



Both sound economic principles and experience everywhere teach that the government will be well advised to leave prices, at their inception, severely alone. They depend to at least nine-tenths upon natural laws which do not recognise the sovereignty of the Colonial Building. It is not so with supply, still less

with demand. If the country has paid a high price for flour it has in general been able to afford it, for it has obtained unpreced-ented prices for its products. But the ented prices for its products. But the very serious problem that faces us is, not what the cost of flour may be, but whether, sooner or later, there will be any flour at all. By ninety per cent. of our people this possibility is ignored. There is the greatest indifference, the greatest stupidity and the greatest selfishness prevalent. 

PERSHING'S PARTY IN ENGLAND.



Third Interim Report of Food Commission.

THE MATTER OF FLOUR. His Excellency,

Sir W. E. Davidson Governor of Newfoundland.

Sir,-The undersigned, the Commissioners appointed to investigate the High Cost of Living, beg to present this third interim report, which als with the question of Flour, as follows:-

We find that the average annual import of flour is roughly, 400,000 barrels, which represent a consumption of over 1,000 barrels a day. Under ordinary circumstances the great bulk of this flour was imported by a small number of dealers, who, as 12½c. per 100 lbs.; or 26¾c. per baragents for mills, sold much of it to rel of gross weight 214 lbs., and from for mill agents and dealers, whether other dealers in carload lots, and received as remuneration a brokerage fee of from ten to fifteen cents a barrel; while such flour as they imported on their own account, to sell in competition with these and other dealers, was usually sold at a wholesale profit of twenty to twenty-five cents a barrel. All of these importers and middlemen, in turn sold to retailers whose profit rarely, if ever, exceeded fifty cents a barrel and who frequent-
