The Death of Mr. Sutherland. The late Hon, James Sutherland was

erland's death. The ties between the Premier and his colleague were more than official. They were cemented by the deepest friendship, which grew during the years when the fortunes of the Liberal party were at the lowest ebb, and when the steadfastness of the member for North Oxford was a great asset to the party and its chieftain. Entering Parliament in 1881, Mr. Sutherland, during his long period in Opposition, maintained an unfailing serenity and established himself in the affections of the House of Commons, without regard to creed or politics. He was unselfish, unobtrusive, and always ready to sacrifice himself in the interests of his party, his friends, and particularly of his leader, who greatly relied upon his counsel and gave him an unreserved confidence. This magnanimity of character drew men to him and disarmed his enemies, if, indeed, he ever had an enemy, public or private. No man was in a stronger position to claim his reward when the Liberal party got into power, but he showed his usual self-effacement, and it is understood declined a place in Sir Wilfrid Laurier's first cabinet, feeling that this would lighten the task of the Premier in forming a ministry, when there were other men whose services called for recognition. He did not take a portfolio until 1902. As an administrator he was remarkable for his untiring and painstaking industry. It is probable that he undermined his work, and his untimely end is a warning, all too familiar, that the strongest constitution cannot persistently defy

Sad News From Woodstock.

A TRIBUTE FROM MR. BORDEN 'LIQUID SUNSHINE" TREATMENT,

Ottawa, May 3. - Genuine sorrow is manifest d in political and department. al circles over Mr. Sutherland's death. No man in public life had fewer enemies, and certainly none had so many friends on both sides of politics. The deceased minister can be properly styled a martyr to public duty. He would enter his office at 10:30 or 11 o'clock in the morning, and remain until 7 o'clock in the evening. Perhaps the feeling that he lacked the nervous energy which prompts to swift execution made him more conscientious. Canada had no more faithful servant in the ministry. He gave ungrudgingly of his time to the public

service. He gave even more than that -he sacrificed his life. Sir Wilfrid and his colleagues are greatly shocked over the sad event. The Prime Minister was moved profoundly, and no one could see his dis-play of emotion today without being affected by it. Sir Wilfrid's invariable practice is never to give interviews, and therefore no expression of opinion was sought from him in regard to Mr. Sutherland's death.

Sir Wilfrid said: "I have to inform the House, Mr. Speaker, that I have just received a telegram informing me of the death of Mr. Sutherland, Min. ister of Public Works. I have to say to the House that, personally, in losing Mr. Sutherland. I lose one of the truest friends I ever had, and I know that the House loses one of its most valued members. I will meet, I am sure, the feelings of the House if I endeavor to say that the House should express its sympathy in this bereavement in some suitable manner, and I do not know that it can be done in any other way than by the House adjourning to attend his funeral. OTTAWA MOURNS RAYS MAY CURE DOCTOR HARPER

Witnesses Absent, But Court Premier Greatly Affected by Cancerous Growth Has Diminished 60 Per Cent.

Hopes That It Will Shortly Disappear-Experiments Made Before

Doctors at New York Hosp'tal.

New York, May 3. - President William R. Harper, of the University of Chicago, who is visiting this city, submitted to an X-ray examination yesterday at the hands of Dr. William J. Morton. The examination was made to find out the effects of what is known as the fluorescent treatment, which Dr. Harper has been undergoing for the internal cancerous growth with which he is afflicted, and which the surgeons found it impossible to remove.

Dr. Harper arrived from Chicago on Sunday, accompanied by Dr. Frank Billings, his physician, and the examination took place at Dr. Morton's office at 19 West Twenty-eighth street. According to President Harper and Dr. Billings, remarkable results were shown. By means of the X-rays measurements were made of the diseased area, and it was found, so it was an-nounced, that this had decreased in size in the three weeks of the treatment from eighteen square inches to only seven square inches, or had dereased more than half. Measurements aken ten days ago on the occasion of or. Harper's last visit here showed hat the diseased area was twelve square inches, so that the rapidity of batement which surprised the physicians then has continued. The examnation also disclosed that the diseased area is entirely free from contact with the abdominal walls. While the physicians would not say as much yesterday, it is known that they are in hopes that at the next examination, which will probably be made two-weeks from now, the growth will have disappeared. Whether this would mean a complete cure can only be a matter of conjecture until time determines. Dr. Billings said yesterday that the examination had shown remarkable

"What is more," said Dr. Billings, 'President Harper's general health has continued to improve all the time as the disease area has continued to decrease. He has increased in weight from 170 to 182 pounds, which is re-markable in itself. We have great hopes from the treatment."

There was very little trace of the sick man about President Harper yesterday. He looked stout and well. "I am certainly feeling fine," he said at the Hotel Manhattan. "I have at the Hotel Manhattan. gained in weight and yet have been working eight hours a day like any other man. It is very remarkable when you think that my life was despaired of only a few weeks ago. I shall remain here two or three days, and hope that time to have a talk McBurney, who performed the opera-tion in Chicago."

The fluorescent treatment which Dr Harper is taking has sometimes been described as "liquid sunshine." It consists of administering internally a certain medicine which becomes radio active when the X-rays are applied from without. Through this a new set of radiations, according to Dr. Morton, is set up within the tissues. The most byious of these radiations is light itself or what is closely akin to it, Dr. Morton says. While this treatment has been tried recently in a few other cases, it is said that the results attained in Dr. Harper's case had not been known before.

An attempt to cure an external canwith radium was made at a clinic held at Flower Hospital yesterday by Harvey King, of the staff of that in stitution. The clinic was attended by a small number of students and doctors, among the latter being half a dozen women.

Dr. King has been experimenting with radium recently, using, as he described yesterday, radium pencils, invented by Prof. Liebler, a chemist, of this city. Dr. Liebler has found a solvent for radium, so Dr. King announced, and has succeeded in getting a coating of radium on the outside of celluloid tubes, protecting this with a substance which does not interfere with the activity of the rays. MATTER OF PAVING **DUNDAS STREET**

This Long-Neglected Work Soon To Be Taken Up by the Council.

It is understood that the council will take up in the near future the matter of paving Dundas street from Wellington street east to Adelaide. The roadway is in a bad condition, and is an absolute disgrace to the city. The paving of the street has been delayed in the past through a dispute between the city and the property-owners regarding a sewer which runs along the thoroughfare. This sewer was built about 21 years ago, under a 25-year debenture issue, and the people have still to pay some four years on it. The sewer was never properly constructed, however, and for some years it has been caving in and causing the residents of the street a great deal of trou-ble. That it will have to be reconstructed all are ready to agree, and as it is not yet paid for, and as it was a botch job of a former city engineer the prop-erty-owners declare that it should be reconstructed out of the general funds. This the city refuses to do, though the board of works upon one occasion did offer to pay one-half the cost of a new sewer. The property-owners feel that they are not being properly treated, however, and they absolutely refuse to

compromise on the subject. And, of course, until the sewer question is settled it is useless to talk pavement to the people on the street.

Another difficulty exists in the block between Wellington and Waterloo, On the south side of the street residences predominate, and the sidewalk runs outside a neat boulevard. On the north side are many stores, and for business reasons the people prefer to have the sidewalk run close to the frontage line. 
