

**Battle Raging Ov** oners and Twe **Bulgaria From** in Perilous Posi

WAR REVIEW.

Twelve towns and more than 5.000 erman prisoners have been taken by American troops fighting in conjuncion with the French in a new offentive begun with the break of day on Thursday, in the region extending rom the northwest of Verdun to withn 15 miles of the cathedral city of Rheims. The Americans advanced to depth of seven miles, overcoming he stubborn resistance of the enemy. Pennsylvania, Kansas and Missouri troops were among the fighting fores which in less than a day won teritory of great importance to the eneny and further depleted his army through men captured or killed or wounded. The gage of battle has been thrown down on a 40-mile front. extending from the Suippe River in Champagne, 15 miles east of Rheims eastward through the Argonne forest to the Meuse River, northwest of Veriun. In the first stages of the battle the Allied lines were pushed forward for material gains to that portion immediately northwest of Verdun held by the Americans, to a depth of from five to six miles, and that of the French to the west nearly four miles at certain places. Under the terrible bombardment preceding the commencement of the battle, the Germans hurriedly quit numerous positions and into these the Americans and French went unimpeded. At last accounts the Allied attack was progressing favorably. Many French villages and German strong points have been captured. British troops have invaded Bulgaria from the north of Lake Poiran in Macedonia, marking another epoch in the history of the war. side from the moral effect of the enetration of the mountainous country of King Férdinand, the manoeuvre is likely to prove of great strategic value once the Strmitza River valley, leading towards the Sofia-Seres railway is reached. In the meantime, days of adversity continue with the Teutonic forces in Southern Serbia and Palestine, and the British and French are keeping up their manoeuvres which are gradually bringing the important town of St. Quentin into their hands. In Serbia, the Serbians, Italians, Greeks and British are still threatening the enemy forces with disaster by reason of their rapid advance and the state of confusion into which the Bulgarian and German armies have been thrown by the shock

London, Sept. 19 .- Baku, in Trans-Causasia, has been evacuated by the British, who have withdrawn their forces to North Persia.


The evacuation was made necessary, it is stated, because of the lack of steadiness on the part of Armenian troops when they were attacked by the Turks during August. By the end of that month it was realized that the co-operation to the local Government. and its forces would not be sufficient-ly effective to justify the retention of the small detachment in the face of the numbers which the enemy could collect.

On September 1 the evacuation was definitely decided upon, but on the same day the Turks again attacked and the Allies of the British, the reports state, again failed to co-operate. The result was that the Royal Warwickshire Regiment had to cover a Russo-Armenian retirement, and it is feared that this force lost heavily.

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
