The Berwick Convention.

An enthusiastic convention was held at Berwick on Monday last, under the auspices of the Kings County Temperance Alliance. There was a good attendance and all were unanimous in their disapproval of the present candidate for legislative honors in this county. Owing to the difficulties in conducting a campaign at this season and with so short notice a number concluded that no candidate be asked to undertake the contest, but that all forces be conserved for the general election to take place next summer. A large majority, however, opposed this and on the vote being taken the decision of the Alliance on Jan. 26th was endorsed. Mr. N. W. Eaton was then called upon and stated that owing to business reasons it would be impossible for him to accept the nomination.

Acadia Defeated by Dalhousie.

In a fast game of hockey on Wednesday night, Acadia again downed to defeat before the Dalhousie septette. The time was 1-3. The Acadia forwards, controlled the puck for most of the time, especially in the second half, and it was only the playing of the Dalhousie goal keeper that prevented them from winning. Richmond was easily the best player on the ice. Patillo also showed up well. Acadia's defense was not as good as that of the visiting team, but they put up a good game. Dick Smith, of Windsor, started the play at 8:30 and in two minutes Murray, by a long shot, scored the first goal for Acadia. After this the play was pretty evenly contested, till MacGregor placed the puck behind Robinson, making the score 1-1. After this Acadia was forced to stop some hot ones, till they got away with the puck, which was carried back and forth from one end of the rink to the other in combination rushes. McGrath then succeeded in netting the puck, and toward the close of the half he added another to the score, making it 3-1 in favor of Dalhousie.

In the second half Dalhousie rushed matters and scored in less than a minute. Shortly after this Currie and Thomas were given a rest. Play was carried into the visitors' territory, where their game was hampered till Richmond added another to Acadia's score. Thomas was caught loafing and sent to the boards. A few minutes before time was up MacGregor scored and immediately after Patillo did the trick, and the game ended 5-3.

The Reviewer.

A RELIGIOUS REVIVAL. Religious revivals are not accidental movements. They are brought about by forces working in man's spiritual nature in very much the same way as those in the world of matter. The proximate causes of this or that natural phenomenon are usually more or less apparent. A rain storm is not an isolated atmospheric disturbance. By the weatherwise it is generally anticipated, and those who did not expect it can as a rule look back on what they recognize as the immediate antecedent conditions out of which it arose. Similarly, attentive observers of social conditions can perceive the preparations for a religious revival, and those who have not foreseen it can generally see in retrospect what the forces were whose operation brought it about.

The revival is an evidence of the actuality of man's spiritual nature. It is one of the facts that the materialist cannot explain away. Man's spiritual needs are as real as his physical needs and they will assert themselves as strongly if they are not satisfied more than the response of emotional people to the excitements of enthusiasts who know how to play upon human feelings and fears, is to solve the matter altogether and entirely wrong. The forces are not communicated by the revival, it was already latent in the mass of the people he works among, and he liberates it and brings it into activity. It is not only when a man comes to death's door that his sense of sin becomes so great as to make him repent. Many times, in the course of his life he may have had his spiritual wrestlings, and may have sought to mend his ways. People may be outwardly indifferent in respect to matters of religion, but it is not because they are not satisfied that they have not their inner communings.

Large districts may have few churches and these few little attended, but it does not follow that spiritual life is altogether quenched or extinct. When it is thought to be most nearly, if not altogether, extinguished, it may be on the point of bursting out with an energy that will profoundly stir every soul in the community. There is bound to be a reaction from worldliness where religion has been most disregarded. The more selfish the lives of the great mass of people have been, the more powerful will they be affected when the time for recall comes, as come it certainly will.

The world was in a bad way when the Friars began their movement to bring it back to the fold of Christ, and wonderful was the revival the followers of Francis and of Dominic helped to bring about. England was ripe for the work begun by Wesley and Whitfield, whose influence upon the social and political life of the country was mighty for good. The Oxford movement, it is true, was not among the masses of the people, but among the scholars gave in its way a great and lasting impulse to religious revival. In our own province the revival under Methodist, Baptist and Newlight leaders, in the long ago, had a most remarkable influence upon the moral, intellectual and political conditions of the people. Conditions at that time were brutal, drunken, profane. Society had become more and more corrupt, the people were ruled by the political leaders around Halifax. The army, the navy and society in general had become so demoralized as to disregard the laws of both God and man. The morality of Nova Scotia was in no way bettered by the conditions existing in Halifax. Halifax in those days was a drunken and profane city, where duelling dominated among the cultured, and brutal fighting among the ignorant and vulgar, and the influence throughout the country was most degrading. But the reaction, as was most natural, was the instrument for liberating the latent revulsion against the social and political evils. Society was uplifted by the spiritual awakening, and, like leaven, it permeated all denominations and all classes of the people. There were those who said that the people were deluded, and were the victims of a kind of religious frenzy, a crazy epidemic.

And all Christendom needs a religious revival now if ever. It is doubtful if the selfishness of mankind generally was ever more in the ascendant than it is to-day. Self-indulgence, not self-restraint, is largely apparent. There is a tendency to de-Christianize systems of government. The war of France, with the Church, and the similar conflicts in Spain and Portugal are not altogether rebellion against religion. There were grievous sins to be redressed, and if the Pope had been better advised, the Church would have made concessions. The "Modern" Movement on the part of a revival, the object being to adapt the Church's system to new conditions. Perhaps never before in all the history of this old world has corruption, greed, graft and secret disregard of God, been as world wide as it is to-day.

A wide sweeping, deeply agitating religious revival is a good thing for any community of people, and it is more so in Canada and Wolfville. In the time of our own social and political development we are unable to forget the things of our youth. The casket, massive and beautiful, was then closed, and the procession moved on to the cemetery at Grand Pre. The committal service at the grave, by Dr. Borden, was solemn and affecting, and so was returned to earth the body of one who will be long remembered as a patriot, a scholar and a man who, during a long life, had contributed much toward the building up of the Dominion by the exertion of his intellect and talents and his practical knowledge of business affairs and his love particularly for Nova Scotia and its people.

Ottawa, January 24.—In the house of commons today, A. B. Crosby, Halifax, called the attention of the prime minister to the fact that Sir Frederick Borden was absent from his place in the house and engaged in an electioneering tour in Kings county, where a local by-election was pending. Already a number of estimates had to stand over because the minister of militia was not here to explain them. Sir Wilfrid Laurier said that Sir Frederick was a citizen of Kings county and had a right to be there at this time. Mr. Crosby: "He is paid a salary for being a citizen, he is paid to stay here and look after his duties."

A Candidate.

In Kings county to-day Mr. H. H. Wickwire is running for the local legislature for the seat formerly held by the late B. H. Dodge. He had Sir Frederick Borden and the liberal organizer for the province are stamping the county and telling the ratepayers what a nice people they are and how much Mr. Wickwire thinks of them. This is all very gratifying to Kings county electors but the extraordinary thing about it is that Mr. Wickwire's opinion of the moral qualities of the people of Kings has experienced a complete change since last July. Mr. Wickwire, in his professional capacity, has been acting for R. J. Graham, of Belleville, Ontario, in a suit to recover from J. W. Bigelow, of Wolfville, \$213.25 damages for alleged fraudulent packing of fruit sold by Mr. Bigelow to Mr. Graham. Mr. Graham, it will be remembered, was formerly president of the famous New Brunswick Cold Storage Company and a business associate of Sir Frederick Borden. Mr. Wickwire's firm has notified 308 other fruit growers of Kings, Annapolis and Hants counties of Mr. Graham's intention to bring similar actions against them, and the suit against Mr. Bigelow as a test case is naturally attracting widespread interest.

Now the surprising thing is that Mr. Wickwire, whose admiration for King's county electors is just now so great, has violent objection to Mr. Bigelow's case being tried by a jury selected from these excellent people. When application was made by Mr. Bigelow's solicitor to have the cause tried at Kentville, Mr. Wickwire and his partner strenuously opposed the application upon the ground that his client could not get fair play in Kings county. It was argued by them that the local apple buyers, who are in competition with Ontario fruit exporters, would prevent a fair trial of the action and "that it would be an utter impossibility to obtain an unprejudiced jury in said Kings county." The jury panel which is objected to in the affidavits is as follows:—Herbert Dennison, Charles E. Parker, Perry Bishop, Avery Banks, Frank W. Bishop, Arthur Dickie, Frank W. Foster, Charles Godfrey, H. G. Harris, Dwight D. Lyman, J. L. Eaton, L. B. Welton, James D. Coleman, Noble Sandford, F. E. Bishop, Molineux Wright, Marshall Ward, Richard Smith, Everett Kinney, Frank Ford, T. R. Lyons, John White, George Harrington, Elias Curry.

Affidavits from J. W. Bigelow, A. E. McMahon, S. C. Parker, R. E. Harris, J. Manning Lamont, R. W. Starr, A. Emerson Palmer and John Hamilton Morris were produced to show a fair trial could be obtained in Kings county, but these were all met by affidavits sworn to by Mr. Wickwire himself. In one of these Mr. Wickwire deposes to the following: "I am also aware of similar public feeling existing today in Kings county and which has been greatly intensified by numerous letters sent out to different farmers by the said firm of Wickwire and Pincus in connection with the enforcement of the damage claims of the late and above named plaintiff for the false and fraudulent packing of apples sold to him, and also by the public meetings held among the farmers of the said county in connection with the same. This feeling is so bitter that my said firm has been freely criticized for taking up these claims against the farmers on behalf of an Ontario apple dealer and one farmer, who came to my office, apparently for the purpose of stating his feeling in this particular, became so abusive in regard to the matter, that after explaining to him that our courts were open to any man seeking redress, whether he came from Ontario or elsewhere, I was obliged to order him out of my office."

"4. For the reason aforesaid and knowing the feeling in the said county of Kings as I do, I am of the opinion that it would be impossible to obtain a fair and unprejudiced jury for the trial of this cause in the said county."

In another affidavit he swears to the following: "I understand that J. H. Morris, of Canard, and Emerson Palmer, of Cornwallis have made affidavits to be used on the part of the action on his application to change the place of trial in this action. 2. The said Morris and Palmer are persons against whom the firm of Wickwire and Pincus have claims for the plaintiff for the false and fraudulent packing of apples sold by them to the plaintiff, and letters have been written to the said Morris and Palmer by the said firm of Wickwire and Pincus demanding damages on behalf of the plaintiff for such false and fraudulent packing of apples. 3. I also understand that J. M. Lamont, of Lantzville, has also made an affidavit to be used on the part of the defendant on his said application. The said Lamont is municipal councillor for Ward 4 in this said county of Kings. A large number of persons against whom the said firm of Wickwire and Pincus have such claims as aforesaid for the plaintiff, reside in the said ward and are on the voters' list used at municipal elections for said ward. Said Lamont is also a buyer of apples in the said county of Kings. 4. I have endeavored to get affidavits from leading merchants, apple dealers, farmers and others in the county of Kings, as to the prejudice existing in the county of Kings against the plaintiff in relation to his said claims. All of such persons admitted the existence of said prejudice and stated that in their opinion a fair trial of this action could not be

had a jury in the county of Kings declined to make affidavits upon the ground that the feeling was so bitter that the making of affidavits by them would injure them in business. It is a serious and damning accusation which could be made against any people who are here made under oath by Mr. Wickwire and his partner against local fruit buyers and exporters among whom are some of the most prominent political friends of Mr. Wickwire, are charged with attempting to deprive Mr. Graham of justice because of business rivalry and spite. An indignation is made that two reputable citizens would on their oath trifle with the truth because of self interest, and that a councillor would pay up an affidavit for the sake of winning votes. It is alleged that prominent men in the county are so terrified by the bitterness and prejudice of their fellow citizens that they do not speak the truth, and that the people of the county are so degraded and so filled among them twelve men who as jurors to hold evenly the scale of justice. I would of course be out of place to say an opinion upon the truth or falsity of Mr. Wickwire's sworn statements. The people of Kings are so divided as to Mr. Wickwire under oath says they are, why should such an honest, fair minded man as he, care to represent constituents so degraded? If they are too avaricious to be entrusted with the meeting out of justice, can they be expected to make a better use of the franchise. No, Mr. Wickwire! Don't entrust your political destiny to so choiced a bunch of voters as those of Kings. Go to Halifax or some other county and get fair play.

many years connected with the financial business of this council, first as assistant to the former and treasurer, the late Hon. T. L. Dodge and later through his own tenure of the office of Treasurer.

This council, therefore, feels called upon to express its appreciation of the prompt, thorough, systematic and honest manner in which Mr. Dodge has performed the duties of his position; of kindly, courteous and genial manner which, characteristic of our deceased friend, was always manifested to the full in his dealings with the council and with its members collectively and individually, and of deep and sincere sorrow for his untimely death, in which we mourn the loss of a valued official of the country and a warm personal friend.

We would further desire to convey to Mrs. Dodge our sincere sympathy and our sincere regret for the loss of her husband, and to express our appreciation of her noble and self-sacrificing services to the council.

In each case, Committee recommended the adoption of report. The Committee for Cornwallis further recommended that Overseers set out west field to orchard. Reports adopted.

Abram Jess was appointed caretaker of Court House.

The Report and accounts of Scott Act Inspector, C. S. Horanell, were then read. They showed a balance, to be assessed upon the Municipality, of \$597.67.

Coun. Illey moved, seconded by Coun. Foster, that Ernest O. Wood be Inspector of present year.

Councillor Hamilton moved in amendment that Ira L. Cox be appointed.

After a long discussion in which Councillor Illey urged the importance, in the interests of suppression of the liquor traffic, that we continue along the line that we have been going on the last two years, the vote was taken and the amendment was declared lost.

Names being called for there appeared for the amendment, Couns. Donaldson, Bishop, Anderson, Reid, Hamilton, Woodbury and S. C. Parker. (7).

Against, Couns. Covert, Illey, Balsor, Clark, Griffin, Gaul, Foster, D. F. Parker. (8).

The amendment was lost, and the motion being put, Mr. Wood was declared elected.

Coun. Gaul moved that the salary be \$250 per year.

Hamilton moved in amendment that the amount be \$200.

The amendment was withdrawn and Coun. Covert moved that salary be \$300, which after discussion, was carried.

During the discussion Coun. Illey said that a few years ago the County was paying a salary of \$100. That was advanced to \$300 on account of the loss of his orchard by the Inspectors then in office. It was understood that the Council to recoup his loss to Mr. Nichols, after which the salary would revert to the former figures. It had remained at \$300 ever since.

Coun. S. C. Parker drew attention to the fact that in addition to his salary all the expenses of the Inspector, while on duty, were also paid by the Municipality.

A delegation was heard in reference to a proposed arbitrate at Port Williams.

Mr. Bishop the chief spokesman of the delegation, first presented a petition, asking the Council to pass a resolution, urging the government to take action in the matter.

He then, in a very clear and distinct manner, set forth the advantages of the proposed arbitrate. It would do away with the necessity of a bridge at Port Williams. (The structure of the present bridge, which cost \$27,000, was worth \$50,000 to remove elsewhere, and the structure must soon be renewed, at enormous cost, if a bridge was retained). The arbitrate would improve 300 acres of dyke land, reclaim 400 acres of river-bank marsh, and afford drainage to meadow lands from Kentville to Coldbrook. It would prevent the flooding of the road across the dyke to Port Williams, the most heavily travelled piece of road in Kings County. It would afford effective sewerage to the town of Kentville. The expense would all be borne by the interests benefited and was already pledged, but, owing to the untimely and diversity of these interests, government oversight was essential.

Coun. Reid moved that the Council do express approval of the proposal to construct arbitrate as outlined in petition. Carried.

On motion of Coun. Donaldson, a Committee, consisting of the Warden and Couns. Illey, Griffin and Reid, was appointed to report on the arbitrate in reference to the matter.

On motion of Coun. Illey, resolved, that Committee on Jails do employ a jail physician and agree with him upon a rate of payment for his services.

The Presentation was read and adopted and assessment ordered in accordance therewith.

The ex-Warden, Mr. A. E. McAlister, briefly addressed the Council. Coun. Hamilton brought up the matter of the loss of horse by Mr. J. E. Webster, lost with at January, 1910.

Resolution of Council, and moved, seconded by Coun. Clark, that Mr. Webster be paid \$225. It was moved in amendment that he be paid \$100, and the amendment was carried.

Ordered, that land comprised in Slating Hill road, so called, in Ward 11, be advertised and sold.

Council adjourned.
