Samuel Hynes Was Badly Injured.

As a result of injuries sustained whilst sliding over Brazil's Square on last Wednesday night, one of the parties, Samuel Hynes, of Charlton St., was put under chloroform yesterday afternoon to discover what injury had resulted. The man had been made unconscious by the shock of the bob-sled striking the pole and ever since has been suffering great pain. The doctor is not yet sure whether an operation will have to be performed or not.

Call for Alcohol by War and Distillers.

Ottawa, Ont., Feb. 17.—With the prohibition tide mounting in Canada, and the consumption of liquor decreasing, the war is coming to the rescue of the distillers. Alcohol is now being used for killing purposes directly. Large quantities of it are wanted by the British Government for the manufacture of explosives. From alcohol is manufactured acetone, and acetone is largely used in the manufacture of cordite. The British Government has already commandeered distilleries in the United Kingdom, so as to control the output of alcohol needed for the manufacture of explosives. The distillers are now being asked to augment the British and French supplies. It is understood that large orders for acetone have already been placed in Canada. As yet, however, the Government here has not been asked to commandeer any of the distilleries and it is not thought probable that such action will have to be taken.

War Taxation.

We direct the attention of the Government and particularly the Minister of Finance to the Canadian War Taxation recently set forth by Sir William White, Minister of Finance, in his Budget Speech in the Dominion House of Commons. It affords a colonial precedent of what is already being done by the home country. A tax of 25 per cent is being imposed on profits in excess of certain margins, made since the beginning of the war. In the old country shipping companies are called upon to pay into the Exchequer 50 per cent. of their excess profits. A War Loan of \$1,000,000 was announced at the last session of the Legislature. At the next session of the Legislature we expect to hear of another War Loan of a million dollars and possibly before the war closes, a third million for war purposes will have to be raised. Each million will impose a charge of about \$50,000 annually. In addition to this the country will be called upon to bear the burden of War Pensions and other disbursement charges. Heavy as these charges will be, they are light as compared proportionately with the burden which the people at home are and will be called upon to bear.

During the past year in Newfoundland very handsome excess profits have been made by the sale of the ice breaking steel steamers for ice breaking purposes in the White Sea. Newfoundland has lost the use of these steamers at the seal fishery, and their absence renders more difficult the handling and the transportation of coal flour and other necessities. Some folks indeed suggest that the Government should substitute a steam-

to assist in bringing flour and other necessities here as a war measure.

The substantial taxation of the great profit, made by the sale of these ice-breakers over the investments made in them, would form a fund out of which might be paid the charges for such a war measure or such charges as we have indicated in this article. The revenue from the taxation of the profits on the sale of these steamers would not be an annual tax, as the transactions are all single ones and are all closed, and will not be repeated. But it might form a fund which would meet the annual war charges during the period of the war, and for a year or two afterwards, and thus ease the strain on the general public.

Fires are a form of national entertainment which is becoming more popular in America with each decade. The American fire has been so improved in effectiveness and in spectacular features in late years, that it is now able to draw its audience from a baseball game, a prize fight or an aeroplane race with equal force.

Fires are viewed with pleasure and enthusiasm by all classes, from the limousine to the kerosene strata. A good fire costs more to produce than grand opera, and is even more unprofitable to the proprietor as a rule.

Fires are caused by over-heated chimneys, spontaneous combustion, cigarettes, crossed wires, exploding stoves, and poor husbandry. When a building becomes feverish from any of these causes, the fire department is instantly called and it adds to the horror of the occasion by squirting water on the piano, the hardwood floors and the cook. America has the most talented and resourceful water squirts in the world, which is only natural, however, because they have three times as many fires to practise on as the firemen of any other country.

Fires usually visit our homes in the night and are more terrible as guests than burglars or convention delegates. Almost every American citizen has been compelled at least once in his life to rise at a very few a.m., dress himself in a plug hat and a portiere and lower himself down the smoke-filled back stairs with a baby in one hand and a waste basket in the other. When fires occur in schools, hotels or theatres, the consequences are unspeakably sad at times, because of the prevailing American habit of making buildings safe for their occupants only after they have burned down. However, each holocaust causes a new law to be passed and many lives are thus saved. Among our most valuable martyrs are the men, women and children who have given their lives as evidence that our building laws need improving and enforcing. Other countries adopt reforms before hints of this sort can be given, but we are not so stingy with our citizens. We have plenty of them and can well afford to lose a few hundred now and then, rather than to harrow the sensitive soul of some politician by insisting that he work at his public job.

Hundreds of millions of dollars' worth of buildings are burned in America each year, and this fact is alluded to with great scorn by our critics. However, as far as the burning of buildings goes, the fire fiend is one of America's greatest friends, because he saves the lives of so many people.

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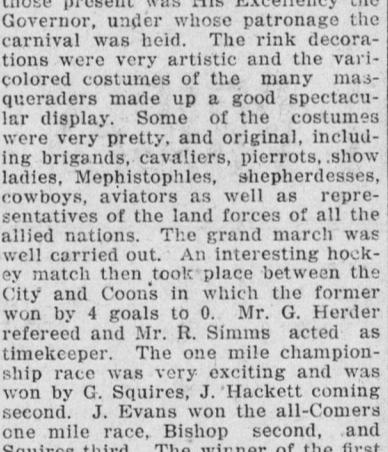

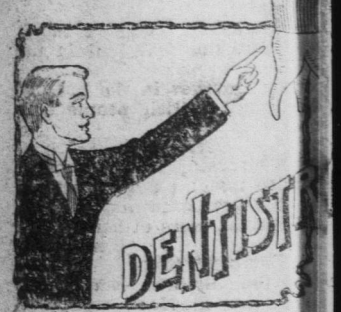
