Our Streets Again.

We are glad to know that our article last week concerning the streets and sidewalks has aroused some interest among our people on the matter.

The U. S. Electoral Vote.

The coming election in the United States is an event which has certainly not failed to cast a shadow in advance.

Here's a few items for a small town: Our total assessment is \$52,000. The head expenses are, schools, \$15,500; fire dept., \$4,600; street lighting, \$2,950; police, \$2,000; streets, sidewalks and sewers, \$8,000.

This gives a probable Republican gain of thirteen votes, equal to the gaining of Indiana or Iowa, which have always been regarded as somewhat pivotal States.

It may be interesting to note that the Republican majority in 1876 was one; in 1880, fifty-nine; in 1884, the Democratic majority was thirty-seven; and in 1888 Harrison won the day by sixty-five votes.

Attempt to Burn Sackville College.

There is great excitement at Sackville over two attempts to burn the Commercial College in connection with the Institution. On Thursday evening a fire was set, but was soon discovered and put out; but on Friday evening another determined effort was made by pouring oil over the cellar steps and setting fire to it.

The late Stephen Kempton of Lockeport, (father of Rev. S. B. Kempton, a daughter of the late Dr. Samuel Dennison Brown, of Maitland. His death will be genuinely regretted by all who knew him. He fell the prey of pneumonia, a result of the prevailing influenza. He attended to his large practice up to Tuesday of last week. He was indeed, with his brother physicians, overtaxed in endeavoring to attend to the lately altogether too numerous calls for their services. Dr. Brown was a native of Grand Pre, Horton, son of the late Charles Brown, farmer. He was one of thirteen children, eight sons, five daughters. The eight brothers all attained the three score years and over, but Mr. Frederick Brown of Wolfville, is now the only survivor. The late Dr. was a thorough scholar. He was one of the best naturally gifted both as a mathematician and a linguist. He was well read, not only in the literature of his profession but in general literature, and was at home with books in English, Latin, Greek, Italian and German, and few graduates of Theological Colleges have a better knowledge than he had of Hebrew and the Hebrew Bible. His preliminary and art course studies were taken at the educational institutions of Windsor, and we believe he was for a time tutor there. He indeed took a life interest in matters educational. His professional course was taken at the University of Pennsylvania, Philadelphia, from which he graduated M. D. in 1848. He began the practice of his profession at Londonderry, but moved across the Bay to Maitland in 1852. He there married his faithful wife, Annie, a daughter of the late Mr. Adam Dickie, a sister of Rev. A. B. Dickie, of Maitland and Maitland became his life-long home. Of his eight children, five survive to share with their mother their great loss. As a physician we need only say that Dr. Brown was counted by the brethren of his profession as one of their best read and most skillful practitioners. Some of his patients are ready to confess that they felt better as soon as they themselves caught sight of his cheerful, kindly face.—Presbyterian Witness.

At the last meeting of the W. C. T. U. it was decided to engage Mrs Mary H. Hunt, who has been called the most eloquent woman in America, to deliver a lecture in Wolfville in a few weeks' time.

Our great men of science have paid tribute to her learning by submitting their books on her topic to her revision and gladly accepting her amendments and eagerly seeking for them her endorsement. And withal, this unique woman is thoroughly a lady, refined and womanly in her manner, and although commanding in presence, has a face in which the home virtues sit enthroned."

Our Motto. "FOR GOD, AND HOME, AND NATIVE LAND." These are the words chosen by the Women's Christian Temperance Union of the United States and Canada, as a fitting motto and incentive to work.

"For God."—Yes, surely all work which is meant to accomplish good must be done for God. This is the broadest, and purest motive which we, as Christian women and workers for Temperance, can feel.

"For Home."—Has not God given us our talents, and whatever they are, how many, or how few, let us use them in doing work which shall bring honor and glory to Him who is the great giver of all good. If we take as our first and last thought in all active work, and in prayer—"For God," or "For Christ's sake," then no effort shall be vain in the Lord. Not unto us, O Lord, not unto us; but unto Thy name be glory.

"For Home."—The second incentive, planned by Him, born of His love for the child of man, and intended as a blessing to mankind and a centre of enjoyment and profit. In connection with the home woman shares a God given responsibility, and although, in many cases, her influence extends far beyond her own four walls, still it is in the heart of her own family that woman sits enthroned and wields her mightiest influence for God and for eternity. Desist no work for God in the home. "Keep the home near Heaven. Let its face toward the Father's House."

"For Native Land."—Upon first thought, this last motive in our work may seem narrow in its range and limited in its desires for good. But there is a sense in which nothing short of the W. R. itself is our Native Land. Are you a native of Nova Scotia? then you are a Canadian, then your home is North America; and North America is one of the great continents of the World, and between our Continent and others exist a strong relationship; so that in a broad sense the World is your Native Land, and work done in Nova Scotia, is done for the world, and work done on other lands is, in a sense, done for Nova Scotia.

Should it be your duty as a privilege to cross the sea and dwell on other soil, would the fact that you were not born in that land check any good word or work for religion or for Temperance? Emphatically, no! We are the World's citizens, and our influence must not be limited, for Christ has said,—"The field is the World."

"For God, AND HOME, AND NATIVE LAND,"—this is the motto of our W. C. T. U. Let us study it well, think of its different motives for work, and then go forward trying to use our ability in a loving effort for God, and Home, and Native Land. A. E. F. Wolfville, N. S.
