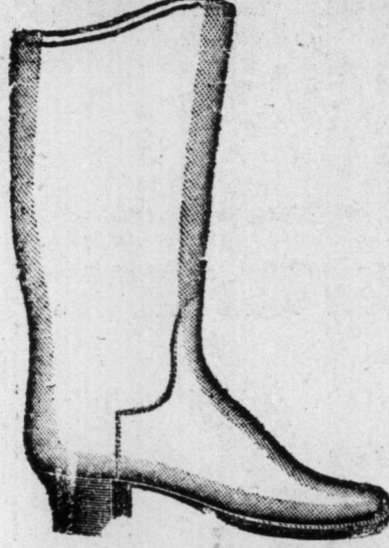

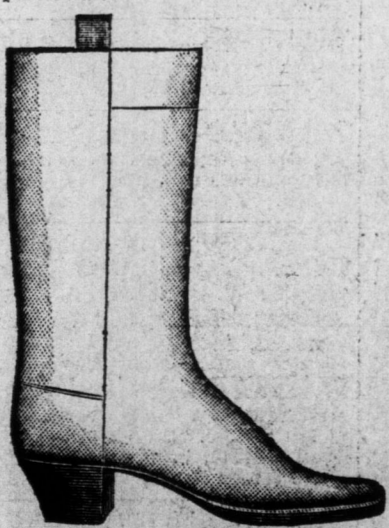

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, To-day.

The report that an armistice has been agreed to by Bulgarians and Turks along the Tchatalja lines for the burial of the dead appears to be unfounded. Despatches from Nazim Pasha, Turkish commander, show the artillery duel continues to-day. The Turks claim success against the Bulgarians, but nothing indicates that the Bulgarians have yet made any serious attempt to penetrate the lines. The battle may be ended at any moment by Turkey accepting the allies' terms for armistice, which are said to include the surrender of the Tchatalja lines, Adrianople, Durazzo and Scutari. There is a possibility, however, that Turkey may decline to surrender Tchatalja. While her western army has been completely defeated, Turkey still possesses, according to correspondents at the front, a homogeneous army behind the Tchatalja fortifications, largely composed of some of her best fighting materials from Asiatic provinces, which have not yet been in action. Moreover the demoralization and disorganization which followed the Kirk Killaseh and Lule Burgas retreats, appear to have been remedied and the army is now well supplied with food and ammunition. Under these circumstances the Porte may be induced to make a further stand in the hope of securing peace on easier conditions. The prospect of European dissensions, arising out of the settlement of various territorial claims to be arranged after the war, becomes daily more menacing. Austria has not presented an actual ultimatum. Serbia is setting a time limit for a reply to certain inquiries, which she has formulated, but short of that, relations between the two countries are very strained and Serbia's evident intention will be still another defiance of Austria. Vice Admiral Cuccoli of the Austrian delegation, warned its members to be prepared for the rise of a powerful Balkan navy in the Aegean Sea. This is one sign of a rearrangement of South Eastern Europe as a result of the war which is likely to keep European chancellors in a state of tension for a long time to come. Both Austria and Russia are taking measures so that they may be prepared for any eventuality. It is reported from Petersburg that Russia is purchasing several hundred guns abroad. According to dispatch from Belgrade, the disposition of Monastir, not being provided for by the Prior arrangement of the Allies, will likely cause trouble. Servians wish to establish their claim. It is intended the King of Serbia shall make a triumphal entry into the city. On the other hand Bulgarians claim Monastir is situated predominately in Bulgaria's district, and the Greeks contend that the leading part of the population is of Greek nationality.

The Morris Agricultural Policy.

A resident of Northern Bay tells us there was a standing exhibition of the Morris Agricultural Policy in that settlement all the months of the fall. It was not an exhibition of how two blades of grass could be grown where only one blade of grass grew before. It was not an exhibition of grass growing at all. It was an exhibition of potato culture from Government seed.

It seems that there was a doling out of Government potato seed, and in many of the potato patches part of the ground was sown with the Government seed. Much curiosity was aroused as to the relative success of the seeding, and folks watched with interest the plants break ground, sprout, and reach their full growth. As the season progressed interest increased, until the Government potato plants became the talk of the settlement.

People would lean over the fences and comment on the way the Government seed had come on. They would compare it with the growth of the seeds they had purchased themselves, and talk would wax and wane, and begin again, until the Morris Agricultural Policy occupied their whole attention.

They had heard much of the wonderful talk of making two blades of grass grow where only one grew before. But their thoughts were not centred on grass, although they were watching with dismay the palpable shortage of hay, which was gradually creating consternation among them and making them wonder how they were going to keep their cattle alive during the winter.

But still their eyes were fixed on the potato patches where the Government seed had been sown, and amazement grew apace with the season, and wonder increased as they contemplated the potato patches and meditated upon these samples of Morris's Agricultural masterpiece.

As we have mentioned several times, they had heard of Morris's ambition to grow two blades of grass where one grew before, and they wondered whether two potatoes would grow where only one grew before.

If only Morris had supplied them with Government seed to make two blades of grass grow in place of one they would have had an easy mind on the feeding of their cattle during the winter.

They observed that the potatoes came on all right from the seed they had bought themselves, and if only two potatoes would grow from the Government seed, where they could get one from seed of their own, they would do exceedingly well.

But, alas! for the frailty of Government seed, and the vanity of human hope, the Government seed proved infertile. The Morris patches remained bare while a luxuriant growth clothed the neighbouring patches. The Government seed was full of dead eyes. The Morris patches became the cynosure of all eyes. Morris's masterpiece became the talk of the settlement, and the people declare they have had more than enough of a Government of Dead-Eyes.

RIEKA, Montenegro, Nov. 19. A combined army of Serbians and Montenegrins to-day occupied the town of Alessio, near the Adriatic coast. Alessio has been the chief source of supply for the besieged Turkish garrison of Scutari. Although only a small place of 1,000 inhabitants it is a position of great importance.

SOFIA, Nov. 19. Reviewing the campaign, the Sofia correspondent of the Times estimates that 50,000 men have succumbed to wounds or disease, that is about one-fourth of the whole male population. The significance of this great sacrifice, he says, is scarcely realized in the country, which bears its losses with admirable stoicism. There is no list of dead and wounded. Nobody asks for it. The correspondent says that the Bulgarian troops are abundantly supplied with rakia, a spirit made from grapes, at Kiri, Klisesh, which is regarded as an effective prevention of cholera.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 19. The artillery fight along the lines of Tchatalja was less violent yesterday than on Sunday. According to reports from Nazim Pasha, the Turkish commander-in-chief, firing occurred along the whole line of fortifications. He continues: "We repulsed the enemy's infantry, who tried to advance at some points. Among the wounded who arrived at Constantinople yesterday, was General Mahmud Mukhtar, who suffered from a bullet wound in the leg. He was the Turkish General who successfully attacked the Bulgarian left wing at Bumarissa, during the battle of Lule Burgas."

SOFIA, Nov. 19. Bulgaria's conditions for agreeing to an armistice were transmitted to Constantinople early this morning. They are accompanied by Bulgaria's

main condition for the conclusion of peace. The principal stipulation permits Turkey to retain Constantinople and a strip of coast territory in Europe.

SOFIA, Nov. 19. The allied Balkan nations to-day assented to Turkish proposals to discuss terms of armistice, with a view to eventual peace.

LONDON, Nov. 19. An eight hours armistice has been agreed upon between the Bulgarians and Turks at Tchatalja, so that both armies may bury their dead.

LONDON, Nov. 19. It is thought that the Bulgarians will have probably to call on their allies to bring forces, released by the fall of Monastir, to their aid at Tchatalja. Sixty per cent. of the Ottoman troops holding the famous lines of Tchatalja are said to be fresh battalions of Turkey's finest soldiers brought from Asia Minor.

VIENNA, Nov. 19. Professor Krauss, and five other bacteriologists started for Sofia to-day to fight cholera and typhoid, which has broken out there.

LONDON, Nov. 19. The occupation of Alessio by the combined Servian and Montenegrin armies, giving them another foothold on the Adriatic sea, is considered in diplomatic circles as likely to add fuel to the flames of the Austro-Servian dispute, which have again sprung up in a critical way. Emperor Francis Joseph has remarked: "We are in favor of peace, but not peace at any price; we cannot stand for everything." The Austro-Hungarian Cabinet has sent a sharp note to the Servian Government demanding a precise reply to all questions at issue. According to the "Zeit" the note is of a distinctly threatening tone; and it adds that vigorous military measures will give emphasis to diplomatic demands, should Serbia's answer be unsatisfactory. Some papers assert Serbia is preparing to concentrate her main force on the Austrian frontier.

and diplomats do not exclude the possibility that Serbia, relying on the sympathy of the Slavs in Austro-Hungary, and on the support of the Balkan Allies, may challenge the issue.

LONDON, this morning. The Commons, by a vote of 318 to 207, adopted the new financial resolution of the Home Rule Bill. This replaces the resolution defeated on Nov. 11th.

NEW YORK, Nov. 19. "Gyp the Blood," "Lefty Louie," "Whitey Lewis" and "Dago Frank," the gunmen charged with the murder of Herman Rosenthal, for which Lieutenant Becker is now under death sentence, were found guilty of murder in the first degree this afternoon.

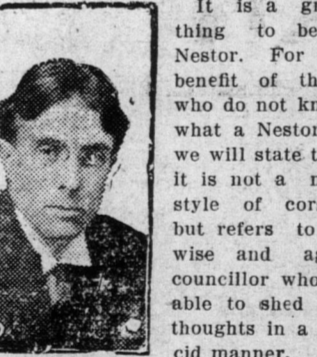

Marse Henri is not a mere citizen of Louisville. He is an institution, like the Carnegie library or the water works plant. He is a ripe old flower of southern chivalry, pugnacious, yet kindly, bitter in his enmities but soft-hearted as a child. 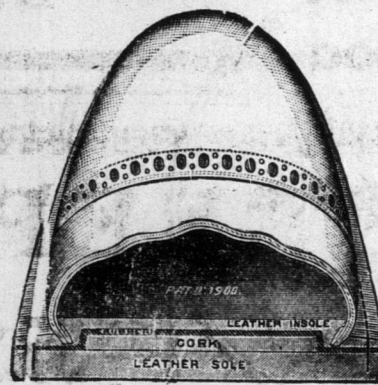

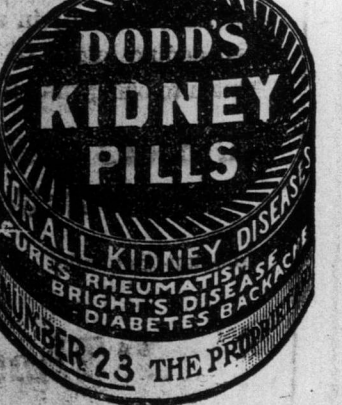

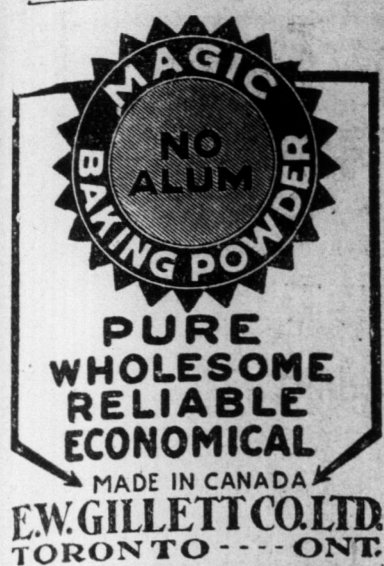

A POLITICAL OUTRAGE IN PLACENTIA.

Seventeen New Jobs Created by the Morris Government Costing Annually Over Seven Thousand Dollars.

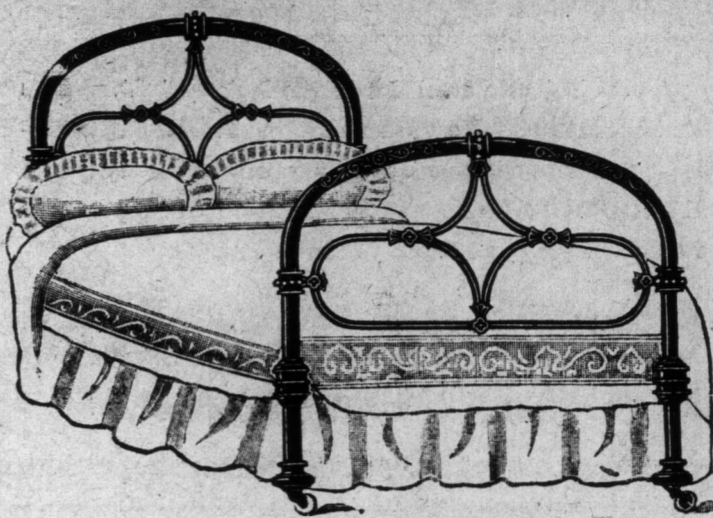

Complains of South Side Road.

A resident of the South Side of the city called at the office of the Evening Telegram yesterday to complain of the way the interests of the South Side are neglected, and public money spent in ways that could be bettered. He objected to public money being spent on a ferry and on the purchase of premises and the building of a wharf, while the roads are so narrow. He contends that the money could have been better applied in the widening of the street. He says that there is considerable traffic along the road, especially since the coal stores have been established on the South Side, and that the road is not wide enough for two carts to pass. He points out that the fire engine is 10 feet wide and that the road is only 12 feet wide. The traffic becomes congested. There is no room for passers-by and a few months ago a boy had his toes crushed by a passing cart owing to the narrowness of the road. He asks why money was spent on a wharf and a ferry, when money is wanted to make the road wide enough to take the traffic of carts and passers-by. The road is so narrow and the traffic is so great that parents fear to let the children out on the South Side.




