

Harvey's opens facility in SUB

Now Harvey's will make your hamburger a beautiful thing right here in the SUB.

Recently opened, the chain known for its fresh char-broiled burgers is intended to provide better quality and faster service than the old Sizzler it replaced.

"It'll definitely be a hit," said Marc Hewitt, Assistant Food Service Director. "It provides students with another option aside from standard Beaver Foods fare."

And students with Beaverbucks will still be able to use them. As well, all Harvey's coupons will be redeemable.

"As far as the students are concerned, I think they'll find they're getting far better value, far better quality and consistency, and a whole lot faster service," said Hewitt.

Students concurred, although some noted that the prices were slightly more expensive.

"They give you a variety, but I wouldn't be able to eat this all my life," said Biology student Preeti Ramprasad as she nibbled away at her bowl of poutine.

Hewitt said, "There are some very subtle differences in the menu, and minor differentiations in the pricing, only to reflect certain items. But for the most part, the prices are the same."

And he thinks students will maintain a variety in their diets.

"I don't think students will eat a hamburger and fries every day, but I think that they'll probably begin to try the other items on the menu."

He listed such items as char-broiled chicken, fish sandwiches, chicken fingers, and low-fat burgers. Soups and salads will also be available.

The idea for brand-name chains in institutional cafeterias was pioneered by Cara Foods Limited, the parent company of both Beaver and Harvey's. Cara left the location decision with Beaver's regional manager, who chose UNB.

There are currently only two other similar operations in Canada, both in Toronto-area colleges, and two more are expected to be completed within the next month.

To change the old Sizzler grill into the Harvey's required more than \$200 000, but the new

facility has state-of-the-art equipment.

"The only element remaining from the old place out there is some of the staff, who have been trained in Harvey's standards," said Hewitt.

In Ramprasad's view, this training may be working.

"On the whole they're really well organized," she said.

Cara Foods, a Toronto company, also owns Swiss Chalet, Pizza Hut, Grand & Toy, and provides most airline catering in Canada.

"The trend right now in institutional food services is totally towards branded concepts," said Hewitt.

If this facility is successful, UNB students could see other chains locate in the SUB of the future.

Biology student Megan Stewart liked that idea, "Pizza would be good," she said.

Both Biology students had the same comments for the management.

"They overdo the paper waste. They shouldn't give receipts or put paper liners on the trays."


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

New position intended to raise awareness of issues

In an effort to better co-ordinate awareness campaigns, educate students on a variety of issues, and to assure that education issues are being addressed in the upcoming federal election, the position of campaigns co-ordinator was created for this summer.

The campaigns consist of setting up booths, putting articles in newspapers, handing out pamphlets, putting up posters, having speakers and various other events. While it is possible to run a campaign on just about any subject, we limited ours to these issues which we felt needed to be addressed here at UNB Fredericton campus.

Sexual Assault is Against the Law—In a recent report done on the UNB/STU campus by Counselling Services it was discovered that over 28 % of the respondents reported one or more unwanted sexual experiences. In conjunction with the safety co-ordinator, during frosh week we are going to run a "sexual assault is against the law campaign." The main aim of this campaign is to make students aware of what sexual harassment is, and to also make them realize that they are responsible for their actions.

Anti-Racism and Awareness of Cultural diversity—In an attempt to lessen attacks (both verbal and physical) and to also expose people to different cultures, there will be several awareness campaigns geared toward educating the UNB/STU population on different ethnic groups and minorities. This includes an Anti-Racism campaign where in addition to handing out pamphlets and putting up posters, we will be setting up workshops and have speakers go into classrooms. Other campaigns which will reduce

racial tension by way of introducing them to new cultures will be an International Students Day and Native awareness campaigns.

Gay and Lesbian Awareness—It came to our attention that several incidents of violence, including one resulting in death last year, have occurred specifically towards gays and lesbians. In an attempt to create a greater acceptance of these groups, a gay and lesbian awareness campaign will take place in February. The aim of this campaign will be to lessen homophobic attitudes on campus and to assert every student's right to make their own sexual choices, free of discrimination or fear of physical threat.

Violence Towards Women—This has been an on going problem on campuses across Canada. This problem gained spotlight attention in December 1991 when 14 university women were shot. This incident, which came to be known as the Montreal massacre, will be remembered during the week of reflection from December 6-9. During this week, we will also educate students about the consequences and meaning of violence that still exist towards women.

In addition, we will be running several other social issue campaigns such as Aids Awareness, Physical Accessibility and Alcohol Awareness.

Referendums—This coming school year two referendums of great importance will be taking place—the SUB expansion and the CFS Health Care plan. As counsellors you will be asked to help in educating the students on the complex matters surrounding these issues.

Education Campaigns—There will also be several campaigns

aimed at educating the public at large of the importance of accessibility to a quality education. On October 13, National Students day, we will invite the local MP candidates over for lunch (KD with MPs), after which we will have a debate on education issues (students vs. the MP's) and we will end the afternoon with a press conference. In February we will be holding another press conference on Valentines Day which is also "If You Love Education Day." Hugh MacNeil and Roxane McCarthy will be presenting a report on student cost of living, which they are presently working on. We are also currently putting together a plan to ensure that candidates in the upcoming federal election are addressing education issues. This includes doing such things as sending students to follow local candidates at public meetings to ask them their stances on education and letting the public know whether or not we agree with the candidates stances.

CFS and Student Union Awareness campaign—In an attempt to improve the student apathy towards student politics, we will run campaigns directed towards educating students on what exactly we do as UNB Student Union members. As well, there will be a campaign which shows students specifically how their eight dollars to CFS benefits them.

These campaigns can only be a success if enough people get involved with them and, as counsellors, you will be asked to help. If there are some campaigns of particular interest to you do not hesitate to call me so that the persons who are in charge of carrying out the campaigns can put you on the committees necessary to run an effective campaign.

Student Volunteer Bureau Created

New for fall 1993 is the creation of a Student Volunteer Bureau by the Student Union, which is itself a volunteer organization.

The Bureau has published a booklet containing brief descriptions of duties and contact names for organizations from Alcoholics Anonymous to the YM-YWCA.

According to the projects Coordinator, Hiep Vu, the Bureau was established to "build an alliance between students and the community."

At Thursday's official launching of the handbook, UNB President Robin Armstrong was enthusiastic.

"I was amazed when I looked at the little booklet and counted approximately 70 volunteer organizations," he said, "I am pleased to see the students take this initiative."

The president emphasized that volunteer experience helps students find jobs.

Vu agreed: "Students are coming into this with very little experience. We need any kind of edge that we can get."

Fredericton Mayor Brad Woodside was also on hand to lend his support. As an example, he noted that the recent Labatt's 24-Hour Relay in the city raised the most money in the Maritimes—money which went to the Dr. Everett Chalmers Hospital.

"Now when I go to the hospital, I'll know I'll be getting good service and good equipment."

He said that besides the experience gained from volunteering, it "feels good" to help others. Student Union President Jamie van Raalte designated room 118 in the SUB as the bureau's office.

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This week, thousands of frosh and returning students will converge on the UNB campus to get acquainted (or re-acquainted) with the routine of study and socializing usually associated with a student's life.


First of all, to all of you, "Hello and Welcome."

notice that their are no pay phones outside where you can access them late at night. So, if you run into trouble, where can you get help?

Something to think about.

To reduce the chances of getting in a bad situation, USE THE SAFEWALK PROGRAM 453-4830. It's there for you, and the student volunteers want to help you—any time during the night—so you won't be inconvenienc-

ing them if you call at 3:45 a.m., even just to go next door.

The Neill House Safewalk program has changed over the summer, so everyone should read this, whether you're frosh, or upper-classpeople. Neill House has offered an escort service for several years, but this year, when you call 453-4830 to get a safewalker during peak hours (Sunday-Thursday from 8:30 p.m.-12:30 a.m.),

you'll be met by two safewalkers, one male and one female.

Neill House Safewalkers will be screened, interviewed and trained. They will be registered with UNB Security, screened for past criminal offences, and their names will be published in the *Bruns* to determine if they have been involved in conflicts before.

In addition, they will have uniforms to make them clearly identifiable.

When you call for an escort (453-4830), your call goes to UNB Security, who then contacts the Safewalkers, and tells you the names of the students who will be meeting you.

It's the number to remember this year—453-4830. It'll be printed on residence keychains, in notices in the Beaverbook, and may even show up in some places where you'd least expect it.
