#### NO HOPE FOR NEW BRUNSWICK.

In reply to J. K. C. and M. V. J. in January 23rd Brunswickan on "New Brunswick-What's wrong with it." Albeit, undergraduate zeal is a splendid thing, the ambitious writers have overlooked a most important fact. Geography is an unalterable obstacle in New Brunswick's progress. The writers of the article state that "New Brunswicksuffers from lack of imagination, and is a permanently depressed area broken by short lived booms." I think even they must agree that even the most imaginative planners would become depressed when they examine the possibilities for hydro power, and of a consequence, industrial development. Even were this power available, geography still holds a trump. Distances are considerable to present centers of population such as the Upper St. Lawrence Valley and Southern Ontario, and would greatly hinder competitive trading in those areas. Admittedly the Maritimes would eventually realize an influx of industry, and of population once these industries were established but how are they to become established in the face of such well entrenched op-

I speak here, of course, of the zealous graduate who seeks to establish a truly New Brunswick company, and not of the branches and subsidiaries of already thriving "upper Canadian" firms. There is litthe use denying that New Brunswick is isolated geographically from the choicest Canadian markets, though every Canadian wishes it were not so. A prosperous thriving Maritimes would obviously strengthen the entire Dominion, but geography is geography. Until atomic energy replaces hydro as the driving force of industry the graduate who admirably strives to put New Brunswick on her industrial feet is in for



The Social Credit party has organized there with the very negative support of the Varsity. Charges against it: anti-semetic, anti-political parties, unsound economics in its platform, and too reminiscent of Hitler in the 20's or Mussolini after the first world war.

Marx opened his manifesto by saying that the spectre of communism was haunting Europe. S. Endicott, president of the U. of T. Communist Club, says that same spectre is haunting the world. Mr. Endicott accuses P. M.
