Large Attendance at St. Michael's Ca-Last evening there was grand vespers and charity sermon at St. Michael's cathedral. The services were in aid of the poor of St. Michael's parish, who are assisted by St. Vincent de Paul's society, which gives aid to all without reference to creed or nationality. The sermon was preached by Rev. Father McBrady, C. S. B., who took for his subject, Almsgiving. He began by giving an explanation of that passage of scripture which says, "it is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter the king dom of heaven." He then took up the question, "How much must we give in alms? Some say the tenth part of our income should be devoted to charity; but this is an income of \$5000 but who requires to support a large family, educate his children and ports large family, educate his children and incur other expenses. Again a widow or maid may not be in receipt of as large an income but yet has no family to support or educate. She can afford to and should pay the tenth part of her income, but in the former case it would be impossible for this man to support his family, educate his children and paya tenth part; when he has done this then he may pay this fraction. done this then he may pay this fraction. When all necessary expenses have been paid and a sufficient sum has been laid aside for future use, the remainder is the property of the poor. It should be given to all the poor in the neighborhood without regard to creed. He said it would be much better if all who give to charity would do so thro' the society, as the members know the deserving poor; otherwise a person may be receiving alms from the society and also from others.
