THE STRIKERS FIGHT FIRE

They Work Hard To Extinguish Big Blaze At Docks

\$500,000 Damage Done By Flames-Morgan Piers Destroyed

New York, May 18.—Fire last night destroyed the piers of the Morgan Line, owned by the Southern Pacific Railway, on the Hudson River, at the foot of Canal street, Manhattan. A large quantity of the freight stored on the pier and in the sheds, was destroyed, and several ships which were berthed there narrowly escaped. The loss will reach \$500,000.

The firemen worked shoulder to shoulder with hundreds of striking longshoremen from other piers, who did all that was possible to save the freight stored under the sheds. The Morgan Line was the first of the lines reaching New York to grant the demands of the striking stevedores.

SHOT AT BYSTANDER.

Strikers Threaten to Lynch Detective
Whe Used Revelver.

New York, May 18.—A fatal shooting and an attempt to lynch the man who fired the shot marked the strike of longshoremen in Hoboken yester-day.

The man who lost his life was an innocent bystander, Harry Marshall. He
was struck by a bullet fired by Benj.
Vincent, a private detective, who had
been employed on one of the docks
affected by the strike. Vincent shot at
some strikers with whom he had quarreled and by whom he was being purmed.

reted and by whom he was being pursued.

The trouble began when Vincent entered a saloon near the docks and asked for a drink. As the bartender passed the bottle to him, one of several striking longshoremen, who were in the saloon, shouted, "Don't give it to him; he's a scab." Vincent denied the charge, but the bartender refused to serve him.

Just what happened then is not known, but a moment later Vincent dashed fno the street with a revolver in his hand, and a crowd of strikers at his heels. As he reached the street he turned and fired. Marshall was standing on the sidewalk, and the second bullet from Vincent's revolver struck him in the head and killed him instantly.

When Marshall dropped to the side-walk the strikers started toward Vincent with cries of "Lynch him, lynch him." Vincent sped down the street with the revolver still clutched in his hand, and the angry crowd only a few feet behind him.

When a policeman barred his way the fugitive brandished his revolver as if about to fire, but the policeman was took quick for him and sent him rolling into the street with a bullet in his leg.

When the furious pursuers came up and demanded that the man be turned over to them, the policeman held them back with his revolver. He stood over the prostrate detective and held the mob in check until several other policemen arrived.

Montreal, May 18.—The longshoremen met last night and for over five hours discussed the offer made by the shippers in the afternoon to grant an increase of two and a half cents an hour and leave the rest to arbitration board.

The result of the meeting was that the men again turned down the offer of the shipping companies, although they were strongly advised to accept it.

SOCIALISTS SUCCESSFUL.

With Anti-Semites Will Be Powerful In New House.

Vienna, May 17.—The returns from the elections held Tuesday through-out Austria are not yet complete, but show conclusively that the most pow-erful parties in the Lower House of Parliament that will assemble June 12 will be the Socialists and anti-Semites.

The success of the anti-Semites has not been so remarkable, but atill it is

ne success of the anti-Semites has not been so remarkable, but still it is great. They numbered twenty-six representatives in the old House, and they have already fifty-nine seats in the new, with thirty candidates in the re-ballots.

re-ballots.
Consequently, there are two distinct features to be seen in the coming House—a Socialist party, possibly 70 strong, and an anti-Semitic clerical centre, numbering perhaps 30 or 90, as the German clericals, who secured 26 seats, always make a common cause with the anti-Semites. Herr Von Machet, the Minister of Public Instruction, has resigned in consequence of his defeat at the polls.



DECLINE TO ARBITRATE

Longshoremen Refuse to Accept Advance Offered.

Federation of Shippers Would Give Two and a Half Cents an Hour More-Men Are Firm for Five Cents -Freight Handlers Also Go Out 350 Leave Work and Join the

Montreal, May 17.—The federation of shippers and the C. P. R. offered the longshoremen an advance of 21-2 cents per hour yesterday, but the men, after due consideration, not only refused to accept the advance, but also declined an offer to arbitrate, and the following is the document:

"The shipping federation of Canada and the C. P. R. Co. submit offer without prejudice of an increase ir wages to the longshoremen of the port of Montreal of 21-2 cents per hour worked day and night on the understanding that these rates are to remain in force till the last ocean vessel sails from Montreal season of 1907.

"If this is not acceptable then they are willing to arbitrate the question of wages, provided the workmen resume work forthwith, in which case the decision of the arbitrators will date from Friday, May 17, 1907, it being understood that the rates fixed by the arbitrators are to remain in force until the last ocean vessel sails from Montreal season of 1907, these two offers to remain open for acceptance till Friday, May 17, 1907, at noon.

A further complication was added by the freight handlers to the number of 350 "resigning" their various positions and leaving work. To signalize the occasion the men formed in parade order in front of the long-shoremen's headquarters and marched westward in Commissioners street to cast in their lot with their fellow workers, the Shedden Co.'s teamsters, who had previously "resigned" Wednesday morning. These men held forth at Nault's Hall in Guy street, and their action added to the general holiday aspect of the situation.

Miners to Test Act.

Vancouver, B. C., May 17.—Behind the miners of Marble Bay Island, in their fight with the management of the mines, stands the Western Federation of Miners, which, since March 25, the date on which the men quit work, has been supplying them with strike pay. The men declare that the fight is practically out of their hands, and that any settlement reached will have to be negotiated through the Western Federation.

The decision of the mine owners to commence criminal prosecution of the men under the provisions of the Dominion Industrial *Investigation Act, will bring all the power of the Western Federation to bear to render the act imperative in this cose.

Submarines Stand Test.

Newport, R. I., May 17.—With all hands well and contented, with a hountiful supply of fresh air, and with records of submergence broken, the submarines, Actopus and Lake, rose to the surface of Narragansett Bay at

submarines, Actopus and Lake, rose to the surface of Narragansett Bay at 4 o'clock yesterday morning, ending a test of 24 hours under water.

The Octopus rose first, and the members of the naval trial board crowded about her as the conning tower hatch flew open. The members of the board at once went below to note conditions on board, and to test the air supply. Samples of air were bottled every two hours throughout the test for analysis by the board.

The Octopus blew out foul air only twice during the twenty-four hours she was at the bottom of the bay. It was computed that only one-forty-fifth of her air supply was exhausted. If these figures are correct they tend to show that the boat could main submerged 45 days, provided the food and fuel supply was sufficient.

LIQUOR SELLING ABOLISHED.

Clean Sweep of Taverns Between Fort William and Kenora.

Toronto, May 17.—Instead of cutting off only eight liquor licenses in the Rainy River district, between Fort William and Kenora during the double-tracking of the C. P. R. those points, the Government will close out thirteen. This action has been prompted by the desire of the Administration to protect the thousands of navvies, who will be employed on the work from the evils of indiscrim-

Kenora being an incorporated town will not be affected, but every other settlement in the prescribed territory will be left dry. The licenses to be cancelled are: Keewatin, three taverns, one shop; Wabigoon, two taverns and one shop; Dryden, two taverns; Vermilion Bay, Dinorwic, Gold Rock and Ignace, one tavern license each.

Eudo Saunders left the city last might for Ottawa, where he will appear before the license commissioners to present the desire of the Ontario Government that no license shall be issued in Nepean Township in the County of Carleton. Nepean voted on local option last January, and carried it, but the bylaw was set aside by the court. The commissioners have entertained a doubt as to whether the case was the kind from which the Government desired to withhold licenses.

RAMS INEFFECTIVE.

Warships That Have Them Do Not

It is proposed to omit the ram from the battleships of the Lord Nelson type and the cruisers of the Minotaur class, says a London dispatch to the Philadelphia Ledger. The ram is a weapon that has played a prominent part in naval warfare and appeals to the popular imagination, but it is regarded as effective no longer. It came into general use with the Hotspur class. These were battleships of 4,000 tons, with a speed of eight knots. A vessel of this displacement and speed might have many opportunities of ramming an adversary, but the service men of today regard the weapon as a troublesome incumbrance.

"Take a ship like this," said the captain of one of the cruisers this week. "Here is a hull with a dead weight of 10,000 tons and a maneuvering speed of eighteen knots. Work out the momentum of such a blow as we could give, and the figures will make your brain reel. Before you can ram your ship you must catch her. With the high speed tactics of the present day this is practically an impossibility. You could only catch her if she were disabled, and no man would ram a

helpless ship,

London, May 17.—(C. A. P.)—Professor Leacock spoke to the Victoria League on the question of Canada. Mr. Haldane, moving the vote of thanks, said it had been calculated that Canada, before the end of the century, would possess a population of 60,000,000. What a power!

It might be that Macaulay's famous vision would be realized and the centure of empire be transferred elsewhere, but if development went on the right lines it would be the development of the same empire by the same people, permeated with a deeper sense of unity.

The Archbishop of Canterbury has again drawn attention to the immense and grave problem of Canada. The men undertaking spiritual work going there are quite inadequate in numbers. London, May 17.—(C. A. P.)—At the annual meeting of the Navy League it was decided to abstain from appealing to the country to protest against the present naval policy of the Government charges and countercharges, flery speeches and angry interruptions were the features of the meeting.

H. F. Wyatt moved an amendment deeply deploring the diminution of naval strength involved in the reduction of the naval estimates. The evendment mentioned the abandonment of the Esquimalt and other naval stations. Mr. Wyatt told of the differences between himself and the majority of the committee.

Admiral Freemantle disagreed with the amendment, which was rejected by 44 to 27.





BEAUTY OF GRATITUDE

FAILURE TO APPRECIATE DAILY BLESSINGS IS A COMMON SIN.

THANKFULNESS IS OUR DUTY

On Life's Journey Many Kindnesses Are Needed-Too Often They Are Soon Forgotten - Thanksgiving Is Neglected - Story of the Lepers-Joyful Service the Highest Form of Praise.

He keeps saying to himself, "Oh, if I were only at the top, then the rest of my journey would be easy." Suddenly the trees ahead of him abruptly cease and instead of overtopping branches he sees the blue sky rimming the top of the mountain. With a final spurt he reaches the top. There, much to his surprise, upon the summit he finds a rude bench of stone upon which has been carved these words, "Rest and be thankful!" Yes, traveler, rest and be thankful that the hardest part of your toilsome journey is over. But also rest and be thankful because some good kind brother has made you the stone bench upon which you can rest your weary limbs and aching back. If the time should ever come when you can meet that thoughtful brother who made that seat and chiseled that invitation upon the ton of vonder mounthat thoughtful brother who that seat and chiseled that inmade that seat and chiseled that invitation upon the top of yonder mountain, tell him how much his work was appreciated. Tell him that the bench of stone not only gave you physical rest but that his words reminded you of a duty.

How much harder our lot would be if there were not some people considerate and kind to weary travelers on life's journey! Some people take the kindness gratefully, while others need the admonition, "Be thankful."

That means so to train our grateful memories that we will never forget the kindness of those who have helped us in the dark days of our past struggles. past struggles.

In other words, do we thank God that we have health and strength? Too often we neglect to do so until we have learned by pain and suffering the blessings we have lost. You who have suffered like the leper of my text or like scores and hundreds of us who have passed through years of pain and weakness then you know why I put the blessing of physical health in the forefront of this sermon.

Have you never by personal experience been able to picture the distress of this poor leper of my text before he was compelled to confess himself a hopeless leper? I have often. I have sometimes imagined him one of the stalwart men of the east. I have imagined him grow a healthy boy, a healthy young man, and then marry. He has a beautiful home, a dear wife and a couple of lovely children. All that is possible to make a young man's life happy as his. But one day while taking a bath he sees a little white spot just over his left shoulder. He does not think much of it at first. He tries to rub it away, but it will not rub off. Then in a week or two he sees that this small white spot is growing a little larger. He tries to massage it with a rough towel, but it will not rub off. Then in a left shoulder. He does not tell any one, even his wife. Now he cannot sleep well at night. He becomes cross and irritable. One night his wife misses him from her side. She gets up to find out where he is gone. She finds him in the next room bending over the sleeping c

One day he faints dead away. When the servants undress him to put him to bed, they find out his true condition. He is a leper, a doomed leper. Then they drive him out from the home. They drive him out from the habitations of man. They drive him out to live and die among the lepers. Thus you can see how grateful that leper ought to have been when Jesus brushed away the fatal scales of leprosy from off his breast and arms and neck and forehead. Do you wonder that that leper returned to thank God for his physical health?

Like the leper of old, are you grateful to God for that restored physical health? Remember there was a day when you would gladly have given every dollar you owned to be physically well as you are to-day. Now, are you glorifying God, like the leper of old, for your restored physical health? Oh, the inestimable blessings of a sound physical body! Who would dare to keep silent lips when God has thus blessed him with a sound physical frame?


