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# THE TROUBLE IN FRANCE; LEADER MUST SURRENDER

### LEADER OF THE WINE GROWERS' AGITATION HAS LOST HIS INFLUENCE—GOVERNMENT WILL DEAL STERNLY WITH AGITATORS—POSITION OF THE CABINET IS DIFFICULT — MUTINEERS TO BE EXILED.

AGELLERS, France, June 26.—Marcin, leader of the wine growers' movement, appears to have suffered a considerable diminution in influence. His speech this afternoon before a meeting of citizens, in which he described his interview with Premier Clemenceau in Paris on Sunday soundly and curiously like a defence. After a stormy discussion lasting more than two hours, during which M. Albert was savagely attacked, the delegates decided to continue the struggle with unabated vigor. It was further decided to draw up a statement setting forth the minimum demands. M. Albert's declaration and the decision of the delegates are variously commented upon, but it is generally agreed upon that the "apostle" has no alternative now, but to surrender as soon as possible.

# GOOD BYE TO THE LIBERAL RALLY AT SARINIA AGAINST THE ORDERS

### HOUSE OF COMMONS—AMENDMENT MOVED TO ABOLISH HOUSE OF LORDS—STRONG PARTY LEADER SPEECHES

LONDON, June 25.—In the House of Commons yesterday the whole sitting was practically occupied in debating Premier Campbell-Bannerman's motion to curtail the powers of the House of Lords. An amendment was moved on behalf of the labor party in favor of the total abolition of the house. A Henderson, the Labor member for Durham who moved the amendment argued that the Government's proposal was an invitation to the House of Lords to delay every bill at their pleasure. This amendment was met by the strong opposition of the Tories and nationalists, and a considerable section of the radicals. Strong speeches were made by the party leaders, including Alfred Lyttelton, ex-vice-chancellor of the Exchequer, and Winston Churchill, the under-secretary for the Colonies, and the impression that the Government was fully determined in its campaign against the House of Lords.

# AGITATION AFOOT IN GOVERNMENT OFFICES AGAINST INCOME TAX

A number of the civil servants employed in the Provincial Government are up in arms against the idea of contributing to the cost of the improvement of the roads through the medium of the income tax, claiming that it should either be abolished or embraced a far greater number of taxpayers than it is at present. They claim that if they are brought under the income tax then the managers and officials of business concerns are taxed on the floor space basis should also be subjected to the working of the income tax. So strongly is the feeling expressed with respect to this, that they have gone to the trouble of preparing a list, filling several folios, which they intend to submit to the Government. The list contains the names of those connected with the principal businesses in the city, businesses which contribute heavily to the city exchequer under the floor space tax.

The Supplementary Revenue Act

An Explanation of Its Purpose Issued by the Treasury Department

The chief object of this Act is to tax lands for the support of rural schools which were not formerly so taxed. It is estimated that there are between 20,000,000 and 25,000,000 acres of assessable land in the province that do not contribute one cent toward the cost of education...

A Uniform Annual Tax

The Act provides that a uniform tax of one cent per acre be levied on all assessable rural lands in the province except such as are included in town and village districts. In the case of these districts it is provided that the farm lands situate therein pay a much higher tax than do similar lands in rural districts...

Free High Schools

Under the laws passed by the Legislative Assembly of the North-West Territories parents residing outside the limits of our large towns and villages to receive the benefit of a higher education were compelled to pay for their children's education...

Heavy Burden for Town Districts

As is well known the cost of maintaining the senior department in town and city schools has been comparatively burdensome. The cost of erecting suitable buildings and of providing the necessary apparatus and equipment, library and furnishings is also proportionately very much greater than in the case of rural districts...

Lands in School Districts Taxed

While the Act was under discussion the suggestion was made that the tax proposed should be levied on the basis of the boundaries of school districts. At first sight this proposal seems reasonable but a great many new districts are organized every month and that the boundaries of districts are being frequently changed...

Not an Additional Burden

The Act has been criticised on the grounds that it placed an additional financial burden upon the people of the province. This objection is not well taken. While the measure provides for a new assessment tax there is no doubt that for the reasons stated above the proposed tax is not only necessary but very desirable.

New Grants to Rural School Districts

If the total taxes estimated to be collectible this year are paid it is expected that the Government will have on hand \$281,497 for distribution to existing rural school districts. Under the provisions of the Act the scheme of distribution is as follows: In the first place every district whose school is in operation more than 60 days in the year will be paid a straight grant of \$120. After these grants are paid the balance is to be divided among all rural districts in proportion to the number of days they are kept open...
