RELATIONS WITH GREAT BRITAIN. "Our relations with Great Britain, always intimate and important, have demanded during the past year even a greater share of consideration than usual. Several vexatious questions were left undetermined by the decision of the Bering Sea arbitration tribunal. The application of the principles laid down by that august body has not been ollowed by the results they were intended to accomplish, either because the principles themselves lacked in breadth and definiteness or because their execution has been more or less imperfect. Much correspondence has been exchanged between the two Governments on the subject of preventing the exterminating slaughter of seals. The insufficiency of the British patrol of Bering Sea under the regulations agreed on by the two Governments has been pointed out, and yet only two British ships have been on police duty during this season in those waters. The need of a more effective enforcement of existing regulations, as well as the adoption of such regulations as experience has shown to be absolutely necessary to carry out the ntent of the award, have been earnestly urged upon the British Government, but thus far without effective result. In the meantime the depletion of the seal herds by means of pelagic hunting has so alarmingly progressed that unless their slaugnter is at once effectively checked their extinction ter of absolute certainty.

"The understanding by which the United States was to pay Great Britain a lump sum of \$425,000 in full settlement of all British claims for damages arising from our seizure of British sealing vessels, unauthorized under the award of the Paris tribunal of and cancellation of our United States arbitration, was not confirmed by the notes, commonly called greenbacks, and last Congress, which declined to make the necessary appropriation. 

Death of the Matron of the John H. Stratford Hospital.

Chatham Wants Government Aid to Dredge the Mouth of the Thames.

A Whole Family at Sandwich Poisoned-Heavy Sentences Imposed by the Court at Guelph.





HOW TO LIVE LONG.

Marriage is the Prescription of a Distinguished Berlin Physician.

Some curious figures have lately been made public by a celebrated Berlin physician which seem to point to the fact that f a man wants to live long and preserve his health and strength he ought to marry. Among unmarried men between the ages of 30 and 45 the death rate is 27 per cent. Among married men between the same ages it is only 18 per cent. 





THE ROYAL SECRETARY.

Mr. Peter Kerr, of the Scottish Clans, Received by the Local Lodge.

He Talks of the Work of the Order Since Its Inception - A Musical Programme Provided.

Mr. Peter Kerr, of Boston, Mass., the royal secretary of the order of Scottish Clans, was tendered a reception in Somerset Hall last night by the members of Clan Fraser, No. 43. The turnout was large and the evening proved a pleasant one for the sons of the land of heather, their wives and friends, for the programme was purely Scotch, the musical portion comprising songs by Miss Gilmour, Mr. Sim Fax; Miss Mutch and Mr. Walter Young and a reading by Dr. Gardiner. sides the above, several selections were ven on the bagpipes by Mr. John McGregor. Mr. E. R

Cameron occupied the chair. The feature of the programme was the address by Mr. Kerr, which consisted chiefly of a review of the work of the clans. The order, he said, was started on Nov. 30, 1878, in St. Louis, Mo., with a very small membership, but since then it had been an increasing power for good. Today the active members numbered between 3,000 and 4,000, while during the past ten years \$470,000 was paid to the widows and rphans of deceased members, exclusive of \$125,000 drown on the treasurers for sick benefits. Besides sick benefits and insurance, many clans furnished skilled physicians free of extra cost, and this had led to the order being received with favor generally among the Scotsmen. Many widows and orphans had been assisted in these ways and prevented from becoming public charges. The royal secretary considered a man criminally negligent who failed to make such provision for his family when insurance for \$1,000 could be obtained in the Clans for less than 4 cents a day by a man under 34 years of age. So the order was always extending an invitation to men in whose veins flowed the blood of old Scotia to enlist under its banner and secure protecassist in a noble work.
