We will have 15,000 people to house and feed during the approaching winter. Grateful for the donations already made, I am compelled to ask you to continue systematically in your generous contributions in this great work of charity. I can only renew the assurances that the contributions received will be faithfully used, and I am confident that this appeal for aid will not be in vain."

Fennell, that the Council of the town of Listowel, redrafting the unanimous feeling of its citizens, hereby records its deepest sorrow and sympathy with the family of the late President and the government of the Republic of the United States in the recent national bereavement sustained by them in the lamentable death of their Chief Magistrate, James A. Garfield, and suggests that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Secretary of State at Washington—carried.
