The consequences of a fire panic occurring in such lofty buildings as the Prince Street or West Kent Street Schools, are terrible to contemplate.

The Indian delegation to Ottawa has not yet returned, but unofficial telegrams received from the capital are most encouraging as to the success of the mission. It is currently reported, but we do not vouch for the correctness of the statement, that the General Government has agreed to take over and provide for all the wharves in the Dominion. The amount to be paid to this Province for expending these wharves is stated to be \$125,000, and a further outlay of about \$18,000 will annually be saved.

DR. STONE WIGGINS, the weather prophet, is preparing for his great storm, which, he says, he has postponed for twenty-four hours, or until the 10th inst. He is coming down to Halifax so as to receive all the news of it, which, he does not anticipate, will be very violent in Ottawa. We are not in the least bit jealous, as we want neither the Professor nor his storm. He has effectually scared the Cape Ann fishermen, however, who have positively refused to risk themselves at sea until after the 12th inst.

The Government of New Brunswick, led by Hon. Mr. Hamilton, having resigned, Mr. Blair, the Leader of the Opposition, was sent for by the Lieut. Governor, and entrusted with the duty of forming a new Cabinet. This he has succeeded in doing, it being composed as follows:—A. G. Blair, Premier and Attorney General; William E. Alder, Provincial Secretary; R. J. Ritchie, Solicitor General; James Mitchell, Surveyor General; P. G. Ryan, Minister of Public Works; T. F. Gillespie, President of the Council; Messrs. Vall, Turner and Harrison without office.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

LONDON, March 3.

Trevelyan, replying to a question in the Commons, said the Government did not intend to release Harrington, now in jail for using intimidating language, and who was recently elected member for West Meath.

In the debate on the address in reply to the speech from the Throne, Arthur O'Connor (Home Ruler) moved an amendment declaring that the distress in Ireland, and the inadequate machinery of the land and Arrears Acts, the laws governing parliamentary and municipal franchises, and the condition of the local government demanded urgent attention of the legislature.

Trevelyan said that, although the Government had no large measures concerning the government of Ireland to introduce this year, they intended to bring forward several useful measures with regard to the distress existing there. The truth was that holdings in the west of Ireland were too small. The people could not live without getting into debt. The question was whether, by giving extraordinary relief, the government should encourage emigration, which the poor were not averse to, and merely postpone the evil day.

A Dublin despatch to the News says that police have made discoveries at Rochdale of lists of names of chief members of various secret societies and documents discovered, and have been seized at the lodge in Rochdale, of which, who has been organizing secret societies in the north of England, and youngest daughter of the late Robert Hyndman, Esq., aged 17 years, and two children to mourn their loss.—R.
