Wannipeg, Mar., Sept. 21.—The Winnipeg Telegram yesterday pub-isred the following: In absolute defiance of the school laws of the province Liennapites of the Houston district, who appealed to the privy council early this summer for separate schools, are refusing to send their children to the public schools recently opened in the district. This is the giat of a report made today by F. J. Greenway, assistant deputy of education, who has just completed an inspection trip of the entire Mennonite

"Through pressure brought to bear upon the people by the priests of the district, there has been a solid resistance against sending their children to school offered by the community, with the result that we are now forced to start prosecution." Mr. Greenway announced, "and the matter has ten placed in the hands of the attendance officers, and will be dealt with according to our school laws."

TURKS AND ARABS LAUNCH ATTACKS AGAINST FRENCH

Adana Is Being Besieged By Force of Ten Thousand.

USING GERMAN GUNS

Hand-To-Hand Fighting Going On in South Asia Minor Cities.

Constantinople, Sept. 21.—Turkish Nationalists in Southern Asia Minor are continuing their fight against French troops of occupation there. Tea thousand Turks and Arabs are besieging Adana, and others are daily shelling Tarsus with old 5-inch German guns, which are operated by German officers who have been stranded there since the armistice. Frequent attacks are being made on Mersina, southwest of Adana, but have been repuised by the fire from the guns of French battleships in the guns of French battleships in the

French military officials are dealing diplomatically with the people, and are granting amnesty to former residents of Adana who wish to desert the National Adams of Adana who wish to desert the National Adams of Adana who wish to desert the National Adams of Adams diplomatically with the people, and are granting amnesty to former residents of Adana who wish to desert the Nationalists and return home. Hand-to-hand fighting frequently occurs at Adana, the French Senegalese and also the Turks and Arabs cutting off the heads of the fallen to be sure they are dead. There is no report, however, of torture being inflicted. The French have driven back the besiegers, and have established their lines five miles to the west of the city, but the Turks and Arabs continue their assaults under the protection of vineyards and orange groves.

Gains Valuable Strategic Positions in South Russia.

WAS SUDDEN ATTACK

Anti-Bolshevik Forces Are Now Menacing Alexandrovsk.

Constantinople, Sept. 21. - Gen. Wrangel's latest cavalry drive against the Bolsheviki in South Russia has won him valuable strategic positions on the railway and resulted in the capture of more than 2,000 prisoners and quantities of supplies, it is reported in advices from the Crimea.

The South Russian cavalry, by a sudden dash, surprised the Bolsheviki, and captured the railway junction of Petro-paylovsk, with sections of the line in either direction as well as the town of

Pay For It.

Writing to The Advertiser from Lonon, England, regarding the market for Ontario fruit, G. C. Creelman, agentgeneral for the province, says:

"I have just been to Covent Garden Market and have interviewed some of the big fruit dealers there. They say that this country will have to rely upon

that this country will have to rely upon imported fruit next winter and spring. This means that there will be a good market here for all kinds of orchard products this fail. In England only about one apple tree in ten has a crop of any kind, and what little there is is of a very inferior grade. The information given out from the Government offices is that 5 per cent of last year's crop is a fair estimate.

Only Fair Crop.

"The reports from France are for a fair crop of apples, but recent severe storms have badly injured the prospects in some sections. Holland and Belgium expect a 50 per cent crop; Portugal and Spain well below the average.

"The maximum fixed price in Great Britain for some time has been 9d (18 cents) a pound, retail. Today this has been lifted, and there will be no control of prices of apples until the 15th of November. On that date 10d (20 cents) a pound will be the fixed price for some time.

"The Government has also fixed the maximum price which British buyers may pay for Ontario apples, viz.:

"Sixty-eight shillings (\$16.32) per barrel of rot less than 120 pounds.

"Twenty-one shillings and sixpence (\$5.16) per box of not less than 37 pounds.

"Twenty-three shillings and sixpence (\$5.64) per box of not less than 40 Founds.
"Sixty shillings (\$14.40) per hundred-weight for all other packages.
"I would advise that farmers secure

weight for all other packages.

"I would advise that farmers secure their barrels, boxes, etc., now, and get ready for the fall picking and packing.

"The buyers should also see that no orchards are overlooked and that no fruit is allowed to rot on the ground.

Hungry for Apples.

"It is with the hope of markets like this that the Ontario fruit grower planted and has since cared for his orchard. It will be a pity if he does not reap the tenefit of it now. The people of Britain are hungry for apples, and are willing and able to pay for them.

"It is not necessary to warn the shippers of the scarcity of space on coean vessels. The situation is improving, but application must still be made early for accommodation at the Atlantic seaboard."

J. H. Cunningham Believes Tariff of Canada Should Be More Flexible.

VANCOUVER, Sept. 20 .- (By Canadian Press).-A. B. Weeks, president, and J. H. Cunningham, vice-president of the Manufacturers' Association British Columbia, urged strongly at the afternoon session of the tariff commission that a permanent tariff commission that a permanent tariff board should be appointed, whose duty it should be to devote their whole attention to tariff matters, and, from time to time, make necessary adjustments where it was found these were required in the interests of industry. Sir Henry Drayton, chairman of the commission, desired most keenly to know just what a board could do, for it was obvious it could not exercise any influence in the fluctuations of the market.

Should Be More Flexible.

Mr. Cunningham was not prepared to say just what might be accomplished by the board, but he urged that, as Canada was now entering into competition with the rest of the world, raw materials should be allowed to come in duty free, and that a board could remedy any hardship in case a certain commodity was temporarily unobtainable in the country by allowing it to come in duty free from other countries. The tariff of Canada, he believed should be more flexible. Fifty per cent of the manufacturers' costs were made up of duty and freight charges.

TORONTO, Sept. 20.—The Congress of Chambers of Commerce of the Em-pire this morning discussed the cre-ation of a permanent bureau of stan-dardized information on all colonial ation of a permanent bureau of standardized information on all colonial methods of valuing imports and exports, and decided on its establishment. The resolution was accompanied by protests against the exclusion of the Dominions and dependencies from representation on the imperial shipping committee. 


