The Outlook. BY E. SHEPPARD.

A view of the religious world, from the watch tower of observation, in many respects, is neither very cheering nor encouraging. It is true that some of the religious bodies are expending comparatively large sums for the furtherance of Christianity both at home and abroad, and are meeting with a measure of denominational success. It is also pleasing to note that some of the harsh and ghastly features of Calvinistic theology are giving place to the smiling and levely features of scriptural truth respecting the character and dispensation of the God of love. Also that iron-bound Sectarianism is breaking itself loose from its oreed-rivetted fetters; and, in the freedom of thought and sontiment, aspiring after unity and peace.

On the other hand, we are pained to see the large amount of apathy in places where every Gospel privilege exists, especially among young men, who rather pride themselves in standing aloof from churches, and who glory cither in the courage of indifference or in the assumptions of vain deistical philosophy.

Then, in order to attract those who do not care for the simple truths of Christianity, every means is used by the great majority of churches, no matter how unscriptural those methods are, that their sensational and fashionable services may be more largely attended; and it is one of the most disheartening indications of religious declension that the larger the admixture of the sensuous in religious coremonies and modern worship the more popular they are among the great mass of unthinking and emotional

J. In Christendom, Roman Catholicism and the Greek Church embrace about two-thirds of the whole. Even where there is full religious freedom, and every opportunity to understand and embrace a more scriptural faith, as in the United States and Canada, the Church of Rome secures more of success and larger congregations than the Protestant churches, owing very largely, no doubt, to the adornment of the churches with paintings, sculpture and drapery, and to the display of sacerdotal robes, burning candles, smoking incense and other methods adapted to the sensuous taste of the people.

Without naming the Protestant denominations who depart most largely from the simplicity of Gospel truth and apostolical precedents, the reader for himself can easily discover the fact already mentioned that the popularity of churches is, with very few exceptions, in proportion to the amount of human devices and expedients used to please and attract the hearers; while to attend to the ordinances as they have been delivered to us, and to insist on an humble and self-denying life is to with the eye of faith, to gaze at being baptized?" 'Saving" Faith.

Mr. Editor,-As one who has but recently come out of Babylon, the writer desires to make a simple statement of the difference between our teaching and that of the self-styled "Evangelicals" upon a very vital question—Salvation.

There is not that radical difference in principle between the teaching of our brethren and the "Evangelicals" which is generally supposed to exist-Hours have been worse than wasted in aggravating and profitless debate on points of difference which had no real existence, and many a sinful war of words has been kindled to the bewilderment of the sincere and the scorn of the sceptical listener. We wrangle with "Evangelicals" on the question, "Does faith precedo repontance, or does ropentanco procedo faith?" whereas the simple truth is that they and we are in perfect accord in the matter. Then there is that useess conflict about "historical" faith and saving "faith. Of course these terms are wholly unscriptural and bewildering, and should be firmly rejected. Nevertheless, the distinction which our "Evangelical" friends intend by these terms is scriptural, and no people recognize and insist upon the distinction more strongly than do the Disciples of Christ. That these assortions may be verified let us examine the three great steps which every alien must take in coming into the Kingdom. In so doing, allow us, for once, to adopt the language of Babylon, and employ the terms 'historical" and "saving" faith.

"HISTORICAL" FAITH. -The gospoi message must be proclaimed to men-Mon must hear and believe it. But a man may har the Gospel every day in the year-implicitly believe every fact and truth contained in revelation—and yet romain impenitont, a hardened rebel agniúst God.

REPENTANCE.—The sinner, awakened by the Gospel message, desires to be delivered from the condemnation and bondage of sin. He turns Godward, seeking pardon.

"Saving" Fatth .- The sinner can do nothing towards either meriting salvation or procuring pardon. All, then, that the penitent can do, is to APPRO PRIATE the promise of pardon contained in the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Baptism is that act of faith, in which the penitent alien casts himself trustfully upon the morey of God and appropriates the Saviour's promise, " He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved." As he stens down into the water, the language of his heart is-

Thus viewed, baptism is the expression of " saving" faith.

A Wail from Hindooism.

The London Missionary Society furrishes its readers with an extended extract from a very significant pamphlot recently published in Calcutta, which sounds a loud note of alarm from the Hindoo community. It may be read with advantage by those who are wont to declare that hitherto Christian missionaries in India have almost deserved the name of failures.

The pamphlet declares that owing chiefly to the influence of Christianity, brought steadily and constantly to bear ing up the constitution upon the national mind for nearly a century and a half, the life-blood of Hindooism is fast obbing away, and irreligion is fast destroying its vitalsthe so-called irreligion being of course Christianity.

It further declares that as the result of the national anathy upon the subject, especially in Bengal, Christian Missions aroin a fine way of accomplishing their object by their persistent and systematic efforts to change the moral, social and domestic lives of the Ilindoos. It declares that unless those efforts are counteracted at an early day, there will come a mighty and remodiless collapse of Hindooism. The appeal also speaks of the imminent danger to which Hindooism is exposed from Bible-women in the homes of Hindoos, and from Mission schools to which the children of Hindoos are sent, because there are no Hindoo schools for them.

It is stated that as a result of this appeal and confession of weakness and of dauger, two or three schools have been established near those of the London Society but without any diminution of the number of pupils in For Catalogues Addressattendance upon those schools.

This is most encouraging missionary intelligence. It is a confession of the oarly doom of Hindooism, and a prophecy of the triumph of Christianity, as the results of persistent labour and prayer by God's people. How much do our readers wish to hasten that day ?-N. Y. Evangelist.

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

AN OUTRAGE AT NANKING. To the Editor of the North China Daily

Sir, -Wo came protty nearly suffering in a small way a trouble like the Chinkiang riots of last New Year's, on Sunday last after our usual morning service. chapel was packed and many outside could not get in. A letter was sent to the Office of Foreign Affairs and we went inside to our com-munion service.
