-WE really do not believe that our coun cillors have anything to conceal about the action of the insane asylum, and it is therefore to be regretted that a detailed statement of the expenditure in conne with that work was not properly audited and given to the public. Even though there may not be the slightest suspicion of wrong about the matter, the people of the county, whose money has been spent, have a right to the fullest information upon the subject. They assuredly have a right to be inform where their money has gone, who received it, and for what it was paid. Not only is it due to the people that all these details be

made public, but the councillors who com posed the committee owe it to themselv as well, to give the information, in order that there may be no room for any suspicion n connection with the expenditure. The fact that it may be believed, or even known, that everything is all right about the matter does not alter or affect this right of the taxpayer to have the facts, or this duty of the nmitee to give them. We therefore think that a detailed statement of the entire ex penditure should have been prepared and properly audited before the late session of the council closed.

We are led to make these observations by the fact that a good many enquiries have been made of late as to the meaning of these apparent misunderstandings and partial repudiations we have seen and heard since the statement of the expenditure was published in our columns a few weeks ago. No sooner had we published the statement given us than Councillor Elliott casts suspicion upon it by characterizing it as a "presumed report which he says is made "to bear such false witness." Our Municipal Treasurer, it seems, did not quite like the item entered as "Treasurer \$150," and on making enquiries learns that it should read "Secretary \$150." There is not much information in all this, but there is just enough to lead a good many people to wonder what it all means. If the mmittee which had charge of the const tion had a secretary who received \$150 for his services, then it was clearly the duty of such an official to prepare a detailed statement of the expenditures, in order that they might be properly audited and published, as all other bills are. It is not too late yet for this, and as public attention has been called to the matter we trust that it will yet be ent of education.

At the age of twelve a pupil may pass an examination in Grade VII and be exempt. At there he may work the rest of the year if he attend for sixty consecutive days.
