A POLITICAL **OUTRAGE IN** PLACENTIA.

Morris Government Costing Annually Over Seven Thousand Dollars.

Sir .- Just a few lines from Argentia to express our views on the "givings out," going on in this district. A few old-timers met last week in Phil's hospitable kitchen and after talking price of fish and the record of high liners at Cape St. Mary's, we got down to an argument about the high cost of living.
