Only One Ballot Necessary —The Blundering School Legislation Attacked.

[By Our Own Reporter.] Mount Brydg :s, Jan. 31 .- Mr. Duncar C. Ross, barrister, of Strathroy, and son of the ex-Premier of Ontario, was today nominated by the Liberals of West Middlesex to carry their standard in the constituency, so long and ably filled by his illustrious father. The nomination was a unanimous one and was made by one of the largest gatherings of Liberals ever held in the historic old town hall of Mount Brydges

The building was filled to overflowing and it was necessary at times to throw the doors open for the purpose of facilitating the breathing of those within, and upon such occasions it was not infrequently the case that certain over-zealous Conservatives made their way to the hall door and shouted at the speakers. But the Liberals paid no attention to the interruptions, good naturedly going on with the business

Hon, G. W. Ross' Farewell

To the West Middlesex Liberal Association:

Gentlemen,-Owing to my appointment to the Senate of Canada, my place in the Legislative Assembly of Ontario as your representative becomes vacant. I deeply regret that I am unable to continue the full term to which you elected me two years ago, and were it not for the disability to serve you to the full measure of the strength of former years, no consideration on my part would have moved me to accept the appointment which severs our relations.

You have honored me as few men in Canada have been honored. It is now nearly 35 years since I was first chosen as your representative. Again and again, through eleven different elections you have repeated that early expression of confidence and good will, and although my course may have called for much forbearance on your part, you never wavered in your loyalty and devotion to the candidate of your choice. Under these circumstances and with the recollections which they naturally recall, you will in some measure understand my feelings in severing my connection with you. There is scarcely a home in West Middlesex which at one time or another I have not entered, and in which, irrespective of political differences, I have not been kindly received. And although many of those to whom I owed so much and who were most active in my early campaigns have passed away, I have found their successors equally devoted to myself and to the principles I represent.

My career as your representative has not been one of leisure or repose. Although I may not have accomplished all that you had a right to expect, and left undone some "" which might have been fairly expected of me, kindly assume that it has been owing to the limitation of human effort rather than to indifference on my part. Should a generous public ever regard my course in Parliament as one of any value, to the people of Canada, I desire that to you, more than to myself, should be given the honor of my humble services.

May I hope that in parting with you, West Middlesex will for many years feel that the interests of the country can be best served through the Liberal party and the principles it rep-



Ottawa, Jan. 31. - Consideration of the remaining part of the tariff schedule practically monopolized today's session of the House of Commons, and progress in committee was so rapid that before adjournment Mr. Fielding was able to announce that he hoped the tariff would be disposed of next week. A considerable number of items, some of them of a contentious character, have been allowed to stand over for further consideration, but the Finance Minister appreciates the undesirability of delay, and expects that a final decision on these items will be reached in a few days. The discussion today was largely confined to articles classed as cottons and wools, and reference was made to the change which discontinues free import of goods for Government use. Mr. Fielding explained that the principal reason for the change was that the former practice of allowing such articles to be imported free had been abused. Items connected with shipping had been allowed to stand over to permit of representation in favor of special legislation being





AN EXPERIMENT AT WASHINGTON

People's Labby a New Move in U. S. Politics.

New York, Jan. 30 .- A remarkable experiment is the People's Lobby, which is now at work in Washington. It is the fruit of the best kind of muck-raking, and is big with promise. Whether it will prove superior to other human institutions that have been conceived in an equally exalted spirit, only to flatten out to a fair average of usefulness and virtue after a few years' experience, is a matter for the future to decide. One need not predict an unhappy fate for the People's Lobby. Its enemies may be trusted to show up its supposed failings and weaknesses Its friends, the general public of the United States, and the lovers of good government everywhere, regard it with hope, and whether it can fulfill all its great ambitions or not, there is no doubt that it can accomplish great good, and will do so if it gets a square

The idea of a People's Lobby seems to have originated with Lincoln Steffens, the celebrated muck-raker of McClure's Magazine, but was communicated to the public in the Success Magazine. Last winter Mr. Steffens spent at Washington trying to keep a watchful eye on the legislators, but he found that one man could not do real, effective work. 
