TO GAOL

The Fate of Mr. Miller Who Refuses to Answer a Straight Question--Liberal Members Seek to Prevent the Proceedure.

OTTAWA, Feb. 21.—Shortly before midnight R. C. Miller, Canada's first state prisoner, was sentenced by the Speaker of the House to confinement to the common jail of Carleton County, his term of confinement to be until prorogation, or at the order of the House.

After a debate which lasted until 12 o'clock, which was closed by impetuous speeches by the two party leaders, the Speaker put the Middleboro motion to the House, and it was carried without division. The prisoner was then at once called to the bar and the speaker read the sentence as contained in the motion.

Whether habeas corpus proceedings will have force over this judgment of Parliament, the highest court in the land, is an interesting legal point. Blockers Busy. Led by the remnants of the famous "blockers' brigade" of the public accounts committee, the Liberal Opposition yesterday made it patent that if their efforts can accomplish it the country will not know to whom Miller paid the \$41,026, which he swears, secured for him government business for the Diamond Light and Heating Company to the amount of \$17,000 in the last four years of the Liberal regime.

Mr. Miller, after two days' incarceration in the precincts of Parliament, appeared at the bar of the House yesterday, and again refused to answer the question put to him with regard to the \$41,026. He was perhaps, not quite as defiant in attitude as on Tuesday, but still in defiance of the House, he refused to answer that as his litigation, pending in Montreal courts would inevitably be affected by answering the question put to him, he should not be required to answer. A motion to commit him to Carleton County Jail followed immediately.

The Situation. This second and definite refusal of Parliament at once in the position of maintaining its dignity or of admitting that a witness in a committee of the House may exercise his own whim as to answering questions put to him. As Mr. Middleboro made the motion for commitment, he put it: "If a man can come before the public accounts commission and block all business by saying that the answer would hurt his private affairs, we might as well close up the committee."

Miller Eats His Dinner in the Carleton County Jail

Miller of Montreal, the now famous prisoner of state, ate dinner to-day in the Carleton county jail, to which he was removed early this morning on order of the Commons by Deputy Sergeant-at-Arms Bowie. There was no legal hitch at the jail and but little formality. Accompanied by Capt. Bowie and a Dominion policeman, Miller emerged from a rear door of the Commons building, and stepped into a closed sleigh. The party drove quickly to the Nicholas street institution, where the warrant of commitment was handed to Jailor Dawson and accepted without question. "This is Mr. Miller, the prisoner that was committed by the House," said Captain Bowie. "I suppose you won't object to shaking hands," said Miller to the jailer. "Not at all," returned Dawson, and after the introduction the prisoner was escorted to a cell in one of the

PANAMA CANAL

Over Two Million Cubic Yards of Earth are Sliding--Very Much Work Yet Remains to be Done.

(Courier Leased Wire) WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—More than 2,000,000 cubic yards of earth and rock are in motion along the Panama canal, and the slides are showing more than usual activity. This was the information received from the canal zone to-day. In addition to the slides, which will involve additional work before the water is turned into the canal, there still remains about 4,000,000 yards of excavation before the work is completed.

Turkish Troops are Perpetrating Atrocities

(Courier Leased Wire) SOFIA, Bulgaria, Feb. 21.—The Turkish troops are perpetrating massacres and committing unspeakable atrocities on the Christian population in the diocese of Tchatalja since the withdrawal of many of the Bulgarian troops from the front of the Turkish fortifications, according to a despatch from the Greek-Metropolitan of Tchatalja to the Bulgarian government to-day. The prelate declares that the surviving Christian inhabitants are fleeing in great numbers from their homes. Telegrams have also been received from the dean of the consular corps and from the Greek Metropolitan at Silivri announcing the massacre of over 100 men and women in the village of Konaminio.

Six Men in Winnipeg Nearly Overcome by Gas Fumes

(Courier Leased Wire) WINNIPEG, Feb. 21.—There was a scene of excitement at the city high pressure gas works yesterday afternoon when six men narrowly escaped asphyxiation. John Frowse went aloft on a high grating to do a regular task. He fell, overcome by fumes. Two other workmen rushed to his rescue but they too were overcome. Two others followed and then one more until six lay on the grating in danger of rolling off. One of the foremen had presence of mind enough to turn off the gas and smash some windows in the building. Two doctors and a posse of police were sent for and first aid administered.

It Costs Rockefeller About One Million to Prevent a Building Invasion

(Courier Leased Wire) NEW YORK, Feb. 21.—Approximately \$1,000,000 is the price just paid by John D. Rockefeller to block business invasion which he might regard as undesirable on the Fifth avenue corner adjoining his residence on West Fifty-fourth street. The property which the oil magnate bought included the residence of Dr. and Mrs. W. Seward Webb, and had been advertised for lease for business purposes. Mrs. Webb is a daughter of the late William H. Vanderbilt. Mr. Rockefeller will come into possession of the property May 1, and it is said he will tear down the Webb home and erect mercantile house so low in height as not to cut off light and air on the easterly side of his own home and adjoining a new home site of John D. Rockefeller, jr.

Two Old Time Actors Commit Suicide Together

(Courier Leased Wire) CHICAGO, Feb. 21.—"Old Bob" Irving and Charles Dickerson, old-time actors and each one the other's only friend in Chicago, were found dead together in a north side lodging house last night. The room was filled with gas. Irving years ago was considered a very clever character impersonator. He started in New York and had played with Sidney Drew, Harry Carey, Joseph Polk, and more recently with Lincoln J. Carter. Lately he lost his power to amuse an audience, and he slipped from engagement to another until finally he was obliged to take to the nickel shows. He was playing in one of the latter up to the time of his death. Dickerson left the stage years ago, and recently had obtained a precarious living at paperhanging.

**WHERE THE OCEAN BOILS.**

Upheavals That May Be Caused by Submarine Earthquakes.

Madriers say that in the midst of the Atlantic, about where the twenty-fifth meridian west from Greenwich crosses the equator, there lies a region of mystery. It is on the line that ships take from Madeira to Brazil. Only within the past half century has it been sounded and its strange phenomena reported.

One investigator declared that he saw the sea about half a mile from his vessel suddenly disturbed. For about two minutes it boiled up violently as from a subterranean spring. Throughout the day there were observed great patches of discolored water which had exactly the appearance of extensive shoals.

These and similar phenomena are frequently observed in this part of the ocean. Often a ship reports that she has experienced a violent shock similar to that which is felt when a rock is struck. Sometimes a great rumbling is heard, like that of a heavy chain running through the hawse pipes, and the vessel quivers like a leaf in the wind. At another time, in smooth water, a vessel has been known to heel over suddenly, as if she had run on a sand bank.

Before this part of the ocean was as thoroughly sounded and surveyed as it is now these phenomena were attributed to the presence of unmarked sand banks and rocky shoals, and the old charts were marked accordingly. But it must have astonished the mariner somewhat to find that he got no soundings with his deep sea lead immediately after experiencing one of these shocks.

It is now generally believed that submarine earthquakes are the true cause of these convulsions.—Youth's Companion.

**A FIRE HOUSE ROMANCE.**

**THE EGG TRADE.**

During the past year the Live Stock Branch of the Department of Agriculture has been engaged in a preliminary investigation of the Canadian Egg Trade. Certain facts relating to the enormous loss that is charged back against the farmer and the unsatisfactory status of the trade as a whole have been collected and presented in Bulletin No. 16, entitled "The Care of Market Eggs." Realizing, however, the necessity of securing more detailed information before inaugurating any policy having for its object the bringing about of improvement in the condition of the business, the Minister of Agriculture has authorized the appointment of J. H. Hare, B.S.A., of Whitby to undertake the necessary investigation.

Mr. Hare has held the position of District Representative in Ontario County, Ont., for the past four years. He was born at Cobourg, Ont., and received his early training on the farm. He entered the Ontario Agriculture College in 1904 and graduated in 1908. Since taking up the District Representative work in Ontario County he has devoted much time and has been very successful in the organization of cooperative egg circles. Not only has he paid particular attention to conditions of the egg trade as they exist in the rural districts, but he has also made a close study of the poultry business in general and has written numerous articles, among which is a bulletin now in press. By virtue of his technical training and his practical experience Mr. Hare is, therefore, well qualified as a specialist in poultry work.

Mr. Hare will first be concerned with the collection of all data that is available on the grading of eggs as they have been received at wholesale produce houses of Canada during the past two years. The information thus obtained will be used to form a basis for such action as may be taken by the Government in initiating a movement to improve and properly regulate the trade.

Mr. Hare will be located at Ottawa, but will travel extensively throughout the Dominion, first in the east and later in the west. Brant County is included in the list.

**AN EARLY PURE FOOD LAW.**

English Bakers Had to Be Careful in the Old Days.

In the time of Edward I. of England bakers were not permitted to make either bread or beer. The former they were obliged by law to buy from the baker and the latter from the brewer. In "Customs of Old England" F. J. Snell declares that of the law defended what was considered the legitimate claim of the baker to a proper livelihood it was equally solicitous for the welfare of his customers and was most severe upon the baker who sold bread deficient in weight or quality.

For the first offense he was drawn on a hurdle through the principal streets, which would be thronged with people and foul with traffic, with the offending loaf suspended from his neck. From a pen and ink sketch of this ceremony it appears that the unhappy tradesman wore neither shoes nor stockings and had his arms strapped to his sides. It seems also that two horses drew the hurdle, which suggests that it rattled along at a pretty lively pace.

For the second offense the baker enjoyed another ride upon the hurdle and then underwent an hour's exposure in the pillory. If he proved so uncorrigible as to commit the offense a third time "his oven" was demolished and he was forbidden to follow his trade.

## Anglican Minister Who Occupied a Presbyterian Pulpit Has Nothing to Regret

(Courier Leased Wire).  
MONTREAL, Feb. 21—In the absence of the Bishop of Montreal, who has been in Toronto for a couple of days, the issue raised by the action of Rev. Dr. Symonds, rector of Christ Church Cathedral, in preaching before the congregation of St. Giles' Presbyterian church, which is in the parish of Rev. J. L. Flanagan, remains in abeyance.

Statements regarding the affair were made yesterday by Rev. Dr. Symonds, Rev. Mr. Flanagan and Dr. Davidson, Chancellor of the diocese. Dr. Symonds did not betray any uneasiness over the outcome.

"There is nothing to regret about the matter," he said, "if I am put out of the church, I would be quite willing to be put on this cause. I do not think there is any specific or written law on the subject it is at best a matter of courtesy or usage. As a matter of fact, I received the permission of Mr. Flanagan; otherwise I might not have proceeded. But Mr. Flanagan appears to have receded from his original position. If Archbishop Bruchesi could allow me to preach in the Roman Catholic Notre Dame church, I would quickly avail myself of the permission."

Dr. Davidson stated that as a

matter of church law, a clergyman had no right to enter the parish of another clergyman and preach from the pulpit of another body without the written consent of the bishop and the rector of the parish.

Rev. Mr. Flanagan said that Dr. Symonds had telephoned him regarding the invitation to preach in St. Giles' church, and had said that Dr. Davidson advised him that there was no church law to prevent his accepting. "My reply was," said Mr. Flanagan, "that if there was no law against his proposed action, I should not make it a personal matter. Dr. Davidson informed me he had no knowledge of giving the opinion quoted by Dr. Symonds. When the local aspect of the matter was presented to me I had no option but to oppose the action of Dr. Symonds."

MONTREAL, Feb. 21—(Later)—Bishop Farthing, who returned to the city this morning gave out a statement to the effect that a report that he was going to take drastic and immediate action in the matter of Dr. Symonds who preached in a Presbyterian church in the parish of a fellow Anglican minister, was quite unofficial and unauthorized.

## THAT FRASER FORTUNE.

TORONTO, Feb. 21—The legal contest over the \$80,000 fortune left by the late Michael Fraser of Midland will probably get a new lease of life at the March assizes at Barrie.

Acting for Miss McCormick, cousin of the octogenarian A. E. H. Creswick, applied to Judge Wismer at Barrie for an order of administration, giving his client the conduct of the administration. His honor, thereupon cited, Mrs. Michael Fraser to appear if she contested the issue of letters of administration to Miss McCormick. It is open to Mrs. Fraser to object that she herself is entitled to administration, as Mr. Fraser's wife, or that she has a will. In this case, the contest will be tried out at the assizes in March.

Miss Charles, the travelling secretary of the G.F.S., addressed a large meeting of girls and women at St. Luke's on Thursday evening. In an eloquent address she set forth the objects and aims of the Society. Miss Addie Clifford was admitted as an associate member and seven others to membership. The service of admission was very beautiful and most impressive. The Girls' Friendly Society was organized 38 years ago, and is the largest society of girls and women in existence, constantly growing.

Branches of it are found wherever the English tongue is spoken. It stands for the highest ideal of Christian womanhood, providing for both personal, social and Christian work of all kinds, and it is its appreciation of the many-sided needs of life, of the power of mutual sympathy, the inspiration of numbers and the community of interests, that makes the Girls' Friendly Society the most important of the church agencies for character building. Any girl of good character of any religious persuasion is eligible for membership. Miss Charles has been instrumental in establishing three branches in Brantford, at St. Jude's, Trinity and St. Luke's, at each of which good work is being carried on.

### Brant Sanitarium Committee Visit an Institution Near Hamilton

The committee from the Brant Sanitarium Association, consisting of Mr. Cook, vice-president; Mr. A. E. Watts, chairman of building; Dr. Ashton, the other member, being unable to go on account of professional duties, visited the Mountain Sanitarium at Hamilton with a purpose of obtaining information to assist them in equipping the Brant Sanitarium. When the Brantford gentlemen reached the institution they found it located back on the mountain three miles from the city, and when they arrived there they were met by Dr. Holbrook, the resident physician, the matron, head nurse and assistant, who were all temporarily absent, so the Brantford gentlemen started on a tour of inspection themselves. The first feature that struck them forcibly was that neither the buildings nor grounds were modern or up-to-date. They first visited the kitchen department, where they received their first surprise. The kitchen utensils and surroundings were kept scrupulously clean, although the building had been an old farmhouse adapted for its present use. They met the cook, a bright, vivacious young lady about 25 years of age, weighing about 125 or 130 pounds, the picture of good health. She was asked how many she cooked for daily and replied on an average for 80. She was then asked if there was an assistant cook, to which she replied "No." The next question was did she have any special training for the work. The answer was, "Absolutely none"; that she had come from her own home as a patient to the institution, was cured there, and gradually assumed her present duties, which were apparently heavy enough to task the strength of the most robust person. The committee wandered into a building containing a number of children, and on asking for the nurse

in charge it then appeared they had been expected and a party appointed to show them through the premises. They were then introduced to a healthy, pleasant-looking lady, who stated she was the teacher in charge of the children's school in connection with the institution, and they found that she was a Miss McKenzie from the County of Brant, her home being St. George, and also another cured patient of the institution. Miss McKenzie first explained the working of the branch she had charge of, which was known as the preventorium for children. There were some 23 children, ranging in age from 4 to 15, in this building, suffering from tuberculosis in various forms. The convalescents and those having the disease in a light form were taught by Miss McKenzie in an open-air school for a short period during the day, otherwise were treated with the most advanced cases, the same as other cases. The committee was greatly interested in this branch of the work, as it was entirely new to them, they having no idea that tubercular trouble was so prevalent among young children, and the Brant Association had made absolutely no provision for taking care of this branch of the work, which, from information the committee received, is absolutely necessary should be done. The Hamilton association apparently devoted considerable effort in the care for the children, as the building and equipment of the connection branch was the best in connection with the sanitarium. The committee were fortunate in meeting Dr. Holbrook before leaving. They found him very enthusiastic in regard to his work, having been the resident physician for over four years, and a chuck full of information. He informed the committee from his experience that the best results from a sanitar-

ium was the education department, that the only successful course of treatment was absolute rest with moderate, wholesome feeding until the disease was arrested, then years of careful living, avoiding all excess until the diseased parts were entirely healed; after that the cure was effected one week's over-work, through pleasure or otherwise, would do more harm than a year could eradicate. Dr. Holbrook was specially asked in reference to the children. He stated when the system of inspecting school children by trained nurses was first instituted in Hamilton, they paid strict attention to the eyes, teeth, throat and ears, but did not consider the question of the lungs or tubercular trouble. When the association for suppressing tuberculosis drew the attention of the board to the necessity of an examination of the school children, with the object of preventing consumption, the trained nurses were instructed to report all supposed cases or cases of inability to keep up with studies on account of physical weakness, to Dr. Holbrook for special examination. Last year some eighty cases of action of the children were examined by him at the request of nurses. Many of them were either slightly affected with tubercular trouble and could be treated at home with proper instruction, while over ten were placed in the children's branch of the sanitarium. Dr. Holbrook stated that children from four years and upwards often were afflicted with tuberculosis which did not develop seriously during their youth, but on reaching the ages of between 15 and 20, developed rapidly without hardly any possible hope of cure, while if these cases were arrested while the children were young there was no reason, with care, they should not grow into healthy citizens. While the members of the committee did not obtain a great deal of information bearing directly on the question of equipment, yet they did obtain considerable information, and desire to thank Dr. Holbrook and Miss McKenzie for their kind and courteous attention, and the answering of the many questions put to them.

The real title of this new band of churchgoers is "The Spiritual Militancy League," whereof Mrs. Lillian Sauter, sister of the dramatist, John Galsworthy, is temporary honorary secretary.

Jarred Her

On awakening he cut off his offending eyelids that his eyes might never close again, and flung them on the ground, when they were immediately transformed into the first tea plant. It was for this reason believed that tea was a beverage sent from heaven to reuel slumber, and enable good Buddhist priests to keep their vigils.

The Coaling Girls of Nazasaki.

Imagine a great mail steamer bunkering 2,300 tons—that is a lot—of coal in six and a half hours, the work being accomplished not by labor-saving machinery, but by girls. It sounds incredible; but it is said to be a fact and one that may be witnessed almost any day at the Japanese port, Nazasaki, where the coaling is done entirely by girls. When a ship approaches to have her bunkers filled big coal barges bear down upon her and as soon as she comes to anchor the crews place a rough ladder between the liner and the foremost barge. On each rung of it a girl takes her place. Men in the barge quickly shovel the coal in shallow baskets, holding half a bushel each, to the sound of a monotonous chant, and these baskets then pass from hand to hand on the living ladder with marvellous celerity. Each girl seizes one and swings it straight up in front of her, above her head, when it is caught by the next girl. Down a second ladder, likewise packed with girls, the empty baskets pass in similar manner back into the barge to be refilled. Barge after barge is emptied in this way. The monotonous chanting never ceases; the living elevator goes on hour after hour with its never ending stream of baskets, until the last bunker is full, when the ladders disappear as if by magic and the ship is ready to proceed on her voyage.

As has been mentioned a large steamer will coal 2,300 tons in six and a half hours, or 353 tons per hour, which works out at nearly six tons per minute.

A petition asking for homesteading privilege for women on the same terms as men, signed by 11,000 electors of Western Canada, has been forwarded to the Hon. Dr. Roche, Minister of the Interior, according to a Winnipeg paper. Besides the individual names, the petitions is signed by a dozen boards of trade—all to which it was presented—and by many organizations.

The petition urges that all British-born women be granted homestead privileges on the same terms as men those from the British Isles having to be at least one year resident in the country. As the law now stands, widows with dependent children may homestead. The regulation states:—

"Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eight-

teen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The duties are: Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land each year for three years."

Quite a number of self-supporting women of late have turned their attention to poultry raising, horticulture, and farming. Although they cannot take up homesteads, some English women have bought farms and run them successfully. It is believed that if the homesteading privileges were extended to English-speaking women more of those who have to make their own way in the world would take up land. This would be not only an opening for the women themselves but would increase the proportion of British-born settlers in a community.

SOME GOOD RECIPES.

BAKED BEAN SOUP

For this you need one can of tomatoes, two cups of water, one teaspoon of salt, one tablespoon of sugar, one tablespoon of flour, one tablespoon of butter, four cloves, one-quarter teaspoon of celery seed, one tablespoon of chopped onions. Boil all the ingredients (except the flour and butter) together and rub through a sieve. Return to the fire and thicken with the butter and flour cooked together.

INTERESTING FIGURES In Connection With the Combined Traffic of the Grand Trunk and Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Companies.

The principal feature of the sixth annual dinner of the Grand Trunk Freight Traffic Department, which was held in Montreal on Friday evening last was the address of Mr. J. E. Dalrymple, vice-president in charge of traffic matters of the Grand Trunk interests, from the Atlantic to the Pacific, who, in the course of his remarks pointed out the development of those interests, not only in the parent company, the Grand Trunk Railway system, but in that of the Grand Trunk Pacific. He showed that the freight earnings of the Grand Trunk System, exclusive of subsidiary companies in 1896, when the late Mr. Chas. M. Hays took charge were \$15,400,000, and for the year ending 1912, they were \$34,000,000 or an increase of 120 per cent.

Mr. Dalrymple further stated that the trackage of the Grand Trunk Pacific now extended from Fort William westward, including their branch lines, a total mileage of 2,300 miles, or approximately one-half of the mileage of the parent system as now existing.

Mr. A. E. Rosebear, Assistant to the Vice-President, instituted some interesting comparisons between combined Grand Trunk and Grand Trunk Pacific and C. P. R. traffic figures. The G. T. R. and G. T. P. combined freight revenue for the year ended Dec. 31st, 1912, was \$40,400,000 as compared with the freight revenue of the C. P. R. for the company's fiscal year of 1912 of \$79,800,000. The G. T. and G. T. P. combined freight tonnage however, for the year ended Dec. 31st, 1912, was 27,400,000 tons against the C. P. R.'s freight tonnage of 25,900,000 tons for its fiscal year 1912. The passenger traffic shows that the combined Grand Trunk roads, carried 16,700,000 passengers during the twelve months of 1912 as compared with 13,700,000 carried by the C. P. R. during its fiscal year.

Remarkable progress was evinced at the annual display of the Grand Trunk Branch of the St. John's Ambulance Association given on Friday

evening last in Montreal when the distribution of medals and certificates also took place. Organized four years ago the corps has rapidly grown in usefulness and efficiency, and out of 900 cases treated during the past year it was found necessary to send only 30 to the hospitals. During the evening the announcement was made that Mr. E. J. Chamberlain, president of the G. T. R., had granted a sum of \$500 to be used for necessary equipment for the work.

The system in effect in the Point St. Charles yards and shops is very complete. Ambulance boxes are placed in each shop and stretchers are conveniently located so that in the event of an accident help can be rendered with the least possible delay.

During the last evening's program exhibitions of bandaging and carrying and lifting insensible persons were given, demonstrating the efficiency and good training of the corps. The interest taken in the work is shown by the fact that of a corps numbering 50 the average attendance at lectures is 45.

The prizes were presented by Mr. A. A. Mavor and Drs. Carmichael, Hutchinson, Pavey and Kenneth Cameron. A handsome shield was presented by Dr. Hutchinson for the team competition in the Grand Trunk centre of the St. John's Ambulance Association of Point St. Charles.

During the evening a pleasant incident occurred, when Dr. H. B. Carmichael, surgeon instructor of the G. T. R. centre, was presented with a handsome surgical bag fully equipped with instruments as a token of the esteem in which he is held by his pupils.

In the course of an address, Dr. Pavey, secretary of the Quebec centre of the St. John's Ambulance Association, complimented the team on its work. There were present a number of officers of the company and a delegation of the Victorian Order of Nurses.

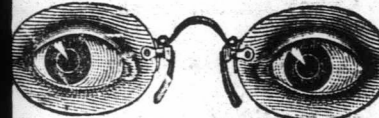


