The Whisky Head Must Go. MINNEAPOLIS, May 17.—Senator Scheffer' drunkards law went into effect yesterday. It provides that whoever becomes intoxicated by voluntarily drinking intoxicating liquor shall be deemed guilty of the crime of drunk-enness and upon conviction shall be punished as follows: For the first offence a fine of not less than \$10 or more than \$50, or by imprison-ment for not less than 10 nor more than 40 days. For the second offence, by imprison-ment for not less than 30 nor more than 60 days, or by a fine of not less than \$20 nor more than \$50. For the third and all subse-quent offences, by imprisonment of not less than 60 days nor more than 90 days.



Grip on the Millers' Question.

It was inevitable that Grip should have to 'tackle' the millers' question, bus we tancy the bold blackbird will yet wish he had been able to leave it alone. For though on first view it may seem as if the situation looks bad for Sir John, it will to a certainty look far worse for the Grit party ere all be over. The way the thing lies is about as follows: In the great election struggle of ten years ago, Sir John and his friends promised that if returned to power they would establish a National Policy for Canada, this policy to include protection for the millers themselves, or of a prevailing majority of them, 50 cents per barrel duty on flour was fixed upon as sufficient. And so it appeared to be in 1879; but years following brought changes which revolutionized the trade. It is said that circumstances alter cases; and this time there was an alteration with a vengeance. The chief cause of the change was—a suddenly and largely increased export of wheat from India, and from South America. This new supply, produced from cheap land by cheap labor, interfered greatly with the market in Europe which our American neighbors had before looked upon as if it were among their vested rights. While the European market held good they did not need to rush their surplus in upon Canada; but when that failed then it became an object with them to crowd these Provinces for all they were worth as a market. What answered fairly well, or appeared to answer, a few years for any particular country does not lie in the keeping up of precisely this or that duty for pur-poses of protection: but in the maintenance oses of protection: but in the maintenance of a principle. If it be asked what duty Cau-da should gollect on foreign flour imported? -the reply should be: not one cent. Not a

the reply should be: not one cent. Not a barrel of flour should ever be imported at all. All the flour used by Canadian consumers should be produced at home, and consequently entirely free of customs duty.

While all Dominion interests had their claims upon fulfilment of the election campaign promises of 1876-77-78, the claim of the millers must be held a particularly strong one. Although the terms "Protection" and "National Policy" were sometimes used as if they both meant one and the same thing, yet indicate the application of the same neiple so the agricultural interests. The truth was that the term "National Policy" was used to convey to the farmers the idea that the same principle of protection which had been demanded by the manufacturers was to be secured for themselves. It was clearly societies doing good service in Toronto. All on this understanding that the Ontario farmers voted in 1878 to establish the N. P. And hundreds of workingmen, clerks, merchants the millers have had a double claim all along.

For while their claim to protection is good as manufacturers simply, the peculiar and intimate relation in which they stand to the farmers gives them besides a month's meeting the accumulation was as followed. could not have been carried ten years ago if had not voted for it. But if the case was a strong one ten years ago, it is certainly very much stronger now, and must be immensely stronger in years soon to come. For then Ontario was the only province in the Dominion having wheat and flour to sell. Now we have ba and the Territories also coming on as wheat producers, with a reason on as wheat producers, with a reasonable certainty that, ere the present generation has passed away, the Dominion will hold a wheat and flour interest which it will not be exaggerating to call perfectly gigantic in comparison with anything it ever held before. And be it remembered that what Parliament has to legislate for is not merely Old Canada as it was though that was still some Canada, as it was, though that was still something considerable, but also the Greater Canthing considerable, but also the Greater Canada of the future, counting within it several
Michigans and Minnesotas. Surely this
should be the home of a nation well
worthy of having a National Policy.
Yet apparently it lies within the power of
some petty Provincial souls to dictate that
such National Policy be refused. Now, you
surely don't believe that justice can much
langue he safely refused to the voting giant. longer be safely refused to the young giant now growing up. Some time ere long he will want to try his strength; and then the drag that holds him back will have to come, or something must break.

But he will not get rid of the drag by taking counsel from The Globe and from Grip. First let us understand what is now the real trouble with Canadian millers, and where it is that their American competitors have the advan-tage of them. If it were possible to supply either superior or inferior flour as the market happened to call for, it would be easy enough to meet the prevailing demand of the time But this is not the way the thing works. Say that a miller gets wheat enough to make a hundred barrels of flour, he will find that he can only make about forty out of the lot to some within the superior grades, while about sixty will have to be counted among the inferior grades. Now, while the former selloff quickly at paying prices the latter are slow of sale at prices that pay very poorly. In most branches of business a large market is more easily found for cheap and medium goods than for those that are more expensive. But in the flour trade it is altogether different. Among buyers every-body wants the best, at whatever price, and should be such. The same company of Ontario (limited), capital \$20,000, in one thousand shares of \$20 capital \$20,000, in one thousan only make about forty out of the lot to come within the superior grades, while body wants the best, at whatever price, and this is the case in Canada as well as in the States. American competitor. What he wants is not the American market to buy wheat in, but his own market to sell flour in. Of course it is to be believed that the miller on this side the border can make flour as good and as cheap as he on the other side. But he certainly cannot stand the competition if he is limited to one market to sell in, while his competitor enjoys the use of both. And this Month days the use of both. to no protection at all.

We reply: Yes, if it were restricted to products a ricultural; but that, you know, our neighbors will not concede. It is said that they will concede Reciprocity Unrestricted; though even that is doubtful. Some think that they would concede nothing better for us than Commercial Union; which would be simply the annihilation of Canada's independ-

form party there are a great many who utterly reject the Free Trade views of Sir Richard Cartwright and Mr. David Mills, But these men do not control the party, which takes its commercial policy, such as it has, from Cartwright, Mills, Edgar and The Globe. Spite of all that has been said and done there is still ground for hope that Sir John, who begun the fabric of National Policy, will yet complete it with fair protection to the great and growing wheat and flour interest as the keystone of the arch. But for any such hope from the Grit side there is no ground whatever. As we see it, on the trade question the present balance of public opinion is such as to make it perfectly safe for Sir John to carry National Policy out to its legitimate conclusion, while at the same time leaving it perfectly hopeless to look for such a policy from his antagonists. Meantime we do not conceal our conviction that the idea of giving fair protection to both that the idea of giving fair protection to both farmers and millers has a good deal stronger support among members of the Reform party than The Globe and Grip would be willing to acknowledge.

The new St. Helen's Church has a command The new St. Helen's Church has a commanding site and will when completed be an ornament to the district. Its total cost will be in the neighborhood of \$40,000. The new portion which will be opened for divine service tomorrow week has cost \$11,000. The old church has been used whilst the new portion will be available whilst the remainder is building. The sanctuary, transepts and morning chapel are completed. The two transepts are each 30 feet wide by 70 feet, the sanctuary 30 by 30 feet, of the apse form: the morning chapel is 18 by 18 feet, the nave 52 by 70 feet. There will be five vestibules and no less than six entrances to the completed church. At the east end will be an ample gallery and organ loft. Sitting accommodation will be provided for 1000 persons. The portion already

the east end will be an ample gallery and organ loft. Sitting accommodation will be provided for 1000 persons. The portion already finished seats 400.

The style of the church is French' gothic. Its lofty spire, 140 feet, will be seen for miles around. A large cross will surmount the spire. A special feature of the church is the beautiful tracery of the windows. The front elevation is also particularly fine. The sacred edifice will be of red brick dressed with a large proportion of good stone. Interiorly the church will be fitted up in the most handsome and approved style. There is a beautiful altar of carved oak, designed by Mr. A. R. Denison, the architect, and executed by Mr. Thomas Shea, the total cost being \$650. Then there are two side altars and another in the morning Shea, the total cost being \$650. Then there are two side altars and another in the morning chapel. The interior is beautifully finished in attacco and moulded cement; the heating and lighting are on the most approved principles, and the 'roof is an open one with finished cherry woodwork.

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




