Mysterious Death.

As we go to press a rather mysterious circumstance is being investigated before Dr. Keating, at Merlihan's Hotel.

It appears that the wife of Francis Parker, a farmer living in Puslinch, sent to Dr. Reilly, of Hamilton, a few weeks ago, for a woman to do the work at the house in the room of her daughter, who left home. Mrs Catherine Kennedy, a

left home. Mrs. Catherine Kennedy, a young widow, came in response, bringing a child about two months old, it having been born on the 14th of April last. The child appeared to be quite healthy until last Wednesday, when it took suddenly ill, and according to the statement of the mother died about midnight. The mother had gone out in the evening to mik the cows and left the child on the bed. Mrs. Parker, hearing it cry, took the child out of bed and put it in the eradle with her own child, leaving her daughter to watch it; and when Mrs. Kennedy returned her child was in convulsions, and giving every symptom that it was dying. The mother avers that she said to Mrs. Parker's daughter "You have done something to the child," and that the girl left the room and slammed the door, but this statement is denied by Mrs. Parker. Dr. Herod's evidence went to show that the child had received an injury, and that there were no traces of foul play.

(From a Correspondent)

On Friday afternoon, Mrs. Ducenberry, of Acton, stepped into Mr. C. Mander's Drug Store to obtain some tartaric acid, to use as a drink combined with baking sods. Mr. Mander being in, she obtained the tartaric acid from him as she thought and took it home and put about a teaspoonful of the drug or acid in a tumbler with a teaspoonful of baking sods, and in a few minutes she felt herself getting sick at the atomach with inclination to vomit. Mr. Ducenberry came in and found her in a bad state and immediately gave her some hot water to make her vomit. Then he ran and called Doctor Carter, who was on the spot in a few minutes, as he happened to be at home, and when he saw Mrs Ducenberry he knew she had been taking poison, so the Dr. wished to see the mixture or acid. He tasted it and found it to be tartar emetic, but as tartar emetic is almost tasteless the Dr. took rather too much of it and almost lost his life by it. The Dr. could not vomit the poison off, and it remained on his stomach until the next day, which produced severe cramps and inflammation. But it is a question whether the Dr. will ever recover from the effects of the poison. He started yesterday for the minerel springs in order to try to get his health restored. Mr. Ducenberry also tasted the drug, and suffered very much, also though he vomited pretty freely. He and his wife are recovering slowly.

division of the Conference, the confederation of British American Methodism,
and union with the Methodist New Connexion Church.

There were 418 quarterly meetings entitled to vote -280 are therefore required
to make the two-fineds majority necessary
to carry these regulations into effect. The
first question concerns the union with
the Conference of Eastern British
America. The report showed 370 yeas
and 2 nays, an excess of 90 over the
needed majority.

America. The report showed 370 yeas and 2 nays, an excess of 90 over the needed majority.

Concerning the Union with the Methodist New Connexion, 360 yeas and 12 nays. Concerning the surrender of the veto power, hitherto possessed by the Quarterly Meetings, and the acceptance by the laity of representation in the General Conference instead, the vote is reported as 339 yeas and 33 yeas.

On the change of the Constitution, in view of union with other Conferences, 311 yeas and 31 nays.

On the change of the Constitution of the Canadian Conference, in view of no union being effected, 305 yeas and 67 nays.

The President stated that he had received official instruction from the Conference of E. B. America that all the points involved had been accepted almost unanimously. He also stated that no official information had yet been received from the Methodist New Conmexion; but a deputation had been appointed to ask the Conference to consent to an alteration in one of the articles of agreement.



Dr. Sangster's Case. For some time past the public have been treated to a great many articles and letters in the Toronto and other papers on Dr. Sangster's candidature the Teachers' representative at the Council of Public Instruction. His private life and family troubles have been paraded day after day. The scandal about his treatment of his first wife, the procuring of a divorce -said to be a sham one—and his subsequent marriage to a young lady, to whom it is said he had been paying his attentions before he was separated from his first wife, are now well known to all readers, and are the subject of daily comment. In view of all these disclosures, we think the teachers of Ontario should pause before they commit them selves, and choose him as their representative. We are glad to notice that many of them are beginning to reflect upon the results which would follow from such a course, and the disgrace which would attach to their selection of a man at the Saurgelon's. It can be proved on oral and written testimony that Dr. Sangster was paying attentions to his present wife in 1867; that he wrote letters in 1869 to his first wife, abusing and threatening, her, and proposing that she should leave him and he would give her an allowance, but made no allusion to drunkenness or adultery. Mrs. Sangster agreed on separating, and in the fall of that year left her husband's house. A month or so after, he proposed marriage to his second wife, much to the disapprobation of her parents. Dr. Sangster wrote a letter threatening Mr. McCausland, his second wife's father, with a civil suit if he did not cease complaining of and misrepresenting his conduct. This letter was laid before Dr. Ryerson with evidence of Dr. Sangster's questionable proceedings. Dr.Ryerson got the affair compromised and promised that intercourse between the parties should cease. In February, 1871, Dr. Sangster wrote Mrss McCausland, asking her to leave the country with him, and promising to get a divorce. That letter was taken to Dr. Ryerson, and, with other documents, retained by him in Angust the two left Toronto, and in September, it is said, they were married in Detroit. The statement that after Mrs. Sangster separated from her husband they lived apart, and that during that time she had a child, is without foundation. There is no evidence that Dr. Sangster ever secured a divorce in the States.

It is painful to drag such facts before the public, but Dr. Sangster alone is to blane for this. Had he not taken the held as a candidate, this painful record of family infelicity, and subsequent attempts to square his actions by the very loose laws of the United States, might have remained in obscurity. He courted publicity, and has evoked a tale of wrong-doing which ought to bring a biush of shame to the cheek of any man who has regard for a good name and an irreproachable character.

The new Municipal Act is a very stringent one, Its 196th section provides that no member of any Council, city, town, or township, shall receive any money from the Treasurer for any work performed or to be performed.
