



Shortly before one o'clock Mrs.

Arousing her husband, she told him of the fact, and he immediately switched on the electric light. Seeing that the room was filled with smoke, and that the rear of the house was burning at St. Mary's. farcely, they waked their little boy Tommy. While Mr. Carter was 'phoning an alarm into the Fire Station, Mrs. Carter called the girl, Janet Daley. Just now the lights went out as a result of the connection becoming burnt, and Mr. Carter, seeing no other way of escape, smashed out the ond storey on the front of the house. By standing on the lintel of a lower window he assisted Mrs. Carter and the child through the window. Then, while his wife and son clung to the ledge of the upper window and rested their feet on the lintel of the one beneath. Mr. Carter dropped to the sidewalk and, with the slight assistance of Mrs. Carter, the boy was gotten safely down. Mrs. Carter then let caught by her husband. Thus neither of them was injured. PLACED IN ST. JOHN'S MUSEUM.

It is pleasing to note that greater It is pleasing to note that greater interest is being manifested in our Museum, and that lately, several valuable and historic relics and documents have been added to the contents. One of more than passing interest is that of the famous old sword presented by the veteran Capt. Nicholas Peddle of Bristol's Hope, Conception Bay, a brief sketch of which we subjoin. HISTORIC SWORD.

The sword is received from Capt. Nichelas Peddle, the Poet of Bristol's Hope. It was brought by the first of the Peddle family to Newfoundland about the year 1675. It is said he was a rebel in Wales, and escaped from the Welsh Mountains. During the attack of the French in 1696 under the femous General Diberville. famous General D'Iberville, every settlement in the Ferryland District to St. John's and thence to Conception Bay and Trinity Bay surrendered to the French attack with the excep-tion of the two hundred (200) gallant Newfoundland fishermen on Carbon-ear Island.

Many attacks were made to take this Island, and during one attack a boat's crew got to the landing place, and one man jumped ashore on the "Stone Beach" but Captain Peddle with this old sword threw him back into the water. into the water.

This Sword was on exhibition during the Guy Celebration in 1910, and attracted great attention.







Synthetic Rubies.

The large quantities of synthetic ubies brought home by soldiers as 'souvenirs of Eden" make one speculate as to how long the real Oriental rubies will retain their present

Rubies chemically produced by the usion of alumina are being manuactured in larger and larger numpers both in Paris and Switzerland. Within the past few weeks uncut bottle-shaped stones each weighing fully hundred carats, have reached this country from Switzerland.

They would probably split up if atempts were made to "cut" them as single jewels. Each, however, could be fashioned into five or six cintillating gems, and these would be almost as attractive in appearance as the naturally-produced stones.

The best synthetic rubies, if without the deep fire of the "pigeon-blood" rubies of Burma, are beautiful things, and are indistinguishable, except by experts, from natural crystals. A tiata or pendant of well-cnut and well-mounted Parisian or Swiss rub-ies on a beautiful head or neck would attract all eyes. And though its gems were produced by human agency and not by the forces of Na-ture, its owner could truthfully say
