



The Sealfishery of 1910 Closed

DIANA BRINGS THE KEY. THE S. S. RANGER.

The Ranger, Aurora and Diana arrived here this morning early, the lat-

ter ship bringing the key of this sea-son's sealfishery.

The Ranger, Capt. S. B. Winsor, hails for 3,500 young and 2,500 old seals, or the weight of 8,000 prime harps. She struck the seals the lat-ter part of March about 80 miles E. N. E. of the Funks and was there with the rest of the fleet, being in the same ice but away in the distance. The ship picked up the young seals here and not being powerful enough could not force into the main patch. On the 18th April the ship steamed north and for the rest of the spring punts were out and gunners were hept busy after the old fat. Thursday past the best day's work was done, but a heavy gale of N.E. wind with a high sea sprung up and the ship had to leave many seals behind. The gale increased that evening and she ran before the blast until Friday evenbefore the blast until Friday evening, and at 2 p.m. that day she nar-rowly escaped going ashore on the Round Hill Islands. Thick snow and fog accompanied the wind, and the land was sighted by Fred Bishop, one of the crew, who had just come up on the barricade. The land was dead ahead when Bishop sighted it and the ship was not far from the cliff on which a high sea ran. The captain quickly put the helm hard a starboard, and the ship answering clear-cd the island. Most of the crew tumbled upon deck. The Ranger steamed away then to the N.E. with her head to the wind and was coninually sea-swept, tons of water looding her decks and getting down brief extracts from a few leading Refarward so that the pumps had to be kept going to keep her free. Friday night two of her boats were torn from the davits by a heavy sea which poarded her and were swept away, while several articles were swept from the decks, and it was risky work for the men who were on watch to navigate the vessel in such a sea. One of the crew arrived here on the Florizel. While at the wheel he had his thumb cut off by its being caught between the helm and main boom. All the rest of the crew are well.

THE S. S. AURORA.

The Aurora, Capt. D. J. Greene, arrived here early this morning and reorts for 9,000 young harps and 2,000 old, the weight of about 13,000 young seals. She, like the Ranger, struck the seals (part of the main patch) 70 niles to the N.E. of the Funks or Caster Sunday, and next day, panned 12,000, though only 3,000 were secur-d out of the lot, the crew claiming hat the rest were stolen. The ice being very heavy the ship could not force into the main patch, and early in April steamed out to the S.E. and then N.E. after the hoods. She went down to about 200 miles E.N.E. of Cape Harrison, saw plenty of old seals but the ice was scattered and the crew could not get about on it The old seals secured were shot in work until midnight extinguishing he blaze. A stream of water was tent playing on the blaze from a hose luring this time, and the men also ormed a bucket brigade and flooded the fire out. So much water had to be used that there were several feet of it in the compartment when the fire was quenched. Considerable grub was spoiled and most of the men fearing that the ship might be destroyed got their clothing on deck preparatory to leaving her should ne-cessity arise. 

united in the question of reform in the license law. The league had 15,-000 signatures to support its request and the approval of 80 municipalities of the province. Judge Lafontaine then gave in detail what was proposed in the way of reform. First of all came early closing, namely, the closing of restaurants from 10 p.m. to 7 a.m. on ordinary week-day nights. and on Saturdays at 6 p.m. The president of the Anti-Alcoholic League argued at length the need of amend ing the present law. Other provinces had instituted a reform, and why should Quebec be more liberal than Ontario and New Brunswick on that point? Replying to a question by Premier Gouin, Judge Lafontaine sam they had the pledge of 19 out of 2. favor of their programme. The Promier asked about the delay in pass ing a by-law in Montreal on earl; closing, to which Judge Lafontain replied that the project had been dropped temporarily on account of the election of a new council, but the cense law, it was true, gave to towns the right of passing legislation or early closing, but the difficulty was that the league had to fight every individual council, which would not be the case if there were a general law

on the whole question. Judge Lafontaine took up other reforms, including the abuse on the part of special clubs which sell liguor, as well as several other matter which are mentioned in detail in th request submitted by the delegation to the Premier. The leading featur of the petition was, however, th early closing movement.

Ald. Carter, president of the Dom' nion Alliance, addressed the Premis in English. Ald. Carter said Catholic and Protestant societies were unitein the question of temperance reform

When speaking on the feeling o the present council of Montreal or the need of a temperance law, Ald Carter was asked by Premier Gouin why the council had not carried out its pledge and put into force an early closing by-law. Ald. Rev. Canon Roy, of Montreal; representing Archbishop Bruchesi, also spoke. He said the temperance movement in Quebec needed the support of the Government and of the ministry to enact legislation. The Government might feel assured that the mass of the people were behind the movement.

The remarks of Canon Roy were brief but to the point, especially when he said that not one but any number of delegations could be sent to Quebec, if the Government desired it.

Secretary Roberts, of the Dominion Alliance, also spoke, in English, in support of the request of the delegation. He took up several clauses of the requisition, insisting on one in particular, that of the separation of the grocery from the liquor trade. Mr. Roberts closed by saying that as the Government had a \$500,000 surplus the liquor traffic.

Chief Justice Sir Francis Lange er, of Quebec, in a few words referred to the working of the Quebec by-law on early closing, but, better than a by-law, he said, would be a general law for the province.

Prominent members of the delegation were: Judge Lafontaine, presi dent of the Anti-alcoholic League Ald. S. J. Carter, president of the Deminion Alliance: Rev. Canon Roy representing Archbishop Bruchesi, o Montreal; Dr. Dube, Hon. J. D. Rolland, vice-president of the league Secretary Roberts and E. J. Carson of the Dominion Alliance; ex-Ald Gallery, president of St. Ann's Temperance Society; D. Shanahan, of the C. T. A.; Dr. Normand, of Three Rivers; Father Ladislas, Franciscan; Fr Corbeli, Fr. Nantel, as well as man: other representatives of the clergy Rev. Dr. Jackson and Rev. G. H Cobbledick, of the Protestant clergy o

Quebec, were also present. Mrs. Currie, one of the delegates o the W.C.T.U., said a few words in English. She was invited to take seat, but she preferred to speal standing, whereupon the Premier an members of the Cabinet rose until the lady was seated.

Father Ladislas, O. F. M., and Joachim, O. F. M., deliver the illustrated lectures in French, and Rev. Father Ethelbert, O., F. M., in English. The lectures are to be given to all the school children attending the Catholic schools in the city. Your correspondent attended the first lecture given at St. Joseph's Hall, on Monday afternoon, April 18th, by Rev. Father Ethelbert and was very instructive. The effects of liquor on the nervous system was beautifully illustrated and explained in every de tail as well as the misery and unhappiness caused in the family by the drunken father. The drunkard's visits to the saloon, his death-bed and his grave were also portrayed. The evil effects of cigarette smoking on the young was ably dealt with by the learned lecturer, and the boys of the Belmont School and St. Joseph's were pledged to total abstinence until their 21st year, and also to abstain from cigarette smoking. The girls of St. Ann's Academy promised to pray for the success of the temperance movement in the city, and both boys and girls were asked to use their influence with their fathers in order to have them vote in favour of the reduction of saloons in the city. King's Difficult Role.

LONDON, May 2. The long holiday for the politicians may be the King's working time. Both he and the Queen had paid income taxes at the full rate of 14 pence on the pound before the Finance bill was signed. This was the practise of Queen Victoria, and they have followed it, although the treasury has no power to levy on the Crown. The example set by them will be enforced by an army of tax collectors and the deficit in the treasury will disappear and the Budget issue with it from politics. The constitutional question will remain and the Crown will be drawn into politics, unless peace can be arranged between the Houses during the next month, and the Sovereign alone has the prestige and authority for attempting to do it. Both the Unionists and the moderate liberals would be glad to have him undertake this difficult task especially as their leaders are convinced that another general election will leave the relations of the parties virtually unchanged with 20 seats won or lost and John Redmond holding the balance of power. It is an easy inference that the King is not pleased with the situation which might have been averted if his warnings last autumn respecting the suspension of the budget had been heeded.
