# Sweden Seeks to Retain

STOCKHOLM, July 16 (A.P.)-It cording to a new law which has just been passed

The new citizenship regulation requires five years' residence, instead of three, for the naturalization of immigrants. According to the old law a Swedish woman lost her citizenship upon marriage to a man who was not a Swedish citizen. But under the new law such a married woman retains her national allegiance to Sweden until she becomes naturalized under the laws of some other country.

Under the old law Swedes residing abroad for a period of ten years autoized in the country of residence. But under the new law Swedish citizen by birth who has been domiciled in Sweden retains his political status wherever he resides unless he should bcome naturalized in some other country. Persons whose Swedish citimay have it renewed so as to come within the scope of the new law by a simple written application to any Swedish consulate or legation.



MONDAY, Aug. 11. The House met at 3 p.m., and then followed a discussion on deferring the Liquor Bill. All the members of the Opposition participated in the debate so that nearly two hours elapsed before the report of the Special Committee was submitted, and a motion made that it be moved to committee of the whole . House. The report was signed by all the Committee except three. They brought in what was termed a report of the minority. The Prime Minister and Attorney General pointed out that there was no division of the Committee, and there was no mention of a minority report until it was made on the floors of the House. Mr. Warren pointed out that Mr. Hickman could only bring in his min-

ority report as an amendment. Subsequently the amendment asking for deferment of the bill was put to a vote, those voting for it being Messrs. Hickman, Grimes, Hibbs, Halfyard, Duff, Scammell and Ashourne. Mr. Warren crossed the floors and voted with the Government bloc. When the report was put the same division resulted.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir .- The writer will consider it a favour to be given space in the columns of your paper to correct certain erroneous publications that of late have come to our notice concerning the Harbour Deep operations, wherein it has been stated that 600 to 650 men would be required at Hr. Deep the coming winter; accommodation had been made for 75 families and that all logging would have to be done by contract.

We desire to say that early this Spring the writer took over all the Hr. Deep logging equipment, horses, stores, shop, dwellings, plant, etc., and contracted to erect a Rosser Mill which is now near to completion, ross and ship last year's cut, amounting to about 14,000 cords of wood, and put in a cut of around 15,000 cords the coming winter to be rossed and shipped in the summer of 1925. Logging operations will begin as soon after the 15th of August as weather conditions will permit. We can look after 350 to 400 men, preparations are being made to accommodate 35 to 40 families only, and no decision whatever has been arrived at, or stipulation made that all logging is to be done by contract.

"Britain had great natural advanages, greater than any of her competitors in Europe. Britain had the best coal supply, the most fertile land, and on the whole a temperate climate. The climate was a little fickle, perhaps, but when it rained it dropped fatness. Yet we were buying three hundred and fifty millions' worth of food.
