Report of the Feeding Experiments Made in the School of Physiology, Trinity College, Dublin:-

The preliminary announcement of the results of the experiments cou ducted at the request of the Loca Government Board for Ireland during the past year, in the School of Phy siology, Trinity College, Dublin, as t the nutritive value of Boyril, and com municated to the British Association at Sheffield ("Times" report, September 3), has created considerable interest amongst the Medical Profes-

In order to secure a decisive test dogs were first brought to a constant weight on dried dog biscuit mixed with known quantities of water. Boyril-from 21/2 to 71/2 grammes-was then added to the food, with the result that the weight of the animals went up as much as 50 to 100 grammes, or, in round numbers, 10 to 20 times the weight of the Bovril given. Afterwards Boyril was discontinued. and the animals fell back to the original weight. Compared with the effect of hard-boiled white of egg, it was found that from 8 to 10 times as much by weight of the latter had to be given to obtain the same increase in weight, or, taking the dried organic solids in the two foods, from 21/2 to 4 times as much egg white had to be given to obtain the Bovril effect.

In several of the experiments there was a retention of reserve nitrogen, and in all an increased utilisation of other foods.

It was therefore concluded that Boyril had both a direct and an indirect nutritive value, the latter by causing a more complete digestion and absorption of the other food given

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
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



The Irishmen have declared again and again that the present power of the House of Lords was the only real obstacle to Home Rule. They were in a position to bargain with the Min istry for Home Rule. The House o Lords could throw it out. Under the Veto Bill of Premier Asquith this could happen only twice in one Parliament and Home Rule be carried without the risk of an adverse verdiet by an appeal to the country the Home Rule question. Therefore it is good tactics on Redmond's part to support Asquith's appeal on the Veto Bill. That is why Irishmen called on their sympathisers to make a special effort to support their elec-tion funds liberally. That is why Dillon declares that Liberals must rise or fall with them. That is the reason why Redmond feels that he can force Asquith to carry out Home Rule. That is why T. P. O'Connor has declared frequently that the out-

look for Home Rule was never so Now look on the other picture Suppose Lansdowne's scheme had been adopted. Much time would have been eaten up in agreeing to it. The Pre nier said: "We are living in times o apid movement, when it is a relief o wake up any morning and not find some fresh part of the constitu-tion reconstrued." He described Mr. Balfour's "turn about face" on the juestion of the Reform of the House of Lords and Tariff Reform as unique and almost indecent. He said that could not imagine a greater cari cature of the Referendum than put ing a few abstract questions to the eople without concrete embodiment of their proposals. If any one but a sane and responsible statesman had ontemplated such a scheme he would e called a madman. Some of he prisoners are believed to be the emaining members of the gang, the eaders of which were arrested last winter and are serving terms aggregating 15 years in the Federal Prison at Atlanta for counterfeiting. Today's arrests were made by Richard H. Taylor, head of the Secret Service in this city, his agents and members of the Italian Bureau of Metro-politan Police. Nine men were held o be turned over to the Federal authorities to-morrow. The other four men were parolled as witnesses. The Lupo gang were headed by "Lupo the Wolf," who received a sentence of 3) years, and Guiseppe Morello, sentenced to 25 years. The Parrell mur-der was laid to members of the band, which manufactured counterfeit bills on a farm near Highland, N.Y. Notwithstanding the fate of the men ar rested last winter, the circulation o counterfelt money continued, and Secret Service men believed that members of the gang out of jail were putting out the bogus money which had been saved from the former raid. As a result of several weeks of investi-gation, the house in which the counterfeit bills were stored was found, and the men suspected were rounded The counterfeit money, consist ng of bogus two and five dollar bills. Taylor says, was found in a fire place in the rear of a cellar of a wine merchant-one of the men under arrest

TRINITY SPUR LINE.

Editor Evening Telegram. Sir.-I notice a communication your issue of the 22nd, signed "Elector," anent the much talked of Spur Line to Trinity.

"Elector" is evidently a resident of Trinity East, and takes exception to my expression "centre of population" referring to Trinity, and endeavors to show up the littleness of the latter place and the greatness of the former, and for that purpose he quotes the population of Trinity and forgets to add the population of the settlements to the west of us, such as the Southside, Cuckhold's Cove, Trouty, Spanfard's Cove and the Bonaventures; while at the same time he claims the population of Port Rexton, Salmon Cove and English Harbor, thereby misrepresenting the facts which ne says "needs ventilation" and "ventilates" them "on the bias."

I have not the figures of the last

census at hand, but the last list of voters gives Trinity and the Southside 46 more voters than Trinity East and Freshwater, while Cuckhold's Cove to Spaniard's Cove is credited with about 70 less than Ship Cove and Robin Hood (now Port Rexton), while the voters for the Bonaventures almost equal those of Salmon Cove and English Harbor. Assuming then that the population is in proportion to the list of voters in both sections it can be seen that there is not so much difference in population as "Elector tries to make out in his "ventilation" if this matter, and he proves himself have lived in too small a world, and Crinity can still claim to the "centre f population," and also what has een for 300 years the "centre of rade" for the North Side of the Bay. and trade is what makes railways, and Trinity's trade is one of the "whys and wherefore's" for the extension of the Spur Line. And when it comes to claiming population as regards trade, Trinity is able to claim a goodly porion of population from Ireland's Eye and British Harbour down, even inluding Trinity East, Port Rexton, Salmon Cove and English Harbor.

The business houses of Trinity numer 8 or 9 and four of these handle he products of the fishery, and it is estimated that the trade of the business people of Trinity amount to a turn over of between \$200,000 to \$200,000, and thus trade comes from settlements to the East as well as to he West of Trinity.

These are facts, Mr. Editor, that 'Elector" cannot claim for Trinity Cast, as until the past Spring it could ot boast of a single business place, nd Port Rexton did not fare much etter, and now if a fisherman wants supplies for the fishery or wants to dispose of his catch after it is procured, it is to Trinity that he must come, and it is to Trinity that he English Harbor (the places from which "Elector" gets his extra 11.000 opulation) than Port Rexton and just as near as Trinity East.

"Elector" couples Trinity East and ort Rexton together and compares hem with the population of Tring out he overlooks the fact that each those places is to have a railway tion, and his argument of delay in topping at Trinity could be used just as forcibly by Bonavista people against delay at both Prinity East and ort Rexton.

If the station is to be built at Gott's eve, Trinity with its population qual to Trinity East or Port Revton. everally, and with its greater importnce as regards the amount of freight be handled will be worse off than ither of the latter settlements, and the business people will have to warn all shippers dont't ship by rail.

As the Premier and Colonial Secetary have both seen the justice of our demands and have promised us that the original intention of the Government will be carried out it is not necessary at present to produce more 'reasonable evidence" for the extension of the line unless the Government further forgets its promises and Artistic and durable. R. H. TRAP- fails to commence the extension when the Spring opens.






