Foolhardy Automobilists Meet With Many Accidents in France

Paris, May 24.—The first stage in the Paris-Madrid automobile race from Versailles to Bordeaux, 383 miles finished at a furious pace into Bordeaux, having covered 10 hours and 27 minutes.

These victories were, however, clouded by a series of accidents, having in one case at least, a fatal result. At least two cars wrecked, and Marcel Renault, the winner of the race, was fatally injured, while Barrows' car was killed.

As for the number of accidents, which were fatal in the first stage of the Paris-Madrid automobile race, from Versailles to Bordeaux, Premier Combes has forbidden the continuance of the contest in French territory.

The New Boat Simply Runs Away From the Former Defender.

New York, May 23.—In a wind that ranged from a mere zephyr to an eight knot breeze, the Reliance clearly proved her superiority over the Columbia and Island Sound this afternoon.

The tests to which the boats were subjected were mainly confined to measuring their respective speeds.

As for the Columbia and Constitution, the contest was indecisive, though when the time limit expired and the boats stood about to make their moorings, the Columbia had a very slight advantage.

At noon, the announced hour of the start, the two were drifting helplessly in the water.

In the preliminary jockeying for positions, Capt. Barr of the Reliance had the best of it.

After sailing a few miles, the Columbia gained rapidly on the Belmont boat, and about midway on the leg, overhauled the Reliance.

Then the Reliance began lessening the distance that separated them, from the former flying lead.

At the end of the race, the Columbia had a lead of over two miles, which was being rapidly increased when the committee signalled a "moment of the race."

The last chapter in the Columbia & Western inquiry, with the exception of that devoted to the report itself, was closed yesterday when Mr. Duff summed up a report as well as a case for so long as a conversational address lasting about six hours. It is expected that the committee will have a report ready for presentation well in advance of the meeting of the House on Wednesday afternoon. And it is believed that one report will embody the views of all members of the committee upon the deductions to be drawn from the extensive evidence before them. An elaborate resume of counsel are expectedly set forth.

He prefaced his address by expressing the conviction that it would be glad that this long-continued inquiry was drawing to a close. Montreal's Latest Strike

Employees of Street Railway Companies Go Out en Masse.

Sympathy of the Public Largely With Corporations This Time.

Montreal, May 24.—The street railway employees went on strike yesterday morning at daylight, and since then Montreal has had a haphazard street railway service. Most of the strike is walking and walking cheerfully, because once in history public opinion is so solidly against a corporation in a fight against its employees. On Saturday the company arranged to operate 44 cars on the Beave Lake, St. Catherine and St. Denis street lines. There was but little violence attempted, most of the men were reported from any other section of the city.
