LONDON March 4th,-The governmen are about to ask the assent of parliament fo the increase of twenty-thousand men to the present English army.

March 5th. Owing to the paramont importance of the Russian question, the complete collapse of the campaign for the pre sent against the Mahdi is admitted.

ENGLAND'S CONDITIONS. March 9th .- The Daily News states that there it a constant exchange of despatches between the English and Russian govern monts, and goes on to state that although there is a possible hope of a peaceful solu tion still the present condition of affairs is very critical. The British government demands that the Russian government order their army from the Afghan frontier, and puts the demand in the form of an ultima tum or choice of peace or war. The state of affairs is such that it lies in the hands o Russian ministers, and any error committed

now will lie at their door. The London Times comes out strong; au urges England to immediately occupy and fortify Herat and her other post on the frontier, and check any attempted Russian allvance, and says if Russia wishes and bent on fighting, England is ready and willing, and Russia has only to say the word The whole country is greatly excited, and if it comes to blows ltussm will bitterly regret she has aroused a far more terrible retribution than the Crimea should have

The large governmental arsenal at Woolwich is working night and day. Great activity prevails. All the other arsenals in England are rushing forward and completing arms and munitions.

> The latest scandal concerns snow-slides. It has been a question of considerable inportance for some time amongst the authorities as to what is to be done in the immediate neighborhood of the slides.
