London, Feb. 18.—The Queen arrived in London this afternoon. Her Majesty had requested that the strictest privacy be observed in her reception, and at the Victoria Station she was kept in seclusion. She was assisted from the car down an inclined platform, where her carriage was placed and carried to the completely surrounded carriage as it was driven to Buckingham Palace. The Pall Mall Gazette says the Queen's arrival from Osborne to-day was able to walk slowly along the platform of the Victoria Station, accompanied by her Maundy Indian attendant. She reached her carriage from the platform by means of a series of shallow carpeted steps, her Maundy attendant assisting her. The Dowager Empress Frederick followed her into the carriage and drew a veil over her mother's face to protect it from the keen wind.

The Queen was received at Buckingham Palace by the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall. Later in the afternoon the Prince and Princess of Wales, the Prince of Wales and the Princess of Wales, the Duke and Duchess of Devonshire, the Duke and Duchess of York, and other members of the royal family, and their sport was watched by the Queen, who appeared to derive great enjoyment from the pleasure of the skaters. A large dinner party was given at the palace in the evening.

Hamilton, Feb. 18.—The Barton and Stony Creek Consolidated Road Co. has entered suit against the Hamilton, Guelph and Beausville Electric Railway Co. to prevent the latter opening up or permitting any one else to open up a free road east of the city, to the detriment of the toll roads.

The Pastor in Revival.
The Pastor in Revival was the subject of a paper read by Rev. T. B. Hyde at the meeting of the Ministerial Association yesterday morning. Much discussion followed, which showed that the ministers hardly favor the method of evangelists, and were of the opinion that evangelists should conduct their own revival services.

The action of the Street Railway Company running cars Sunday did not meet with the approval of the association, but it was decided to take no action in the matter, after the explanation that the cars ran only to keep the tracks clear of snow.
