The Naval Resources of the Em pire Not to Be Despised.

Quick-Firing Guns of Large Caliber Are Sald to More Than Make Up the Difference in the Number of Ships of

(Special Correspondence.)

Berlin.-(Special.) - Of the naval powers of consequence Germany is the youngest. Practically, too, the German navy is untried and untested. The further fact that Germany is a poor country, when compared with France, England or the United States, and that she is financially unable to support, without seriously crippling her-self, the double burden of taxation which the maintenance of her matchless army and of a navy of first-class dimensions would necessitate, has bred the opinion generally held, even by the majority of the German press and people, that the German navy is of not much account, and hardly able to make a decent showing, if the need

should ever arise. This opinion, however, is an errone-ous one. It is true that as to size the German navy occupies the fifth place, being outdone in this respect by England, France, Russia and Italy, and only slightly exceeding-at this hourthat of the United States, whereas is certain that, in conformity with the naval plan and the naval resources fixed under the present administra-tion, the United States will exceed, in the size and fighting quality of her navy, Germany ten years hence, But it is just as certain that Italy will drop behind with each recurring year, he financial embarrassment rendering it impossible for her to keep up the size of her navy on the present scale. As to the Russian navy, it is also, practical ly, an unknown and untested factor, and marine experts declare to-day that much of Russia's naval strength, like that of her army, exists only on pa-

Be that as it may, I in this instance the German navy is no mean opponent. At the Kiel naval demonstration, in June, 1895, I heard an experienced impartial American naval commander express himself to the effect that in point of readiness, in point of admirable discipline and actual fighting power, the German navy of to-day comes, in his opinion, in the second rank—directly behind England. Since then several occasions have arisen which tried the mettle of the German navy, or at least vessels and crews forming part of it, and in each case the German vessels and their crews have borne themselves gallantly and worthily. I refer more particularly to the loss of the Itlis in Chinese waters, the little crew meeting its doom with cheers for their emperor and the singing in chorus of a patriotic hymn. Whenever the German navy forcibly interfered during the past 15 years. it did so efficiently, unflinchingly, and n a spirit of Spartan bravery. It is known that the German Emper-

He has so zealously devoted himse to the task of becoming a naval expert, both theoretically and practically, ever since he ascended the throne, that he has, according to the statements of all the German, English, French, Russian and American naval officers who have met him, really attained his goal There is no ruler of the present day

who is a match for him in this respec Nothing new and interesting in naval things escapes his keen eye shrewd attention. Just to cite a point in illustration, I may say that the Emperor was one of the first to discern the great importance of Capt. Mahan's (U.S.N.) books on the influence of na-vies on national greatness, and that he at once carefully studied these books and had copies of them incorporated in the libraries of the naval academies and schools throughout Ger-It is a further proof of the great virtue he attaches to the growing prestige of his navy that he made his only brother Prince Henry, adopt the naval career, and that, in the course of time, a number of German princes will follow suit in this respect, for some younger members of several reigning houses in Germany—those of Baden, Mecklenburg and Ogdenburg, for instance—are now serving as na-val cadets, and two of the Emperor's

own sons are intended to enter the in realizing all his naval plans, at least so far as size of the navy is concerned, remains to be seen. Probably he will have to defer a part of them, for to carry them out now, at a time when the military budget is becoming larger each year, would place an almost unbearable burden of taxation on ple. But in the end he will doubtless succeed in the main. The German war vessels of the latest type, the ironclads of the Woerth and Sachsen class, are certainly marvels of me-chanical ingenuity and monsters in formidable fighting capacity. At the Krupp works in Essen, where

experiments are being made all the time, a foreman in the ordinance department, Krause by name, made the invention and the multi-millionaire owner of the establishment purchased this invention of his outright. Not many weeks ago the Emperor visited the Krupp works at the special invi tation of the owner, and afterwards witnessed the tests made on a large scale with those new quick-firing guns on the enormous shooting territory of Meppen, near Essen. These practical Meppen, near Essen. These practical tests occupied one whole day and the forenoon of the succeeding one, and they were successful beyond anything the Emperor had imagined. Such genius had not existed thus far. Technical difficulties which it seemed impossible to overcome had prevented the construction as well as the placing of

struction as well as the placing of them on board ship. Beyond the ten and tweive centimeter caliber none of these quick-firing guns could apparently be safely made. On the shooting territory of Meppen this fall, however, Krupp produced quick-firing guns of 15, 18, 21 and 24 centimeter calibre, and the work they did was so magnificent and exact as to earn the enthusiastic encomiums of the imper-

ial eyewitness. An arrangement has now been en tered into with Krupp, by the terms of which he will manufacture these quick-firing guns for the German army exclusively during a term of years, thus giving Germany an im portant start over the other navies

Orders to the tune of 20,000.000 marks were at once placed with Krupp, and additional sums will be voted by the reichstag during the next five years, for the Emperor means to arm all his navy with the new quick-firers.

PHILIP MELANCHTHON.

The Celebration of the 460th Anniversary

of His Birth. Lutherans in every part of the world versary of the birth of Melanchthon who was born at Bretten, in the Grand Duchy of Baden, Feb. 16, 1497. Melanchthon holds a place only a little below that of Martin Luther in the history of the Lutheran Church. He was Luther's associate in the reformation, and is regarded as the greatest of Lutheran scholars and theologians, Luther himself thought Melanchthon the ablest man of his time and superior to the great men of any church.





Un-til the end of his life he cherished the hope of reconciliation between the branches of the Christian Church which could be accomplished by concession, and this made him unpopular with all the doctrinaries. Luther and Melanchthon, however, remained friends until the older man's death, when Melanchthon delivered a magnificent funeral oration on the dead leader, in which he called him the prophet Elijah and lamented his death as a great calamity to the Church of

Opposition to his policy increased after Luther's death, and when Melanchthon died, on April 19, 1560, he welcomed death as a release. He was buried at Wittenburg by the side of Luther.



Celebrations in England Soon to Begin and Others to Follow Them.

is an unusual thing, even in England where revolutions have been rare and where the present royal family is of great longevity. George I. reigned 12 years; George II., 33 years; George III., 59 years and 3 months; George IV., 10 years; William IV., 7 years; Edward III. reigned 50 years; Henry VII., 38 years; Mary 5 years, 8,006,305 and Elizabeth 44 years. In honor of 111,560 the Queen's 60 years' reign many 1,368 patriotic Englishmen are already preparing celebrations and festivities designed to show the increase of England's influence and her progress in commerce and the mechanical arts since 1837. Great preparations have been made for the international elec-trical and engineering exhibition at Newcastle-on-Tyne. The progress and development in electrical and other branches of industry since 1837 will be illustrated there. Newcastle is well chosen for this purpose, because not only is it a great center of manufacturing industry, but it is representa-tive of many of those interests which have grown most notably since 1837. Beginning in April a similar exhibi-tion will be held at Blackpool. This exhibition will be less representative of the mechanical advance in England than of the growth of the country in other directions. Since 1837 the increase in the population of England, including Wales, has been from 15, 000,000 to 29,000,000. The population of Scotland in 1837 was 2,700,000, is now 4,000,000; but Ireland, which had at that time a population of 8,000,000, has now only 4,700,000.

From 1837 to 1897 the population of Target has increased from 1,700,000.

London has increased from 1,700,000 5,000,000. Liverpool has grown from 200,000 to 600,000; Manchester, from 220,000 to 405,000; and Newcastle, where the first of the celebrations are to be held, from 68,000 to 190,000. 



THE FISHERIES

Washington, D. C., Feb. 26.-The President has sent to Congress a reof the commissioners appointed under the act of 1892 to examine into the condition and recommend the best method of protecting fisheries in con-tiguous waters of the United States and Canada.

"Our observations," they say, "have clearly demonstrated the inexpediency Friday and of attempting to regulate any of the fisheries herein discussed by a rigid code of enactments, owing to their constantly changing character, and Saturday Sale conditions, and we therefore urge, in the event of joint action by the two Governments, that a permanent joint committee, to be composed of compe-A Crockery Clean-Up. tent experts, be provided, which shal be charged with the direct supervision of these fisheries, and shall be empowered to conduct investigations and modify regulations as circumstances require."
