

WASHINGTON, June 20. reported in press despatches vester day, as indicating that Constantinople is in no immediate fear of occupation by the Allies, created a deep impression in the Balkan diplomatic circles here. 





Rome, June 14.—Details now to hand show that the deed for which Colonel Rossi, of the 12th Bersaglieri, was visited in the hospital on Satur-day by the King and decorated with the silver medal for valor, was no or-

the Isonzo against the Austrian posi-tion. At the critical moment, when tion. At the critical moment, when three parts of a pontoon bridge had been shot away, the Austrians hurled a strong force against the Italians in an attempt to hurl them into the river. Rossi and his regiment found themselves with a raging torrent in the rear and a superior force of the enemy confronting them.
"Forward, for glory and Italy"

cried Rossi, and the trapped soldiers responded nobly. They flung themselves upon the Austrian infantry. holding a bridge head, and broke through. Then they stormed the enemy's artillery position on the heights commanding the river.

Fell at Head of Men.

At the moment of victory Rossi fell wounded at the head of his men. "Never mind me, children," he cried, as he fell on his face with a bullet in his breast. "Forward, forward, for the sake of Italy!"

Forward went the soldiers, their ranks sadly thinned, and only halted in their charge when the Italian flag had been hoisted on the summit of the Austrian position.
In the hospital King Victor Em-

manuel was moved to tears as he be-held the wounded officer. "Your Majesty," said Rossi feebly I am not worthy of such honor." 'Brave son of Italy, I salute you," esponded the King, as he pinned the decoration on the colonel's breast and notified him of his promotion to the rank of Brigadier-General.


