



Prof. Dorland Delivers Lecture at University Extension Course.

Declares Future Peace Depends On League of Nations.

That the future peace of the world, and civilization itself, rests on the league of nations at Genoa, and upor the dominions of the British Empire which too is a league of nations, is the opinion Professor A. G. Dorland voiced Wednesday night in the public library, when speaking on "The Character and Meaning of the British Empire," under the auspices of the Western University extension de-"I think," said Professor Dorland

In every colony of the empire the political dominance of Britain has been resisted, he said, and such resistance culminated in the revolt of the New England States in 1775.

Prof. Dorland asserted that at the time of the revolt, statesmen had considered colonial autonomy as abpire, the only two statesmen who saw differently at the time being William Pitt, the Younger, and Edmund Burke. Pitt had said at the time in onquer America."

When the colonies became free they faced the difficult task of creating a central government with which to give unity to the different states, ye having for each of the states its self government. Eventually they drew up a form of government which proved eminently successful which gave federal unity, yet the widest possible freedom in their own local roblems, said the professor.
Professor Dorland showed how the

United Empire Loyalists, coming to Canada, after the rebellion, brought with them a spirit which demanded more, and even as much, self govern-

self government, commenting on the constitutional act of 1791 with its defects, then the rebellion of 1837, the case being adjourned until Weds which resulted in the sending of Lord Durham to Canada, after which he prepared his famous report, a report so worthy that it should be the duty of every Canadian to read.

The Durham report recommended fullest autonomy without any external dictation and the result was the act of union of which Edmund





# AWAIT LONDON CRISIS OUTCOME

Leaders at British Capital at Loss to Solution of Political Tangle.

YOUNGER HOLDS DESTINY

Lloyd George's Resignation Certain if Conservative Party Schism Is Remedied.

LONDON, March 2.-The political crisis projected by the prime minister yesterday has made no progress toprediction as to how it will eventually

In its essence it is more a personal conflict between Premier Lloyd George and Sir George Younger. leader of the Conservative secessionists, than a symptom of the struggle on the part of the three principal eral and Labor, to abandon the coalition system, which is generally con sidered to have outlived its usefulness, and get back to the old party

In this struggle Mr. Lloyd George occupies a somewhat anomalous position, inasmuch as, although head of the government, he has no direct control of the party funds or the electoral machinery, since he is the accepted leader of neither the Conservative nor the Liberal parties, each wing of the coalition having retained its own party machinery.

Sir George Younger is chairman of the Unionist organization, which controls the party funds, and represents the whole Conservative party of the country. He was appointed to that position by Andrew Bonar Law, who, although he retired from the leader-ship of the House of Commons on account of illhealth, is still titular leader of the Conservative party as whole. Younger therefore cannot be dethroned except by a vote of the whole party, and, if he elects to stand firm, will continue to control the

party's funds. The revolt includes about 50 of the "die hard" members of the House of Commons, but it has the sympathy of a great number of the other Conservative members and their follow

ing in the country.

Presumably, therefore, the crisis will continue until a meeting of the whole Conservative party is held. Stand No Chance.

Sir George Younger and his adherents are credited with being fully aware that they stand no chance at present with the electorate, but would prefer to be in opposition rather than continue an arrangement in which they are powerless to advance their own policy in the coalition. On the other hand the ministers, both Conservative Liberal, are anxious to maintain the coalition government in power be-cause they consider there is little prospect of the government being

In connection with agriculture, the olution asked that the settlement f the vast areas of fertile land in he north should be made without hampering restrictions, in such a sirable settlers. It further suggested that where careful examination showed that townships now opened agriculture, then steps should be aken to secure new land for the homesteaders located in these areas and to assist in moving them to more suitable locations, allowing their original land to revert to the Furthermore, it was asked that a comprehensive survey be made unsettled lands still retained by the crown. All such lands not suitble for agriculture should be withfrawn from location and reserved for its timber and mineral value.

Condemns Present System. The resolution also condemned the present system for the sale and disposal of timber as having proved wasteful and extravagant. It recommended that closer co-operation should be established between the timber licenses and the government in order to conserve young and growing timber. The present system of fire-ranging was claimed to be utterly inadequate and to be not producing value for the money ex-

The convention also reaffirmed the stand taken in 1919 on roads, water powers and fish hatcheries.

As for mining, the delegates went on record as favoring the provision of adequate transportation facilities in remote districts together with the testing up new areas by diamond drilling. It also asked that everything possible be done to encourage prospecting by individuals. 



Normal eyesight is difficult to define, but assuming you have average sight you can, with the naked eye, see the whites of other people's eyes at thirty yards.

At eighty yards you can just see their eyes. When all parts of people's bodies are distinguishable you should see them at one hundred yards

When the outlines of their faces are only just visible the distance is two hundred yards.

When the face just becomes indistinguishable the person will probably be four hundred yards off. At six hundred yards away a group of people should be distinguished singly, but farther than

this, no detail of the human form, can, as a rule, be noted. At six hundred yards one with good eyesight should be able to tell a man on horseback from a

At a distance of two thousand yards the object seems simply a dot on the landscape and is often not discernible. Of course, atmospheric conditions are a leading factor.
