanding lower taxation and They are exceedingly anxious that the farmer shall not make it awkward for their party by demanding lower taxation and better foreign trade facilities at the hands of Parliament. It would be politically safe for them to send out a royal commission to investigate the great question as to whether or not the cow should be milked from the right side or the left; and there is no doubt that a couple of lawyers, a brace of politicians and a political farmer could collect some very valuable hints for the farmers wives on this point. But when the farmer wakes up to the necessity of real reform of the tariff, they see political peril in the demand, and begin, with one consent, to try and attract his attention to something else. But the steady growth of such purely political movements as the Patrons of Industry show that they have not been drawn off the scent as yet by even the most maladorous herring; and they have but to push ahead to win not only the willing ear of the touring Ministers, but the ready obedience of Parliament. Mr. Kerns insisted upon a vote upon the preamble, and Mr. Gibson was rather chagrined to find that it was carried by 13 to 10. Of course there is a large majority of Liberals on the committee, but it hap-pened that the Conservatives were in the ascendancy this morning. Mr. Kerns was considerably elated over his victory, so considerably much so that be consented to the bill itself being laid over for a year, expressing the hope that the city of Hamilton would not in the meantime "gobble up" the

Proceedings in the House to-day were of rather an important nature. Mr. McColl's notice of motion calling for the election of sheriffs, registrars of deeds, clerks of the peace and other officers, instead of having them appointed by the Government, gave the House cause for considerable debate.

The Attorney-General expressed himself as strongly against the motion. The experience of the United States had shown that the system of electing officers had given rise to untold facilities for corruption. No bank or building society per-

that the system of electing officers had given rise to untold facilities for corruption. No bank or building society permitted its shareholders to elect its staff. The shareholders elected the management, but did not in any way interfere with the management of details. The Attorney-General drew a parallel case between a commercial organization and the Province. After Mr. Meredith had expressed himself as partly in favor of the bill the motion was lost on a division.

There was a protracted discussion on Mr. Sprague's bill to exempt farmers from the provisions of the Workmen's Compensation Act.

Mr. Fraser said that the exemption of blacksmiths, carpenters or any other class would be just as logical as exempting farm-Mr. Meredith also opposed the bill. He

Mr. Meredith also opposed the bill. He said there was no reason why farmers should be exempted. He accused the Government of attempting to interfere with common law.

Mr. Hardy and Mr. Mowat said there was a feeling among the farmers that they were placed at a disadvantage. A man who suffered injuries through his own negligence might bring suit with certainty that the farmer would defend the suit. Mr. Mowat agreed with Mr. Hardy.

It is in the interest of every man who purchases clothing, furniture, cutlery, wall paper, tools, or any of the ordinary necessities of life, that the cost of them be lowered, provided this is done without cutting off his own means of livelihood. Let tariff reduction stop short of the point at which it would ruin the industry from which any given mechanic gains his living, and it is all in his favor even on the very article he is engaged in manufacturing; for his wages are generally manufacturing; for his wages are generally fixed, not by the wealth of his employers, but by the international competition in his line of labor. The farmers can only menace line of labor. The farmers can only menace the great mass of townspeople in the course of their agitation by insanely refusing to allow the necessary revenue of the country to be collected on a system that, at the same time, protects the industries of the people; and, should they do this, thegreater damage would recoil upon themselves, for, with the decimation of the towns and cities, their own best market would disappear.

with the decimation of the towns and cities, their own best market would disappear.

And this argument works just as well the other way round. If the farmers are not prosperous, there is no one to buy the output of the factories, and, as a consequence, city life is paralyzed. "Trade and get rich" is an old saying; but if the means of trade are dried up at the source—the ability to purchase—it may well be read "haggle and get poor." No one is particularly astounded that manufacturers do not flock to the Government during the present tariff inquiry, and demand a reduction of the duties. But if they were far-sighted, they might well do so; for an impoverished consuming class will very soon begin to stop their looms and silence their forging hammers, one by one. Over-taxation of their constituency will be as fatal to them as under-protection of their product.

The Patrons show their wisdom in not making their e. sperative store system the sheet anchor of the society. As one of their officers pointed out the other day, it is not the country storekeeper who is getting rich at their expense. He is very often as hard worked and as hard pressed as the farmer; and in the long run our people will find the natural laws of competition, supply and demand to be better distributors than any socialistic device, large or small. The field in which any organized effort to help the farmers—in this time at least—must do its best work, is that of polities. Some Ministerial journals are very fond of advising them these times to build good roads, to try many improved kinds of farming, to paint their fences and to stop keeping dogs. But the smell of the herring is plain to all. They are exceedingly anxious that the farmer shall not make it awkwardfor their

But the smell of the herring is plain to all. They are exceedingly anxious that the farmer shall not make it awkward for their party by demanding lower taxation and better foreign trade facilities at the hands of Parliament. It would be politically safe for them to send out a royal commission to investigate the great question as to whether or not the cow should be milked from the right side or the left; and there is no doubt that a couple of lawyers, a brace of politicians and a political farmer could collect some very valuable hints for the farmers wives on this point. But when the farmer wakes up to the necessity of real reform of the tariff, they see political peril in the demand, and begin, with one consent, to try and attract his attention to something else. But the steady growth of such purely political movements as the Patrons of Industry show that they have not been drawn off the scent as yet by even the most maladorous herring; and they have but to push ahead to win not only the willing ear of the touring Ministers, but the ready obedience of Parliament. This country is always ruled by that vote which is best organized and which knows best what it wants.

The Sarnia Post, alluding to the detec tion by custom officials of a great deal of emuggling on the part of residents there while the river was frozen, says;

The Port Huron ladies buy silks over here and expensive dress goods, while the men invest in made-to-order suits, underclothing and goods of that kind. The goods the Yankees buy are mostly imported to Canada from the old country, and the Government gets a big thing out of it, of course, for the duty has to be paid by the importers. Sarnia people seldom buy anything in Port Huron more extensive than a new hat, a pair of boots or some photographs, so it will readily be seen who gets the best of the bargain."

MR. M'CARTHY'S SPEECH. The chief interest in Mr. D'Alton Mc-Carthy's speech last night lay in the fact that it was a severe arraignment of the policy of "protection" from the point of view of a Conservative, who, under certain promises and hopes, had aided in inflicting apon the country the virus of a high tax system that has enriched a few, while proving an injury to the great majority of the people.

With Mr. McCarthy's attitude on the Manitoba school question we have no cavil. We believe in Provincial rights. Manitoba is not bound by the Confederation compact that enables the Protestants of the Catholic Province of Quebec to maintain, by their own taxes, their own system of schools, while providing that similar liberty shall be extended to the Roman Catholics of this Province. Manitoba came into the union, as the British Privy Council has decided, free to decide

for itself what her school system should be. That being held by the highest court in the land, Sir John Thompson and his associates should have refrained from fur-

ther attempts to keep the question open.

Mr. McCarthy wisely conceded that this question was of minor importance when compared with the great bread and butter issue involved in the fattening of a few combines at the expense of a whole people. His views, frankly uttered as a repentant Conservative, should be well pondered, even by those who may not agree with every statement that he makes on other points of public policy. It was a comparatively easy task for him to prove that 'protection" had been a dismal failure in Canada, from all points except one, and that is the very point for which no legitinate defense can be formulated.

In London, as in other cities which he has visited, Mr. McCarthy took up the question from a local point of view. He ridiculed the census, and caused much laughter as he asked the audience to discover, if they could, the 804 manufacturing establishments alleged to have been found by the census commissioners in this city. This was a telling blow, emphasized as it was by the statement that the enumerators were paid a special rate for every factory chronicled. The policy of high taxation, he concluded from statistics adduced in the census, from the specimen hot-house industry of cotton manufacturing, and from the unrest in the country, has proved a great injury to the country. If he had chosen he could have shown from the census returns that so far from adding to the population of this city, there was a distinct decrease in the last census decade compared with the low tariff period between 1871 and 1881. The total population of London and suburbs now embraced in the city in 1871 was 15.826. In 1881 the population had increased to 26,266, or an addition in the ten years of 10,440. From 1881 to 1891, under the policy of high taxation which was to add so greatly to our manufacturing wealth the population increased from 26,266 to 31,977 an addition of 5,711, or not much ove one-half the increase chronicled in the revenue tariff period.

It is hoped this offer will re-establish confidence in Australia. So far continental bourses have been little affected by the bank failures.

LONDON, May 18 .- The opinion which is unanimously expressed in London is that the demonstration against Mr. Gladstone at the British Institute yesterday, was not only a diagraceful exhibition of partisanship but also a direct insult to the Prince of Wales, with whom the Prime Minister had just dined at the Institute in company with the visitors from Iudia. It is said Mr. Gladstone absented himself from the exercises at the opening of the largitude in the control of the largitude in the lar cises at the opening of the institute in ac-cordance with the advice of friends, who

Goschen attacked the Government on the ground that Mr. Fowler, president of the Local Government Board, who was the only Minister who had spoken in the discussion, had spoken at such a stage that no opportunity was given to the Opposition to reply to his utterances.

Prime Minister Gladstone repudiated the suggestion of unfairness on the part of the Government. He said that he had adhered to the rule never to propose a vote for the

Several members here attempted to speak and great disorder prevailed. Angry cries and counter cries were heard in different parts of the House.

Chairman Mellor repeatedly appealed for order, but his appeals were unheard, and at length Mr. Goschen's motion was defeated by a vote of 299 to 214.

When Gen. Goldsworthy, Conservative, who was the last speaker, sat down, a dozen members of the Opposition arcse to claim the floor. Before the chairman had time to recognize any of those who were

claim the floor. Before the chairman had time to recognize any of those who were anxious to speak, Dr. MacGregor, Liberal member for Invernesshire, moved the closure. The motion was carried by a vote of 281 to 220. Then followed the division on the second clause, resulting as before stated.

CLEVELAND ISOLATED.

Floods Cut Off Communication With the City Except from the West.

CITY EXCEPT FROM the West.

CLEVELAND, May 18.—Cleveland is cut off from all communication with everybody except the people on the west, owing to the floods. No trains are running on the Lake Shore east, and no one seems to know when there will be any. The Erie is badly washed out and the valley is literally submerged. The World's Fair train in the valley is in two feet of water. There are few vessels in the river, and none are leaving or arriving. The lake is a mass of turbulent waves, and the seas are higher than they have been for years.

THE FOLDING BED TRAGEDY. How Mrs. Clough Lost Her Life at Chicago.

Clough, wife of a Baptist missionary, who was killed at Evanston by a folding bed which closed upon her and crushed her body. That the daughter, too, was not crushed to death was due to accident. The leg had given way and fallen to the floor. Gratia leaped to her feet just in time to escape the heavy headboard, which tottered over on her helpless mother. Vainly she tried to release her. A STEP IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION

(Toronto Star.)
The Assessment Amendment Bill of Mr.
Waters, which is now before the Ontario
Legislature, is a step in the right direction.

Legislature, is a step in the right direction. True, it is not a very big step, but reforms have usually to advance by small steps, one at a time.

Briefly Mr. Waters proposes to abolish the taxation of capital which is now taxed in the shape of personal property, and for it to substitute the taxation of the income which may be derived from such capital. His bill does this in a very clear and definate way, by altering the definition of personal property so that it shall not include capital in any shape. Under the Assessment Act the same number of mills on the dollar must be levied all around; so that levying the rate on the yearly income instead of on the bulk capital would result in a substantial lessening of taxation on capital employed in productive industry—which includes productive exchange—but not "swopping lots," by the way.

The benefits of Mr. Waters' proposition are therefore these:

1. It relieves industry from burdens to

1. It relieves industry from burdens to some extent.

2. To that extent it puts a little more burden on land monopoly.

3. It is a step in the direction of relieving both capital and labor from taxation.

And lastly, Mr. Waters' bill has the great merit of being vigorously opposed by land monopolists. Witness the proceedings in the Board of Trade, and a letter in one of the morning papers by a noted real estate operator denouncing the bill. That is a sure sign that Mr. Waters is on the right track.

The most important provision in the Wage-Earners' Bill which has, in part, passed the Legislature of Ontario, is as follows: "3—(1) Before a contractor for a work in a city shall be entitled to receive a payment on his contract, it shall be his duty to produce to and leave with the owner an affidavit or statutory declaration by the contractor (or by his agent competent from personal knowledge to speak to the facts), that all persons employed on the work and entitled to wages, have been paid in full up to and inclusive of fourteen days prior to such payment by the owner to the contractor; and an affidavit or statutory declaration to the same effect by the architect or superintendent of the work (if any), unless he has made the like affidavit or statutory declaration under the provisions aforesaid as an agent." The bill is introduced by Sir Oliver Mowat.

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
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
