

GOVERNMENT HOUSE GONE

Ontario's Vice-Regal Palace Was the Scene of Brilliant Affairs. Ontario's Government House is now

Ontario's Government House is now a thing of the past. Where the state-ly old huilding once stood there is now a vista of piles of building material and prosaic freight-sheds are igrowing up like magio.

Many memories cling round the fine old mansion which is gone. Four generations, at least, knew the old Government House, and many grieve lat its disappearance. No house in Canada was so well fitted for the entertainment of the increasingly large and varied number of guests who were entertained within such hoswho were entertained within such hos-pitable portals. A glance backwards pitable portals. A glance backwards at the earlier regimes may be interesting to many who recall the Lieutenant-Governors of Ontario and their families. The house itself was not finished when the appointment of the first Lieutenant-Governor was made, and Major-Gen. Stisted lived in one of the four large houses (built by the late Str James Lukin Robinson) in Windson and Wallington streets. Windsor and Wellington streets, now the late famous Sir Richard Buriton, and her daughters were accomplished linguists and musicians.

In the first period of the reign of Mr. and Mrs. Howland (afterwards Sir William and Land Howland)

Sir William and Lady Howland) they had to continue living in their own home in Simcoe street (now the military beadquarters), and it was here that His Royal Highness Prince Ar-thur, now the Duke of Connaught, stayed on his first visit to Toronto. Mrs. Howland was a remarkably handsome woman, of extraordinary dignity of manner. During the visit of H. R. H. she asked Miss Macdougall (afterwards Mrs. Seymour, daughter of the late Hon. Wm. Macdougall, P.O.) to stay with her, to help to amuse her guests, having no daughters of her own; both the Misses Macdougall being bright and charming twomen.

One of the famous entertainments given by Sir William and Lady How-land was a huge reception given, in the evening at Government House, to the Grand Duke Alexis of Russia. It was, I think, the first of the kind held here; the grand duke and his host and hostess stood in a small drawing-room near the conservatory, the guests coming in from the farthest door in the large drawing-room, each name announced by the aide-de-camp, as he was then called, and passing on to the ballroom.

Owing to the fact that the order for curtseys had not yet been issued, the obeisances were many and varied!
Also the young ladies were then not so familiar with French as nowadays; so the only thing which H.I.H. deigned to remark to his hostess afterwards was: "The young ladies of Toronto were very pretty bit they Toronto were very pretty, but they should learn to curtsey, and speak French." Which may probably have had good effect!

Link With Culleden.

Miss Isabella Macdonald, whose Miss Isabella Macdonald, whose death occurred at Guelph recently, in her 98th year, had the unique distinction of being, in a sense a living link with the battle of Culloden, fought in 1746, just 177 years ago. Miss Macdonald, who was well known to members of Scottish societies in Toronto, had, as a child in Scotland, an opportunity of conversing with a widow almost 100 years old, of one of Bonnie Prince Charlie's followers, who lost his life in the conflict which destroyed the last hopes of the



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
