Budapest Administration, According to Reports From Vienna, Falls As Result of Resolution Organized and Carried Out by Either the So cialists or Bourgeois.

Vienna, April 7.—The Hungarian Communist Government in Budapest has been overthrown, according to rumors current in official circles, the newspapers say. Bela Hun, the foreign minister is reported to have been assassinated.

The reports do not say whether the attempted revolution in Budapest was organized by the Socialists or the bourgeoise parties.

Berlin, April 5.-While admitting of fighting to maintain the imperial reformer Emperor William, published in the Freiheit, that there were enough loyal troops to have marched on Aix-la-Chapelle and Cologne and put down the revolution. The count says that Field Marshai von Hindenburg and Gen. Groener, Prussian war minister, would not assume the responsibility for such a move, however, arguing that things had gone too far, and that only the abdication of former Emperor William could save the situation. The emperor, he says, was emphatic in declaring he did not desire a civil war, and that he would not call upon the army to engage in such a conflict.

Ownership of Territory Be

London, April 7.—The Ukrainians are willing to cease fighting the Poles if a plebiscite to decide the ownership of territory in dispute between the two republies is arranged under the control of the Entente, according to a statement made by M. Holubovitch, premier of West Ukraine, quoted in a Vienna dispatch to the Mail under date of March 31.

Early reports indicated that no one was wounded by the shooting, aithough several rioters and policemen were injured by sticks, stones and clubs.
