Dear Mrs. Vidito: It is with a

heavy heart that I acknowledge the receipt of your letter dated Feb. 17. 1919. I would have written long ere but did not receive your letter until I arrived in England. Yes, Mrs. Vidito, I knew your husband, he was a splendid fellow quiet and unassuming in manners, willing and splendid work er, faced dangers and difficulties in a calm and resourceful way. I knew his Battalion well in France, but became acquainted with him when he joined the 1st Bridging Co. He was one of the first men in the company that I struck up friendship, a friendship that grew stronger until the Angel of Death visited him. He was a very handy boy, so was placed in charge of the Sgts' Mess. Working in this capacity, he and I were flung constantly together, so often he assisted me in getting Marquee ready and fitted for the recreation of the men. Thus we often shared the same meal and slept under the same canvas Our camp in Palestine was situated four miles from the sea of Galilee and That combined with the other terrible hardships we had to endure. and lack of food, medicine etc... played havoc with our men. Only five out of the whole company did not go to the hospital with Malaria fever or other illness. I was one of the men who did not go sick, so I turned the Y. M. C. A. into a hospital on many occasions. Your husband assisted me in the work of mercy. But the day arrived when he ran a high temperature himself. We persuded him to take several days' rest, but before the week was up he came back to duty again. Later on he took sick This time I took him to my be done with facilities at our command was done for him. In sickness as in strength he was quiet and uncomplaining. Every time I would put the question, "How do you feel now," he would give the same answer "Not tog bad," but his temperature showed him to be more sick than he would admit, so I gathered together his personal belongings and packed his kit and sent him off to the hospital at Haifia (seaport on the Mediterranean).
